Philadelphia, June 1.—The strike of the textile industry is fully inaugurated today, and fully 85,000 thousand are idle. None of the employees attempted to start to work.

Washington, June 1.—Payne this afternoon expressed great displeasure at the report sent out by a press association to the effect that a half million dollars of excess was paid for postal rentals in New York state. He said it was entirely untrue. He said the total paid for rent of postoffice quarters in the entire state, including New York, is only \$466,811, which also pays for light and heat.

Have a Right
to Petit Jury

Washington, June 1.—An important decision, involving the rights of Hawaiian citizens, was handed down by the supreme court today, in the case of Osaki Manchichi, convicted of manslaughter, though never indicted by a grand jury. It establishes the principle that under the annexation act, residents of the islands are not entitled to a grand jury indictment, but it is the unanimous verdict that a petit jury is necessary to convict.
