THAT DICK BILL

Places More Power in Hands of the President

May Call Out the Militia of any State Separately Taking Authority Possessed by Governor

An act to promote the efficiency of the Militia and for other purposes. Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, that the militia shall consist of every able-bodied male citizen of the respective states, territories, and the District of Columbia, and every able-bodied male of foreign birth who has declared his intention to become a citizen, who is more than eighteen and less than forty-five years of age, and shall be divided into two classes—the organized militia to be known as the national guard of the state, territory, or District of Columbia, or by such other designations as shall be given them by the laws of the respective states or territories, and the remainder shall be known as the reserve militia.

Section 1. The organization, armament, and discipline of the organized militia of the several states and territories, and in the District of Columbia shall be the same as that which is now or may hereafter be prescribed for the regular and volunteer armies of the United States, within five years of the date of the approval of this act. Sec. 2. That whenever the United States is invaded, or in danger of invasion from any foreign nation, or of rebellion against the authority of the Government of the United States or the president is unable with the force at his command to execute the laws of the Union in any part thereof, it shall be lawful for the president to call forth for a period not exceeding nine months, such number of the militia of the state, or of the states or territories or of the District of Columbia, as he may deem necessary to repel such invasion, suppress such rebellion or to enable him to execute such laws and to issue his order for the purpose to such officers of the militia as he may think proper.

Sec. 3. That whenever the president calls forth the militia of any state or territory or of the District of Columbia to be employed in the service of the United States, he may specify in his call the period for which such service is required, not exceeding nine months, and the militia so called shall continue to serve during the term so specified, unless sooner discharged by order of the president.

Sec. 4. That every officer and enlisted man of the militia, who shall be called forth in the manner hereinbefore described, and shall be found fit for military service, shall be mustered or accepted into the United States service by a duly authorized mustering officer of the United States; provided, however, that any officer or enlisted man of the militia who shall refuse or neglect to present himself to such mustering officer upon being called forth as herein described, shall be subject to trial by court-martial.

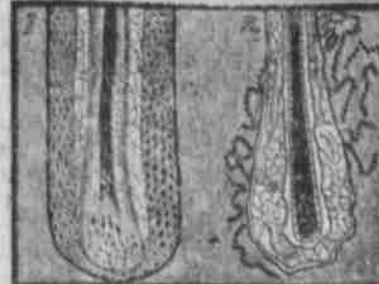
Sec. 5. That court-martial for the trial of officers or men of the militia when in the service of the United States shall be composed of militia officers only.

Sec. 6. That the militia, when called into the actual service of the United States, shall be subject to the same rules and articles of war as the regular troops of the United States.

Sec. 7. That the secretary of war is hereby authorized to issue, on the requisitions of the governors of the several states and territories, or of the commanding general of the militia of the District of Columbia, such number of the United States standard service magazine arms, with bayonets, bayonet scabbards, gun slings, belts and such other necessary accoutrements and equipments as are desired for the army of the United States and territories and District of Columbia.

To provide means for carrying into effect the provisions of this section, the necessary money, to cover the cost of exchanging or issuing the new arms, accoutrements, equipment, and ammunition to be exchanged or issued hereunder is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Sec. 8. This act shall take effect upon the date of its approval. Approved January 21, 1903.
