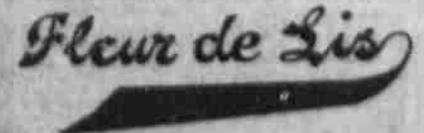

Rained Where It was Needed

Albany, N. Y., June 8.—Reports are
received here of an exceptionally heavy
rain last night in the Adirondacks,
thus checking, and, in many places,
extinguishing the forest fires.

Electrocuted This Morning

New York, June 8.—Flanagan, the
colored man who killed Keeper Mc-
Govern, of the West Side prison, and
for whom great endeavors have been
made to gain executive clemency, was
this morning electrocuted at Sing
Sing.

Damaged the Club House

Stockton, Cal., June 8.—The Stock-
ton Athletic Association club house,
including the gymnasium, hand ball
court, boat house and billiard rooms,
burned early this morning. Loss \$15-
600, including the damage to the club
house. The racing barges and shells
were saved, and the crew will con-
tinue training.

Insurgents Beat Turks

Vienna, June 8.—A dispatch from
Sofia says a courier has arrived there,
who reports fierce fighting between
the insurgents and Turkish troops on
the frontier at the villages of Zeargo
and Swegor. A full Turkish battalion
was engaged, but was compelled to
retreat. The insurgents used bombs
with deadly effect, destroying an en-
tire Turkish company.

White and Jett Trial Delayed

Jackson, Ky., June 8.—Last night
was another turbulent one, and many
shots were fired about the outer edge
of town. The juryman, who arrived
last night, were immediately given
bunks in the court house, where they
were guarded by soldiers. The anti-
Hargis faction claim the defense has
been favored in summoning the men to
serve. As usual, White and Jett
were brought into court this morning
heavily guarded by militiamen.

Ran Into a Big Storm.

Norfolk, Va., June 8.—The schoo-

er Vannam, bearing a party of distin-
guished scientists, bound for the
Bahamas on a two months' expedition,
was compelled to put in here today
from encountering a terrific storm off
the Carolinas. Supreme efforts were
required to escape foundering. They
will await better weather.

Paper Makers go on Strike

Holyoke, Mass., June 8.—Two thou-
sand paper makers struck this morn-
ing, demanding an increase of wages.
Twenty-eight mills are affected.

Certificates Irregular

San Francisco, June 8.—Eppinger's
creditors met at 34 o'clock this after-
noon. It is believed the warehouse
certificates were irregular, the discov-
ery of which caused the banks to
force payment.

Charged with Burglary

Chicago, June 8.—The walking dele-
gates of the waiters' union, who
called out the employees of the Chicago
Athletic Club and the department
store restaurants Saturday, were ar-
raigned in the police courts today
charged with burglary, and were re-
quired to furnish bonds for their ap-
pearance next week. Twenty more
restaurants have signed the scale.

No One Knows No One Cares

St. Paul, June 8.—Young continued
his arguments for the defense in the
State against the Northern Securities
this morning. He asserted the con-
solidation was for the best interests
of the Northern Pacific railway, as the
latter was threatened with being cri-
pled by stock manipulators, who
wanted to increase the value of the
Southern Pacific.

Yachts Ready, but no Wind.

Highland, N. Y., June 8.—The
yachts were ready to sail their trial
race this afternoon, but the weather
was unfavorable. At noon they came
up, but a few minutes later it was an-
nounced the race would be postponed.
The fog is still thick, and shows no
signs of drifting.

Bridge Out at Topeka.

Topeka, June 8.—The pontoon
bridge connecting South Topeka with
the flooded district of North Topeka
was carried out by the swift current
this morning.

Attempts were made to lower the
boats, but only one boat was got away,
and in that I and a few others got
escaped to the Blechamps. As the
us a great panic prevailed on board,
vessel sank bow first, the passengers
took refuge on the after deck, which
was covered by an awning. This, as
the Liban foundered, became a cage,
in which the passengers were caught
and dragged down beneath the
waters.

Many of the rescued were badly in-
jured in the collision. The Insularie
sustained considerable damage to her
bow, but managed to reach port safe-
ly. Thousands of persons gathered
around the morgue, ships and quays
throughout the evening. Thus far
only four bodies have been identified.

Aside from the loss of life, if such
a catastrophe shall occur, the prop-
erty loss will be heavy, as the entire val-
ley is under water, and homes have
been washed away, farms destroyed
and the stock drowned.

St. Louis, June 8.—Word has been
received here that at 1 o'clock a levee
near Madison, on which gangs of men
were working, gave way, and 15 men,
employees of the American Car &
Foundry Works, lost their lives.
About 150 men, it is reported, are im-
prisoned on a section of the levee, that
is slowly crumbling, and all means of
escape has been cut off.

Word has been sent to the St. Lo-
uis side to rush the private yacht
Annie Russell to the rescue. The An-
nie Russell started to Black Walnut
last evening, but could not force her
way against the current. It is feared
that she cannot make her way to Mad-
ison.

A steamer from St. Charles succeed-
ed in reaching Black Walnut tonight,
and the 200 imperilled people, terri-
fied and in great distress for food and
shelter, were taken from the island in
safety.

All railway connections between
here and Alton are cut off. The larger
boats are running, but the smaller
craft don't venture out into the river,
owing to the rush of driftwood and
debris.

The weather bureau, at 1 o'clock,
says the river gauge has reached its
highest point, 37 feet 6 inches, which,
it believes will be the crest of the
flood, and look for a fall tomorrow.
Up to 2 o'clock this morning nothing
has been heard from the relief steam-
ers sent to the tri-cities. Nothing is
certain regarding fatalities. The
number is variously estimated at from
nine to 20, not including the 15 re-
ported drowned at Granite City last
night. The latter were said to have
been strengthening the levee when the
break came.

Kansas Needs Aid.

Kansas City, June 8.—Citizens,
nearly all wage-workers, held a mass
meeting today and issued a call for
aid. There are 5200 homeless, and
the city treasury is depleted. The
town is submerged by water and mud.
The inhabitants are all in moderate
circumstances, and, so far, but \$70 of
outside aid have been received. The
mayor will acknowledge all contribu-
tions.
