Strawberry Shipping Market Holding up Very Well

The Salem Cannery Prepared to Handle a Very Large Pack this Year

Light mists have been falling, and the government forecast for Friday is showers and cooler Thursday night. Those conditions will make an extension of the strawberry season, and may make the crop of 1903 a profitable one. So far the growers have not got enough profit to pay for handling the land.

Cannery Has Begun Work.

The Salem cannery ran on strawberries Wednesday, and put up 100 cases. Mr. Holcomb expects as large and fine a pack as any year heretofore. The severe hot spell of last week cut off the crop about 25 per cent, but if the showers promised through the government forecast of fairs, materialize and give the soil a soaking there will be a good long season and a fine pack of berries.

The contracts between the Union and the cannery have all been signed up and closed, and only members of the Union will get the advantage of them, although the cannery expects to receive berries from all who bring them, and will pay fair prices, but fruit from the Union members, as per list furnished by the secretary of the organization, will be handled first.

Good Shipping Prices.

Manager Davis is getting \$2.50 per crate at Portland for fancy shipping berries, and this will net the grower about \$1.60 per crate. For the local market fancy berries are held by the Union at \$1.50 and choice at \$1.25.

About half the members of the Union have taken advantage of the shipping market, and the rest will make over their entire crop to the cannery, and save the expense of boxes and crates, getting 3 1/4 cents a pound for the crop ungraded.

All who have fine shipping berries, and will face them nicely, need not be afraid but that they will get a good, fair price for them, and can save themselves the trouble and annoyance of peddling them from house to house, which members of the Union are forbidden to do under their contract.

Sealed bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Shoes, Leather and Findings, Plumbing Supplies, Hardware, Flour, Oats and Mill Feed, Fish, Meats, etc., will be received at the office of the Superintendent of the State Penitentiary until Thursday, July 9th, 1903, at 3 o'clock p. m. at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200.00 in cash or certified check payable to the superintendent must accompany each bid for meat, and of \$75 for bids for flour and fish, all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of a bid.

On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the Penitentiary within 30 days after the contract is awarded, unless otherwise provided in contract.

Schedules of the various lines of goods will be furnished upon application to the Superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following completion of contract, and monthly on continuous contracts.

Samples must accompany bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Flour and all other articles where practicable.
