## SUNDAY SCHOOL PUPILS

### Wrecked While on an Excursion on the Missouri

### Boat Collides With the Bridge and it and a Big Barge go Down With 240 Pupils

Hannibal, Mo., June 3.—The seamer Flying Eagle and a barge, with a party of 240 Sunday School pupils aboard, struck the draw span of the bridge here today, and both barge and steamer went to the bottom. So far as known only three lives were lost, though conflicting reports indicate many more. The three were all small children, who jumped overboard. Mrs. Lynn was caught between the bridge and the boat cabin, and was fatally crushed.

The steamer had just left the wharf with the excursion, and started through the draw bridge, when a log caught in the wheel and smashed it. Another barge was tied to the pier, on which the adults and children jumped as the steamer swung slowly off. Shortly the engine cylinder head of the steamer blew out, and the steamer floated several hundred feet, turned on her side and sank, carrying the barge down with her. Many of the people who jumped to the shore at the time immediately put out in boats and picked up those who hadn't jumped to the stationary barge.

## SEATTLE PEOPLE WRATHY

### Chamber of Commerce will Jump Secretary Moody

### Claim California is Raising all the Trouble at Bremerton in Interest of Mare Island

Seattle, June 3.—The Chamber of Commerce proposes to take up the navy department's embargo of Bremerton and the Puget Sound navy yard, for the purpose of forcing the issue. If no satisfaction is obtained from the department, it will appeal to the President. Falling there, it will make an appeal to the next congress. It believes the hostile action is inspired by California, in the interest of Mare Island.

### Stranger Gets His Neck Broken

Salt Lake, June 3.—An unknown man, this noon, while quarreling with a man named B. Hammond, at the Grill Club rooms, was thrown down the staircase, breaking his neck. He died a few minutes later. Hammond was arrested by the sheriff.

### Marcum Murder Trial Drags

Jackson, Ky., June 3.—The prosecution this morning asked the court for permission to withdraw its motion for a change of venue, and to hold the trial in Breathitt county. The court granted the motion and rescinded the order changing the trial to Morgan county. Jett and White were brought into the court by the soldiers and turned over to the sheriff, who warmly shook hands with them. The anti-Harris people this morning are very bitter. A volley fired near the jail last night again turned out the soldiers. Holmes and the other witnesses are protected by guards continually.

### Minnesota Bank is Dynamited

Redwood Falls, Minn., June 3.—The Gold Stabcock Bank, at Vesta, was dynamited last night, and \$2500 in currency and \$20,000 in notes were taken.

### There May be More Coal Strike

Indianapolis, June 3.—Mitchell today says he doesn't care to discuss the probable outcome of the anthracite difficulty, but the Mine Workers will insist that Nicholas, Fahey and Duffey be recognized as their representatives.

### Chicago Has More Strikes

Chicago, June 3.—The janitors of 50 large apartment buildings struck this morning. They allege discrimination against the union. Attempts were made to start the laundries this morning with non-union help. It failed, because the coal teamsters threatened to walk out.

#### Train Went Through Bridge.

Coshocton, Ohio, June 3.—A Pennsylvania work train plunged through the bridge over the Walhonding river this morning. Two Italians were hurt by jumping, and the engine and six cars were completely submerged.
