WILL PLAY BALL

Injunction at Eugene Dissolved by Judge Hamilton

Several days ago residents in the west part of town began suit in equity for an injunction to restrain directors and officers of the Eugene Baseball Co. for ball games on Sundays at their grounds in that vicinity. The matter came up before Judge H. R. Kincaid, county judge, and the injunction was sustained pending action before Judge Hamilton in chambers at Roseburg, where the baseball company presented an answer. The case was taken up at once by the judge, and Thursday afternoon a message was received announcing that the injunction had been dissolved.

This is supposed to end the controversy, and the regular games will be pulled off here Saturday and Sunday between the Eugene and Albany teams. We understand that important changes have been made in the line-up of the Eugene team, and that the people are to see two rattling good games here when the Albany arrive to do us up.—Eugene Register.

Topeka, June 6.—Although no cause is assigned, the river has not fallen since midnight. No more corpses have been found up to noon, leaving the known list of dead standing at 39.

More of Machen.

Washington, June 6.—A new scandal is attached to the regime of A. W. Machen, ex-superintendent of the free delivery service. Thomas W. Gregor, his appointee as chief in charge of the supplies for the free delivery, has been arrested on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government. Mr. Gregor and his assistant, C. E. Upton, are alleged to have entered into an agreement with a Baltimore mail-pouch manufacturer to secure him a contract at 90 cents per sack, providing they were paid 40 cents. The deal is said to have netted them \$8000.

Ousted the Mayor.

Kansas City, Kan., June 6.—The supreme court at Topeka today ousted Mayor Craddock from office, installing the Republican contestant, Gilbert Craddock. Craddock has full charge of affairs in the flood emergency, and today is the head and front of everything, showing exceptional executive ability.
