Indian War Veteran Pleased With Legislature

Cammas, Cows, Crickets and Grasshoppers in the Commissary and Clothing Decidedly Scant

Editor Journal. After a lapse of 48 years I am now able to thank the good taxpayers of Oregon, for the adjustment of my Indian war services rendered to the State of Oregon so many years ago, as best I could with scanty clothing, and without shoes, in a winter campaign on the trackless plains of Eastern Oregon and Washington, where nothing roamed save the wild Indian, and the night-howlng coyote. We made the campaign on half rations, or wholly without, only as we found an Indian cache of cammas or cows, with dried salmon and a mixture of dried crickets and grasshoppers which we tied to the pommels of our saddles to feast on as we rode over the windy desert hills before the greater part of our present population was born.

Let it ever stand to the credit of the Oregon legislature of 1903; the recognizing of those claims, and the keeping of promises for services faithfully and patriotically performed, whereby the fathers and mothers of this lovely land could rise in security with their families of little children.

No more deserving act has ever been passed by an Oregon legislature to whom we feel very kindly.

I again thank all those members of the legislature who nobly defended our just claim.

More than two-thirds of those pioneer defenders have gone to their graves; some of whom left young families in want, whose hearts and burdens might have been much relieved, had this relief come years ago.
