

BUTCHERS OUT ON A STRIKE

Los Angeles Getting a Taste of Labor Troubles

Strike Spreading to Restau- rants, Hotels and Retail Shops and the Situa- tion Grows Worse

Los Angeles, June 6.—The strike of 60 butchers working for the Maier Packing Co. is spreading to all the restaurants, hotels and meat markets. The drivers at the plant have gone out, refusing to carry non-union meat. The cutters in all the retail shops followed suit. The cooks and waiters went last night, and decided to do the same if the proprietors get meat from Maier. The other packing house has joined Maier. This morning it issued an edict that if the retailers refused to take Maier meat they would be boycotted by the other plants. One butcher, who violated the union rules, caused all the trouble, because Maier refused to discharge him.

SOUTH CAROLINA FLOOD

Four Mills at Pacelot Swept Down the River

Church, Hotel and Stables also Leave for Down the River Points--50 Lives Lost

Augusta, Ga., June 6.—A report has reached here from Pacolet, South Carolina, that Mill No. 1 of the Pacolet Company was completely washed away by a cloudburst. The Pacolet river overflowed its banks, and Mill No. 2 is in great danger. Many miles of low lands are flooded, and great damage done. Reports conflict as to whether there is loss of life or not.

A later report says Mill No. 2, at Pacolet, was swept away; another further down the river destroyed, and the fourth is in danger. A church, hotel and livery stable at Pacolet were also destroyed.

A later report says that 33 were drowned at Spartansburg. Clifton Mill No. 4 was washed away, in addition to the two Pacolet mills. The most loss of life was in the Clifton district. All the rivers in the western portion of South Carolina are on a rampage; railroad bridges are washed away, and wires are down. There is 60 feet of water in the Pacolet river, which is usually a small stream, barely large enough to turn the mill wheels. The property loss is already a million dollars. Two thousand bales of manufactured goods were washed away when the mills were destroyed. The Western Union reports it has lost practically all the wires and poles in the vicinity of Spartansburg. Telephone communication is intermittent.

Columbia, S. C., June 6.—Reports received here from Spartansburg say the loss of life will probably exceed 50. The greatest number was at the Clifton Mills, above the Pacolet Mills. The hotel and a number of residences were washed away in the flood, which came out of the mountains like a giant mill race. The mills were largely owned by English capitalists.

They Almost Shed Blood

Paris, June 6.—Deputies Berteaux and Gust Denuvo fought a duel with swords at Nevilly this morning; the latter was wounded in the forearm.

Hungarian Town Burned

Vienna, June 6.—Helling, Hungary, was totally destroyed by fire today, and seven were burned to death.

Special Session of the Cabinet

Washington, June 6.—A special cabinet meeting, called by the President for the purpose of discussing matters that have developed during his absence, began at 11 o'clock this morning. Secretary Shaw being the only absentee. It is expected that much time will be devoted to the postoffice scandals, and the government's position towards Russia with reference to the Kishineff horror. The cabinet adjourned at noon.

Mt. Pelee is Working Again

Paris, June 6.—The colonial office today received a dispatch from the governor of Martinique that Mt. Pelee is again in eruption, and dense clouds of smoke and ashes reach far out to sea.

Massacre was Averted

Vienna, June 6.—A dispatch received here today says a massacre of the Jews was barely averted at Bialystok and Grondo, in Russian Poland, last Saturday. The prime movers in stirring up the populace were prominent citizens.

St. Louis in the Wet

St. Louis, June 6.—Thousands are homeless today, and the river is now at 35 feet, showing more than a foot rise in the past day. It is now certain East St. Louis can't escape, as the flood is much worse than that of 1892. The railway yards north of the Eads bridge are now entirely submerged, and traffic is entirely suspended, except on the Vandalla line. The water supply of East St. Louis will be suspended today. Many have abandoned their homes. Happy Hollow has been swept by the flood, and the damage so far is assessed at \$1,000,000 to the railways alone.

Kansas City, June 6.—The river is two feet lower, and an immense force of men is cleaning the West bottoms today.

New England Still Burns

Bangor, Me., June 6.—Reports this morning show no diminution in the gravity of the forest fire situation. It is most serious from the vicinity of Caribou, where many camps and lumber mills have been destroyed, to Glens Falls. The fires in the Adirondacks are improving this morning, owing to the absence of wind.
