CHEMAWA AGAINST WASCO

The Indian Boys Get the White Brothers Scalps

Bunch Grass Boys Were Nice Young Fellows But It Wasn't Their "Close Illihee"

Thursday at the C. A. A. C. field Chemawa defeated Wasco by a score of 12 to 5.

The Wasco team is an aggregation of ball tossers from Eastern Oregon, costing their little town \$900 per month, and from the game they played it looks like a case of obtaining money under false pretenses.

The first half of the game was a battle of pitchers, and it was not until the fifth inning that things began to look interesting. In the first inning, with two men out, Poland came to the bat, and, with three balls and two strikes against him, made a hit into center field, which emptied the bases, making the score 3 to 2 in Chemawa's favor. Downie got a two-bagger, but Young, in trying to make a grandstand play, forced him off third, and he went out between third and home.

In the fifth chapter Raub made a base hit, and on a wild throw to first he safely made third, but, in making a grandstand, he went out at home, hurting his arm and cutting his hand.

Things were very lively in the sixth when Chemawa came to the bat, and by a series of errors, combined with a few hits, managed to make nine runs. Wasco, in the next inning made three, but lost their luck and were in bad humor when the inning closed. In the beginning of the seventh Catlin, who was umpiring, called George Irwin to take his place on account of a sore throat.

In the last half of the eighth a pitched ball hit Davis' bat, and Raub, who was on first, ran to second. The umpire called it a ball, but Wasco contended that Raub should not be allowed to run to second. It looked as if the game would end, as the Wasco refused to play, but after a lively discussion the game continued, the umpire's decision standing.

Wasco failed to do any business in the next inning, and the game ended the score being 12 to 5.

Arrested for Swindling

Roseburg, Or., June 4.—J. C. Baker was arrested by Sheriff Parrott near Glendale, in this county, Sunday evening and brought to this city, where he waived examination, and was bound over to the sum of \$5000 to await the action of the circuit court.

Baker is charged with swindling various persons for the past two weeks between this city and Portland, and at Salem, Albany, Eugene and in this city. With his wife he was traveling by wagon, and on this account he has not been apprehended sooner. It is claimed by the authorities that he would enter some store, introduce himself as the traveling representative of some firm and take orders for goods, then ask for an advance on the order, or secure a loan on the pretense of being short of change. Also that he cashed bogus checks.

After his arrest he was handcuffed and placed on horseback to be taken to Glendale. He became sullen and deliberately fell from the saddle, breaking his right arm just above the wrist.

Baker gave his name at different places as Ben Mayer, A. L. Stewart, C. W. Walker and J. C. Baker.

Religious Enthusiasts Form a Colony Under the Name of the New House of Israel.

The religious enthusiasts who came to Livingston, Tex., from Ohio and Michigan and established a terrestrial heaven in the dense forest of pine trees five miles from there, have just celebrated the seventh anniversary of their arrival.

These fanatics call themselves the new house of Israel, and claim to have received divine instruction to establish a heaven in the wilderness of Texas, where shall be gathered together the 12 tribes of Israel, numbering 144,000 people. This heaven, they say, shall not be destroyed by fire when the remainder of the world is consumed. The colony has less than 100 members.

Is Against the Militia Law

Florence, Ore., June 1, 1903.

Editor Hofer: We find published in The Liberator of May 23d, public document No. 33, an act to promote the efficiency of the militia and for other purposes. We have taken your paper for several years, and read it quite thoroughly; but if you published that law we did not see it, neither did we see any comment favorable, or otherwise. Now why is it that a man of your attainments and seeming fair mindedness leaves it for Socialists to do the publishing and commenting on such un-American laws. It certainly gives readers a chance to think that the Socialists are more far-seeing and liberty-loving than the other parties.

If that law had been passed in a South American republic it would not appear out of keeping with their civilization. But in the United States of America where the citizens are supposed to be free, that a man who has never enlisted nor signified his intention to do so can be called on to perform military duty and be punished for refusing the same as a regular soldier, and that the president has an unrestricted right to make such call without as much as saying, by your leave, to congress.

Is not that a good solid foundation for a military despotism? I think if President Roosevelt had had that law and his signature, printed on his private car, in type sufficiently large to be easily read that there would have been a good many hisses mingled with the cheers at the end of
