DWELLING BURNED AT NOON

Mr. Prescott's Residence on Commercial and Leslie

Fire Started From a Defective Flue and Building is a Total Loss

The property of M. W. Prescott, on Commercial street, corner of Bellevue, was discovered to be burning about 11 o'clock today, and, after some delay, an alarm of fire was turned in. The department responded in the usual prompt manner, but found the property burning fiercely.

The house was occupied by D. B. Smith, a druggist employed by Daniel Fry. Mrs. Smith, formerly Miss Pearl Kress, was at home alone, preparing dinner. Hearing a noise in the attic above the kitchen, she opened a door leading to it, and discovered the fire. She turned in the alarm as soon as she could get to the nearest telephone.

The fire was probably the result of a defective flue, as Mrs. Prescott cautioned Mrs. Smith not to build a fire in one of the stoves on account of the flue. The only fire Mrs. Smith had was in the kitchen stove.

All of the furniture was saved, excepting, perhaps, some stored in the back part of the house and the attic.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have been living in the house for about three weeks, in the absence of Mrs. Prescott, who is at Winlock, Wash., where her father is very sick.

The loss from the fire and water will be about \$2000. It is not known whether or not the property was insured.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith saved all of their personal effects, excepting that Mrs. Smith has not as yet found her watch, which she prizes very highly. It being a Christmas present. Her full name is engraved on the case.

Will Ketchum, while assisting in the removal of the piano from the burning house, caught his leg in some manner in the sidewalk, throwing it out of joint at the knee. He was conveyed to a carriage and taken home, where the injured joint was put into place. It is a very painful injury, and will incapacitate him for several days.

Mr. Prescott arrived on the 11 o'clock train this morning, about the time of the fire, and took charge of the furniture, which was in charge of a special officer, sworn in by Chief of Police Gibson.

A careful examination of what remains of the property shows that the fire started in an unoccupied part of the house, and was not through any carelessness of Mr. and Mrs. Smith, who only occupied a part of the house.
