LATEST NEW YORK FASHIONS

Prettiest Things in Dress Goods are of Course the Wearers

Wedding Dresses, Waists, Figured Materials, Shirt Waist Suits, Millinery and Laces

Chiffon is the leading material for wedding dresses, worn chiefly, however, by youthful brides, while young ladies past the budding season, or those more mature, are apt to choose some stiffer fabric, such as Olga, a crepe de Chine, with high glossy surface, or crepe de Chine with a slight twill, or the genuine material with its own peculiar attractiveness, and some of the most elegant gowns of the season have been in crepe de Chine embroidered to order. Satin, likewise, remains in style, but is not a frequent selection, and the same can be asserted of lace. Quite pretty and comparatively inexpensive gowns are made of fine veiling trimmed with lace.

Transparent Yokes.

Of lace or chiffon, or both in combination, appear on bridal dresses of every description, and sleeves are finished in keeping, angel drapery also being still in great favor. The heavier class of fabrics are sometimes made in princess style, when a fine figure may admit the same. Trains are round, and, of course, vary in length according to fancy, and veils, usually of tulle, are very long and kept in position by a garland of flowers ending in two sprays at the back, and for such purposes orange buds and blossoms lead, though any small white flowers can be substituted, the usual choice in place of orange blossoms being lilies of the valley or Star of Bethlehem flowers. Bridesmaids sometimes wear lilies of the valley, and for them any pretty sheer material, especially net, is appropriate. At a recent wedding the bridesmaids wore pink net, made low neck and short sleeves, with picture hats of roses.

White Waists

Have opened on us like a swarm of locusts, devouring before them all colors in cotton or linen, except a few infrequent ones in solid colors, embroidered, this, in turn, bringing about an immense demand for wash silk waists in stripes. They are extremely pretty, and notable girls can buy the material at a low price, and turn out attractive garments that cost but little. Fancy materials in floral or striped patterns, or perhaps both, are made up in entire dresses. They are frequent, but after all, throughout dress in general, there is a marked preference for plain goods embroidered, rather than fancy patterns. Of course, the delightful varieties in mousseline, lawn, etc., must command a place for themselves and challenge this year almost compete and much thinner than formerly, with satin stripes, can hardly be called a utility material.

Transparent yokes are almost universal and sleeves are long and usually finished in keeping with yokes. White sashes complete, and are often knotted half way down, to correspond with a knotting at the waist. Shoes are perfectly white.
