NOW PUSH FOR SALEM.

There is no politics on for nearly a year, and it is the first duty of every citizen to bend every energy toward the upbuilding of this city.

A SALEM INSTITUTION.

With individual ownership of the light and power plant of this city it becomes a Salem institution, with a Salem payroll of about two thousand dollars a month, and running expenses of nearly as much more.

The present ownership means a great deal to this city. It means just the opposite from what the non-resident management meant, which allowed the property to run down, and forced up the rates of service for lights.

Resident ownership means an expenditure of nearly four thousand dollars a month, and a policy of supplying light and power at reasonable

rates, and of rebuilding the tracks and improving the equipment, so as to make it valuable.

The money made out of the plant now owned by Mr. Henry will for several years be expended on improvements, and a great deal of money besides. This community is not paying money to be shipped out of the state, but this plant is bringing money into the state for taxation.

It will be expended for labor and fuel and materials almost entirely. For this reason resident ownership becomes very important, because this institution is one of the largest concerns in the state.

The improvement and extension of the plant will go forward steadily under Mr. Henry's enterprising management. He has shown the very opposite of a peevish disposition—the disposition that makes a community alive, instead of putting a blight on public enterprises.

Such a man is worth having in any city, and Salem is to be congratulated on his acquiring the ownership of this valuable property, so long as he continues to give the people an improved service and lights at reasonable rates.

IS AFTER PORTLAND'S BUSINESS

**Baker City Thinks
She Can Butt
Into It**

The Polygamy Central Arranging to Extend its Narrow Gauge From Whitney to Prairie City

Mr. W. H. Wattle, the well known railroad contractor who built a large portion of the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad with Corey Bros., of Ogden, arrived in Baker City Wednesday evening and yesterday went over the Sumpter Valley railroad to the front with Chief Engineer West.

Mr. Wattle carefully examined the line, examined the surveys and profiles and left last night for Salt Lake where it is expected he will meet Mr. David Eccles and close a proposition to build the extension of the Sumpter Valley road from Whitney to Prairie City. Should Mr. Wattle undertake this piece of work, his well known executive ability guarantees its quick and satisfactory completion.

This work by the Sumpter Valley road, for which all the material has been purchased and much of it is on hand, is one of the most important undertakings to Baker City scheduled for 1903. It means the extension of commercial circles into the far interior and the resultant benefits are apparent to all. This is only the beginning, as it is understood from a source of high authority that the Sumpter Valley will eventually extend into Central Oregon, crosscutting the territory to be tapped by the extension of the Columbia Southern from Shaniko, thus putting Baker City in a position to compete with Portland for the trade of that rich and growing country.

O. P. Hoff Appointed

The state board of labor commissioners, composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, yesterday appointed O. P. Hoff, of Portland, an old railway conductor, labor commissioner for the state of Oregon.

The office pays a salary of \$1800 per annum, besides an annual allowance of \$800 for expenses. The duties of the commissioner shall be to inspect the factories and workshops in the state, compile labor statistics, and enforce the labor act under which his office was created.

Several candidates were in the race for this position, and, although Mr. Hoff had the least number of petitions and personal recommendations, he was the unanimous choice of the board. Mr. Hoff will hold the office, by appointment, until 1906, when a successor will be elected, as the other state officers are.
