The evening was devoted to a jubilee service, in commemorating the payment of the debt of the University.

General Odell had charge of the program, and introduced the following speakers: Dr. A. M. Fisher, Portland; Mr. Moore, Oregon City; Mayor C. P. Bishop, Prof. W. C. Hawley, Dr. Byrd, dean of the College of Medicine. All spoke of the bright future of the University, and the growth of the institution during the past year.

This evening, at the First M. E. church, occurs the graduating exercises of the College of Music. Class day was observed this afternoon, and refreshments served to about 150 invited guests. Tuesday the board of trustees meet to engage a faculty for another year—the annual meeting.

MORRIS WALKER DROWNED

Young Life Goes Out
in Cold Willamette
Waters

Could Not Swim and Got Be-
yond His Depth, Had Just
Graduated From
Normal School

Morris Walker, the 14-year-old son, and only child of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Walker, was drowned Sunday afternoon, about 2:30, just north of Gilbert & Patterson's island, in the backwater of the Willamette river.

Walker, with the two Mutch boys, aged 10 and 12, went swimming in the afternoon. None of the boys could swim, and so Walker, after disrobing, took a pole to measure the depth of the water; he found it not too deep, and told the other boys he intended to learn to swim. He struck out, but got into deep water, and went down. As he came up the second time he called for help, and the boys on the bank quickly passed him a pole, but he was too cold and weak to hold it, and went down the third time in 12 feet of water.

The boys ran for assistance, and Mr. Simms and Walter Lennon, of North Salem, responded. They managed to fish the body out with a pole, and carried it to a nearby house. The ambulance was called, and the remains carried to the boy's home on Front street. The coroner was called in, but he decided it was not necessary to hold an inquest, as the cause of death was plain.

Mrs. Walker, who is a widow, was working at Dallas during the carnival, and was notified at once. The poor woman is almost prostrated with grief.
