RULERSThe King a Degenerate  
and the Queen  
WorseHis Palace a Lazaretto, His  
Life a Round of Debauch-  
ery and His Death  
DeservedAlexander I., the late king of Serbia  
was born August 14, 1876, and suc-  
ceeded his father, King Milan I, upon  
his abdication, March 6, 1889. At that  
time Alexander was in his minority,  
so a regency was established to last  
until he should attain his eighteenth  
year. When but 17, however, he over-  
threw the regency and assumed the  
royal prerogative upon his own au-  
thority.The Constitution of the Kingdom of  
Serbia bears date of 1901, superseding  
those of 1869 and 1888. Under it the  
executive vests in the King and a  
Council of eight ministers. The legis-  
lative authority is shared by the  
King on one hand, and the senate and  
national assembly on the other. The  
senate is composed of 51 members,  
the majority of whom are appointed  
by the King and the assembly of 130  
deputies elected by the people.Of slight importance was an alleged  
attempt to reinstate the Karageorge-  
vitch dynasty, which, until the present  
revolution, has not been in power  
since 1858, when Serbia was taken  
under protection of the European  
powers. It was immediately sup-  
pressed, the leader having been killed.  
Prince Alexis Karageorgevitch, the  
direct descendant of that line, denied  
that he was a party to the ill-fated  
attempt.In 1901 several important changes  
were made in the Constitution, by de-  
cree of the King, which resulted in  
several small revolts on the part of  
the subjects. By the new Constitution  
the power of the king was increased  
in many points and more clearly de-  
fined in others. A system of a two-  
chamber legislature was constituted,  
the lower house to be elective, the  
upper to be composed of 30 appointive  
and 18 elective members, to be con-  
trolled by the King, who maintains  
a certain right to veto over the lower  
house. The throne was made heredi-  
tary through the female as well as the  
male line. The King's right of decree  
was much curtailed. There seemed  
to be an attempt to secure a more  
complete balance of power before the  
executive and legislative branches  
than that existing under the old Con-  
stitution.

## A Strenuous Love.

Military service in Serbia is compul-  
sory from the age of 21 years, and  
when fully mobilized the army con-  
sists of about 110,245 men, formed in  
five divisions. Outside of the division  
formation are a brigade of special  
troops, field artillery and engineer's  
corps. The state possesses but one  
steamer, which is used exclusively for  
military purposes.Intermittent quarrels between King  
Alexander and Queen Draga occupied  
the attention of the royal family and  
mobility of Serbia during the past  
year."The small but restless state of  
Serbia obtained its independence from  
Turkey early in the nineteenth  
century, under the leadership of a  
nameless peasant. Because of his  
swarthy complexion and raven hair  
they called him Kara George, which  
means "Black George," and Kara-  
georgevitch is the name of his de-  
scendants. Milosh, a companion of  
Kara George in the fight for liberty,  
was a farm servant of a widow named  
Obren, whose name he adopted when  
he needed one, and Obrenovitch is the  
family name of the present King.  
The feud between the two families  
began in 1817, when a Turkish pasha  
hired Milosh to assassinate his friend  
as he slept, and the history of Serbia  
has since been a continuous duel be-  
tween their descendants, encouraged  
by Turkey and Russia, which have  
been contending for the control of the  
Balkan Peninsula.The late King Alexander, a repu-  
sive degenerate, and his queen, Draga,  
were boycotted by all the courts of  
Europe because of their immorality.  
The Karageorgevitch family have  
been in exile, Peter, the head of the  
house, being engaged in scientific  
pursuits in Switzerland. King Alex-  
ander looked as if he had "escaped  
from an asylum for the depraved, but  
had a vigorous constitution, and on  
occasion showed great nerve and power  
of command.Inherited all the Vices.  
Unfortunately he inherited all the  
vices of his father, the late King Milan,who was the worst ruler Europe has  
seen for a generation. While getting  
his education in Paris Milan acquired  
habits which unfitted him for the  
responsibility of governing a primitive  
and restless people like the Servians.  
He squandered the public money and  
lost his private fortune at cards, and  
his wife, Natalie Kesko, daughter of  
a colonel in the Russian army, was  
compelled to leave him and finally ob-  
tained a divorce. The scandals of the  
Serbian court furnished gossip for all  
Europe, until finally, enervated by dis-  
ipation and despised by all his sub-  
jects, Milan abdicated in favor of his  
son, Alexander, and went to Vienna to  
die.Alexander was a precocious prince,  
and when only fifteen years old fell  
under the fascination of Madame  
Draga Maschin, who had been a lady  
in waiting to his mother and was  
about ten years older than he. She  
was an ambitious, brilliant woman,  
gifted with considerable beauty and a  
charming manner. Madame Draga  
had more influence with the King than  
his parents, the ministry, and the  
court, and when he was seventeen  
persuaded him to marry her and as-  
sume the reins of government. From  
that time until now the Serbian court  
has been the scene of a series of sen-  
sations.

## Servia a Rich Land.

Servia is reached by railroad  
through Hungary across a country  
that looks very much like Kansas and  
Nebraska. Servia is called a poor-  
man's paradise, because the soil, cli-  
mate, and other conditions are favor-  
able to people of small means.  
Eighty-seven per cent of the 2,400,000  
inhabitants are engaged in farming,  
and there is no country in which the  
land is so equally distributed, for  
there is one farm to every eight in-  
habitants. Fruit culture is the largest  
source of profit. Flocks and herds are  
large and multiply rapidly, and the  
people are always prosperous except  
when a war or a revolution is on.Belgrade, the capital, lies upon a  
promontory where the river Save joins  
the Danube. The modern part of the  
town is quite attractive; the ancient  
part built centuries ago, during the  
Turkish domination, is picturesque.  
The modern streets are wide and lined  
with fine buildings after the Austrian  
style of architecture. Some of the  
school buildings are excellent samples  
of modern construction and show an  
educational enterprise that is credit-  
able to the country. There is a com-  
pulsory education law, free schools  
and free books; a number of acad-  
emies, schools of commerce, agriculture  
and fruit culture, and a university  
with four hundred students. The gov-  
ernment supports a museum, an art  
gallery, and a theater for the en-  
couragement and education of native  
dramatists and opera writers. There  
are no paupers in Servia, and there-  
fore no almshouses, but there is a free  
hospital for both military and civilian  
patients, which is well kept up.

HAS BIG  
CLEAN UPBonanza, Above, is  
Turning out Very  
RichWill Yield \$200,000 for  
the Season -- Yukon  
Native Sons to  
CelebrateT. M. Collins, who is down from  
White Horse, on the Yukon river, has  
been stationed there since the going  
out of the ice on the river and the  
breakup and blockading of the ice  
on Lake Lebarq interrupted traffic  
some weeks ago. He reports much  
mail having been brought around the  
ice on the lake by dragging the canoes  
along the shores, and putting the  
boats again into the water wherever  
it was clear. Mail communication has  
been established, and many passen-  
gers from Dawson are making their  
way out in the same manner. Mr. Col-  
lins has been in close communication  
with his people in the interior. He  
says:"The bars at the head of Lake Le-  
barq never showed up so plainly as  
this season, and even were the ice out  
of the lake, I doubt if the lightest  
draught of steamers could get through  
until the water shall have deepened  
several feet. The mail and passenger  
canoes are having to pick a way for  
themselves with poles, and even then  
it is a day's job to get through from  
the lake into Fifty Mile river, and so  
on to the end of the railroad.Upper Bonanza Rich.  
"The story is verified beyond dis-  
pute that \$50,000 was a single day's  
clean-up this spring on No. 28, above  
on Bonanza. The claim has been  
worked this winter by four laymen,  
and is owned by the N. A. T. & T.  
company. It is estimated the dumps  
will yield \$200,000 of which the four  
laymen will clear for themselves \$75,  
000. A single clean-up a few days pre-  
vious was \$43,000."The last mail out as I came away  
was nearly five days in getting across  
the Yukon river at Yukon crossing, the  
ice never clearing sufficiently in all  
time to warrant taking the chances  
with the Royal mail."Children born in the Klondikes are  
becoming so plentiful it had been ar-  
ranged for a reunion of native sons  
on the 29th of May. The affair was  
billed for the Methodist church, and  
the citizens had undertaken that the  
youngsters should have cause to re-  
member the occasion.

## Graphite in the Klondikes.

"The officials down there have been  
experimenting with a wife law. They  
enacted a three-inch law on the  
21st, and by the next day every bit of  
business in the territory was at a  
stand-still, for the number of wide-  
tire wagons at hand is but a drop in  
the bucket. On the 22d the council  
promptly met and undid what it had  
seemingly done the day previously."An appropriation has been made by  
the government to establish a free as-  
say office for the miners of the White-  
horse district."A four-foot ledge of graphite has  
been uncovered in Lovett gulch which  
comes in to Bonanza at eighty below  
discovery. The claim strangely lies  
in the famous White Channel, and was  
found on the Carpenter and London  
benches. The graphite was at first  
thought to be coal, but after trying to  
burn it, the stuff was thought worth-  
less until its real nature was revealed.  
Even today, because of the little need  
there for the stuff, it is not being  
worked."
