

SALEM WINS A GAME

Puts the Roseburg Boys to the Bad Sunday

Ross Again in the Pitchers Box and Does His Usual Good Work

Roseburg, June 14.—Eleven innings were required to decide the baseball game of the Roseburg and Salem teams of the Willamette Valley League on the Roseburg grounds Saturday. The final score stood Roseburg 18, Salem 16. In the first three innings the Raglans piled up 12 runs to but four for the home team. Then the running was reversed, and in the fourth Roseburg took five to one for the visitors. It was then that real ball playing began, and neither side scored again until the eighth, when the locals took five more. In the ninth Salem gained one, and tied the score at 14 to 14. The tenth was fruitless on either side, but in the eleventh the locals "got busy" and took four more. As the visitors could score but two, defeat became their lot.

It was an exciting game, although at several times the pitchers on both sides were batted heavily, and many runs were recorded.

The Battle Sunday.

For Sunday's game the line-up of each team was somewhat rearranged, Sam Morris having arrived to take his place in the box for the Raglans, and Bradley took up his usual Sunday stunt for the locals in the same position.

The largest crowd of the season was present, and they were not disappointed in seeing the choicest article of baseball ever put up here, as the final score, Salem 5, Roseburg 2, plainly testified. Morris was at his best, and, backed by a determination to retrieve, if possible, some lost ground, after three straight defeats at the hands of the Roseburg gladiators, he pitched the game of his life. While he was "found" a number of times, but three safe hits were recorded. He was supported by good team work. The visitors were also in good batting form, but in the entire game only five lived to reach the home plate.

For the home team this was Pitcher Bradley's off-day. While the safe hits recorded against him were rare, yet five men were allowed to "walk." He made the lightest record for "fans" of any game he has pitched this season. Throughout the locals seemed somewhat listless, yet the visitors had strenuous work right along to keep the balance in their favor. The first score was made by the locals in the second inning. This was tied by the Raglans in the third. Then neither brought in a man until the sixth, when Davis scored for the visitors and was followed by Patterson, who planted the ball over the right field fence, and took a saunter all the way around. In the seventh and eighth the visitors made good on one each, while the locals made no gains. In the ninth the home team shook off their lethargy enough to score just one more man, and the game was over with a score of Salem 5, Roseburg 2. This leaves the two teams in the same relative position as they were a week ago, with Roseburg still at the head of the league column.

SENATOR CROISAN NAMED

For School Director at Meeting Saturday Night

The Election Held Today and a Very Small Vote Cast

A well-attended meeting Saturday night nominated Hon. E. M. Croisan for school director, to succeed Hon. M. L. Chamberlain, who retires after a faithful service of five years, on account of poor health.

A ballot was taken and Croisan received 15 votes, J. W. Young 8, E. Hofer 1. Mr. Hofer declined, saying he would not accept a nomination for any office whatever when his name was presented, he having nominated Mr. Young.

W. L. Staley had placed W. T. Slater in nomination, but, on suggestion of Mr. Ford, his law partner, it was withdrawn, as Mr. Slater declined to become a candidate.

The nomination of Mr. Croisan was made unanimous. There were about 40 present, including Judge Boise, Tilton Ford, J. N. Brown, Wm. Brown, Frank Waters, Nick Haas, A. R. Prescott, J. H. McNary, Geo. J. Pearce, R. P. Boise, Jr., H. A. Johnson, R. J. Fleming and other representative business men and taxpayers.

The election is being held today, from 1 to 4 o'clock, and only a light vote is being cast.

School Board Met.

The Board of Education met on Saturday evening and heard the annual report read. It showed that in the past two years \$22,500 of the floating debt had been cancelled in the form of popular loans drawing four per cent interest, leaving \$9500 still outstanding.

The district is now on a cash basis, has money enough in sight to run the schools for the coming year, and probably wipe out the balance of the debt. Two rooms in the Park school will be finished, completing that building.

At the Saturday night nomination meeting a resolution was adopted endorsing the good work of the board of education for progress in the public schools and for their able and economical management of the finances of the district.

APPEAL FROM DIVORCE

Lesia's Lawyers Will Keep Wife From Testifying

To prevent the divorced wife of Martin V. Lesia from testifying against him at his trial for the murder of her father, F. H. Drews, Lesia's attorneys says he will appeal to the supreme court from the decree of divorce, granted to Mrs. Lesia several weeks ago. The statutes allows six months for an appeal, so there is yet plenty of time. The criminal code provides that a wife cannot testify against her husband, or a husband against his wife, in a criminal action, without the consent of either, as the case may be, except that a wife may testify against her husband if he beats her.

The attorney for Lesia thinks if he appeals from the divorce decree the court will be compelled to rule that Mrs. Lesia still occupies the legal status of a wife, and cannot be heard against her husband. Mrs. Lesia says she saw Lesia shoot and kill her father, and, if her testimony should be excluded, its absence might assist the defendant materially. The trial will occur soon.
