## HE BEATS OUR OWN HOMER

Cartoonist McCutcheon Gets \$59 for Each Sketch

Salary \$20,000 a Year, on Chicago Tribune and His Work to Draw One Cartoon a Day

James Keeley, who began work on the Chicago Tribune about twelve years ago as night police reporter, is now publisher of that newspaper, having graduated through the positions of night and city editor. He succeeded Will Van Bethuysen in the last named position when the latter went to the New York World five or six years ago.

One of Mr. Keeley's first moves after R. W. Patterson, the editor of the Tribune, had installed him in his new job, was to engage John T. McCutcheon, the Record-Herald's cartoonist, at a salary that makes one dizzy. It is reported that Cutch is to get \$20,000 a year on a three year's contract for one cartoon a day. Someone has figured that this is at the rate of \$59 a cartoon.

McCutcheon will draw his last cartoon for the Record-Herald for next Sunday's issue. Next week he starts on a three weeks automobile tour with George Ade in the latter's machine, the Little Whooping Cough. He will begin work on the Tribune on July 1st.

## CASTE IN OLD BOSTON

George Ade's Opinion of Back-Bay Exclusiveness

Bean-eaters Need to Get Out of Their Old Fashioned Village, and Get Modernized

George Ade of "Fables in Slang" and musical comedy fame, now making his first visit to Boston, had some thing to say about the Hub. He said:

"Except for historical interest there is not so much to Boston. Of course, it is well for us Westerners to come here; it is broadening and all that; but Boston people have more need to get West and look around than we have to broaden here. They need it more than we do."

"Unless a Boston man goes West about once a year his thoughts are very apt to congeal, so that he can't see out of Boston. The Boston man gets up in the morning and puts on the same coat. He goes out with the same friends; they eat the same kind of food; they all read the same kind of books, and then get to thinking about the same things. They get divided in to various strata, and they don't care about the people in the other layers."

"The difference in the looks of Boston and the Western cities shows even in the people. Even though a Bostonian is living a concentrated life in just one layer of the stratified population and moves around only in his own little circle he is correct in all he does."

"Out West a man doesn't worry much about correctness. He talks with everybody he meets because he knows them all. He dresses as he pleases because the others do the same, and he isn't afraid somebody will say he is not correct."

## A MOB GETS CRAZY

This However was Not Down in the Sunny South

Illinoisans Hang and Burn a Negro and Beat the Burning Body to a Jelly

Bellville, Ill., June 8.—W. T. Wyatt, a negro school teacher, was lynched here Saturday night for shooting and mortally wounding County Superintendent Charles Hertel, of St. Clair county. Hertel had refused to renew the teaching certificate of Wyatt and the negro came into his office and attacked him. Wyatt was immediately arrested and taken to jail. Two hours later a mob stormed the jail, secured the negro, and despite the appeals of the mayor and other officials he was hanged.

Superintendent Hertel was removed to the hospital, where the physicians probed for the bullet, but he stated there is no chance for his recovery.

A young man named Fielder was in the office when the shooting occurred. He grappled with Wyatt, but the negro beat him off with the butt of his revolver, inflicting a severe scalp wound. Before he was hanged, Wyatt asserted the shooting was the result of a political grudge.

The mob hanged Wyatt to a telephone pole in the public square. Even while his body was jerking in the throes of death from strangulation, members of the mob began building a fire at the foot of the pole. The flames flared up and licked at the feet of the victim, but this did not satisfy the mob, and another and larger fire was started. When it had been burning briskly the negro, still half alive, was cut down and after being covered with coal oil, he was thrust into the fire. Moans of pain were heard from the half dead victim of the mob, and these served to further infuriate his torturers. They fell upon him with clubs and knives and cut and beat the being almost to pieces, and not until every sign of life had departed did they desist and permit the flames to devour the body. As the fire lighted up the scene the members of the mob stood around the fire, hurling more fagots of wood into the flames and denouncing the negro for the shooting.

**A Ministers Mistake.**

A city minister was recently handed a notice to be read from his pulpit. Accompanying it was a clipping from a newspaper bearing upon the matter.
