Our Carnival

The projected Mid-Summer Carnival for Salem is a venture of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, an association of two hundred or more business men of the Capital City, banded for the good of the city and for the whole county of Marion, not forgetting the State of Oregon. Primarily, of course, the city of Salem lies closer to the hearts and energies of the members, but the greater organic divisions of county and state are never overlooked by the workers in this club, and this broad and helpful spirit has tended largely to make the Greater Salem Commercial Club the pronounced success it is.

The club, having been mainly instrumental in achieving the plan for a city three-fold larger in territorial limit and population than the present municipality (which plan has received the legislative sanction and will become effective on October 1st, next), desired to commemorate the historical element of Salem's growth by some festival of note, and decided upon this plan as best calculated to fix it in the minds of all concerned. This was aside from the lesser, yet still necessary, idea of replenishing the treasury of the club to the extent of a thousand or two dollars, but the two purposes, when combined, furnished an impetus that made the affair one of the greatest successes of the year.

Having determined upon this project, the club referred the details to a committee consisting of its members, namely H. D. Patton, M. O. Buren, J. G. Graham, C. H. Hinzee, and N. J. Judah, for investigation and report. These gentlemen minutely investigated such organized schemes of popular amusement as were at hand in the state and reported, accordingly, in favor of making the "Oregon, Pacific and Oriental Shows" of E. J. Arnold, of Portland, the basis of the fair. This was approved by the club and then it became necessary to organize a board of management to perfect the plans for the state. The same committee chose one of its members, N. J. Judah, the present recorder of Salem, as general manager, and recommended that he be given full sway in the choice of his advisors, and the club consented to these things, and to have ratified all the special committee asked for. After his appointment, Mr. Judah proceeded to surround himself with eleven of the most capable young business men of Salem, as the following list of sub-managers will indicate:

C. H. Hinzee, sub-manager on publicity; W. J. Culver, sub-manager on grounds; W. E. Sherman, sub-manager on pipes; M. O. Buren, manager on tickets; F. L. Wilman, sub-manager on decorations; Aug. Hockestein, sub-manager on finance; J. G. Graham, sub-manager on transportation; Paul Street, sub-manager on public utilities; W. D. Pugh, sub-manager on construction; M. L. Myers, sub-manager on concessions; H. D. Patton, sub-manager on queen contest. The board of managers having been happily constituted, the next step to be successfully accomplished was the closing of a contract for the Arnold shows. This was satisfactorily done, and upon liberal terms throughout, and then the city council was asked to grant the use of "Wilson Avenue," one of the most beautiful sites in Salem, for the placing of the big Summer festival, and that body of up-to-date legislators instantly acquiesced and did other kindly favors in this behalf, so that as far as the important essentials are concerned, the Carnival is safely launched.

Manager Culver has surveyed and platted the grounds and his report has been adopted by the board; a broth-section, 100 by 125 feet in dimensions, has been designed, together with a splendid arch for the main entrance, by Manager Pugh, and the important matters of water and light service are being negotiated by Manager Street and will soon be reported. The work of construction and installation will, necessarily, be deferred until the later weeks of June, but the lesser contracts and the granting of concessions will go forward at once, and indeed many of these things are now successfully under way. The city will soon be brilliant with Carnival badges and the bill-boards of town and country-side will flame with the parti-colored heralds of the jolly street fair, while for a month

One of the agreeable elements of this undertaking is that it is a community affair. There is no profit in it to any one, the net profit of the Carnival going directly to the treasury of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, there to be held until it is expended for some considered scheme of general utility that shall redound to the advantage of the whole city. Nor is it ultra-optimistic to say that a board of managers have figured out upon a rational estimate of expense and income, a net profit of \$1,000, always considering that the people here keep alive the public interest in the city. It will be necessary for every one in Greater Salem to that Carnival study Carnival talk Carnival dream Carnival and work Carnival from now on until the last hour of the engagement, associate themselves with the Carnival idea and inoculate everybody else, home-people and visitors alike, with the popular notion and trust the final and full success of the proposition to care the epidemic.
