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TO ELECT SCHOOL DIRECTOR.

On June 15th the voters of each independent school district hold an election, and at Salem one director is to be chosen.

These school directors are elected one each year to serve for five years, and hence the election is very important.

Salem some years ago knocked all politics out of the school management, and a fight was made and won to put the district on a cash basis.

Debt has been wiped out each year for several years, and the financial condition of the district is very satisfactory.

With a larger valuation on property there will be an opportunity to reduce taxes next year and have increased income for the schools.

A tenth grade has been added to the schools under the able management of the present board and city superintendent, without increased cost.

The present board of education has re-employed City Supt. Traver, and a director should be chosen who will sustain the progress that has been made.

The Journal hopes some first-class director can be elected without opposition who will stand by the excellent work that has been done.

MURRAH FOR THE CARPENTERS' UNION.

The interview with a Union carpenter in The Journal Thursday was read with great interest, and has had a good effect.

The result will be that more buildings will be undertaken, and there will be greater prosperity at Salem the rest of the year than ever.

The Carpenters' Union takes the right stand in opposing the radical methods that have produced such bad results at Portland.

The Journal has constantly contended for the principle that there must be consideration by each side for the rights of the other.

Let Salem be the one city where there are neither strikes nor lock-outs, and where Unions are respected, and respect the rights of others.

The best stimulus for good wages is plenty of employment, and there is great injury done to labor when strained conditions are produced.

Even the fear that force and dictation will be restored to has a deterring effect on building enterprises, and destroys confidence.

The labor unions of Salem could take no wiser step than to officially declare that they will on all occasions meet employers more than half way.

If that attitude is taken there will be no employers' unions, and no strife and warfare, and the attendant discord and jealousy.

The Carpenters' Union has shown the right spirit on several occasions, and for this the community owes them great consideration.

PROTECT THE RIVER FRONT.

The Journal believes in fighting for its own community. The Salem Push Club meets tonight, and has several important propositions before it.

One is putting on of an independent steamboat to run so as to bring trade to Salem, and enable the people to get home the same day.

The capitalists of Salem should give this proposition favorable consideration, and the club will no doubt help make it a success.

A still more important matter in the hands of the club is the work of protecting the Salem river front from being closed by the growing bar.

An appropriation of \$50,000 to \$100,000 will be needed to properly safeguard the harbor, and steps to secure the appropriation must be taken at once.

It takes several years to secure such appropriations, and for this reason the club must push its preparatory work now.

A map must be prepared, and is ready, or nearly ready, for the use of the club in getting recognition from the department.

The election of Congressman Hermann gives Salem an opportunity to press this matter with the efficient backing of a personal representative.

It may be necessary to send a representative of this club to Washington to secure action when congress meets.

But armed with a proper map, showing the peril to the city, the Oregon delegation can get the whole matter before the war department at any time.

NO PARDONS FOR WIFE-KILLERS.

Governor Chamberlain, with his usual patience, heard all that could be said in favor of Smith, the colored wife-killer, and let him hang.

If ever there were excuse for wife-killing it would have been in some such case as a white woman being killed by a negro husband.

But even in that case there is not a mitigating circumstance, beyond the prejudice against a marriage mixing races so at natural variance and difference of blood.

But a wife-murder is, after all, the most horrible form of homicide, and implies a depravity that leaves little to be said in its favor.

Wife-beating and wife-murder are heinous offences in the eyes of Amer-

icans, and the general public will sustain the governor of Oregon for not yielding to sentiment, and mitigating this sentence.

Governor Chamberlain has set a new example in pardon cases that has not been generally brought before the public, in that he discourages arguments before him by counsel in pardon cases, preferring, when possible, to hear the relatives of the convicted person, and having them present their petition.

This is a plain benefit to poor people not able to hire smooth and gifted speech-making lawyers to review their case before the governor. So far as known the present governor has made a good record.

A SOCIALIST PROTEST.

An esteemed lady Socialist writes in this Journal to protest against an act of congress known as the Dick bill, to regulate the national guard.

The general news columns of this paper have contained references to this piece of legislation, but this is the first objection we have heard.

Under the Dick bill the national guard of each state becomes a part of the national reserve, and is under regular army organization.

It can be called out by the President, and the government provides for the expense of annual encampments, and officers to drill the troops.

The general public does not yet share the apprehension of our correspondent, that a military despotism lurks beneath the measure.

If our Florence correspondent will send us an abstract of this law we shall gladly publish it and invite discussion of its merits.

This is supposed to be a free country, and with a free press there is no reason why any great military despotism can be fastened on the necks of the people, without their becoming aware of it.

The Journal believes in a small and efficient national guard and regular army, but in a very efficient navy.

Its columns are open to all kinds of opinions, the dissemination of which lead to discussion, and to keep the people thinking and guessing, even though they are directly opposed to our views.

It is the results that the people can best judge a government by, and politically we worship the "church of the best liars."

Delmonico never served a trout like unto those we have eaten by the banks of a mountain brook with the clear blue sky above, the murmuring brook stream at our feet.
