ADOPTS STEAMER SCHEME

Club Places an Able
Committee in
Charge

Of Project to Run an Independent Steamboat to
Bring Trade to
Salem

Mr. Hamilton of the Committee on
Steamboat made an extended statement
of the proposition of Captain
Skinner to build and operate a boat
twice a day between Salem and Independence.

Mr. Bredemeyer suggested if each
merchant paid a fare one way to people
who came to Salem to trade the boat
would be a success.

Mr. Patton was opposed to giving
a bonus to any enterprise, but favored
helping the scheme. He believed it
would be a good plan to get the boat
established as it would only be a few
years when the Salem and Falls River
railroad would be completed.

Mr. Thielson stated that when Mr.
Skinner ran a boat some years ago
he had three competing lines, and now
there was only one, and it looked to
him as if it were a good opening.
Surely the matter could be financed.

D. J. Fry thought the plan was a
good one, and was heartily in favor of
undertaking it. When the boat
ceased to run twice a day between Salem
and Independence the money
would come back to us. There was
not a better city to trade in than
Salem.

Mr. Stockton argued that anything
that brought more people and more
trade to Salem was desirable. Cheaper
lines of transportation would bring
more people and more business. He
had some experience with Capt. Skinner
and more with bonuses and did
not wish to express any opinion on
that subject.

Mr. Graham favored the plan and

said there would be no difficulty about
raising the \$1,200 if the club took hold
of it, but was opposed to taking
chances on any man who was not
practical and could give good assurances
of making regular trips.

Mayor Bishop wanted to know if
Capt. Skinner could run this boat if
the city would put up the money.
to put the boat in the river ready to
run. He was assured that Skinner
was competent to manage the boat,
but might not be just the man to construct it.

Mr. Fry asked if it would be possible
to get Mr. Skinner to build a boat and
pay him this in installments? He
favored getting Mr. Skinner to draw
plans and specifications and if they
proved satisfactory we could go ahead.

Mayor Bishop favored raising \$1,200
and paying Skinner \$25 a month for
four years, providing that he made
regular trips. If the trustees took a
mortgage some one else might raise
the mortgage and take the boat off on
some other run.

Mr. Hamilton closed the argument
by saying that there had been a falling
off of the retail trade from up the
river several years. It could only be
checked and got back by better facilities
to get to Salem. Let the boat
be built under the supervision of practical
steamboat men and if Captain
Skinner consents we will go ahead
and have the boat built and running
by August.

It was moved and seconded that
\$1,200 be raised providing the boat
be built under supervision of a practical
shipbuilder.

D. J. Fry and C. P. Bishop argued
in favor of a plan of paying Skinner
\$25 a month instead of the Hamilton
plan.

The motion was carried and the
chair appointed Messrs Hamilton,
Stockton and Graham
