FINEST FRUIT IS COMING

Rains Making Great
Local Pressure
for Fruit

Fair Weather Probable
for the Latter
Part of the
Week

The soaking rains are giving a grand addition to the small fruit crop, and the season will be extended for nearly a month. The finest strawberries of the season were shipped to Portland Monday night, great Magoons that went nine to the square on the top of the boxes, and Paris that went the same. The finest Wilsons go sixteen to one on the top layer, and some other varieties are equally as good. The first berries from the hill lands about Liberty are coming into market, and are very fine and solid.

More Rain Coming.
The official forecast for Wednesday is more showers, and then the weather is to be warmer. The last days of the week are liable to be clear, and an immense crop of berries will come off. It is believed best for all fruit crops that the rains come now, and that they will stimulate growth, and a heavier crop of cherries will be prepared than if dry weather had continued. More rains may crack some of the early cherries, but will more than make up the loss by a bigger crop of the later varieties.

The Local Market.
The finest berries brought \$1.50 a crate today readily at the Union warehouse and second grades \$1.00 to \$1.25. Many of the growers have not yet learned to face the berries prop-

erly in the boxes, and are not getting near as much value out of them as if they were put up in a more attractive manner. The cheap berries that are improperly packed help keep down prices, and this cannot be overcome until all the members of the Union have mastered the technical details of putting up a fancy pack. Next year the Union should handle nothing but fruit that is put up for the fancy shipping market, if it wants to get the highest prices.

Watch the Weather.
Fruit growers will have to watch the weather, and pick between showers, to get the best results. Fruit for shipment cannot be picked wet. It must be picked dry and brought under cover in the field to be faced for markets. Two hands can face what five will pick. A tent or packing shed should be put up in the field for this purpose, with plenty of table room to handle lots to the best advantage.

Ione, Or., June 16.—For over an hour last night there was not a living soul in Ione. A fearful electric storm broke over the village at 5:30, and the inhabitants took to the hills. In fear of a repetition of Sunday night's catastrophe, it seemed all the pent-up fury had broken loose, and death stalked on every side. Four, five and six streaks of lightning were flashing at once. The water in torrents fell on unprotected women and children, while the fiery fluid played tattoo on the high peaks of basalt to the north, south and east. Every gully was a rushing torrent in a few seconds, and the streets of the town were covered with water, and to within a few inches of the marks of the flood Sunday night.

Morrow Lost Heavily.

COURT IS AT WORK

Mary A. Wolf Gets a Divorce
and the Children

A 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon Judge R. P. Boise held a short session of the equity department of the circuit court for Marion county. The divorce case of Mary A. Wolf vs. G. W. Wolf was called up and put through in short order. The evidence showed that defendant had deserted plaintiff one year ago last February, and left her three minor children to support, and, after hearing the testimony the court granted the relief prayed for and awarding the custody of the children to plaintiff.

In the case of Timmon Ford, as executor of the estate of Wm. Cosper, deceased, plaintiff, vs. A. T. Gilbert, et al., defendants, Judge Boise made an order authorizing and directing Claud Gatch to pay a 10 per cent dividend to the creditors out of the funds on hand, the total amount of which is \$10,943.

The court overruled the demurrer to the complaint in the case wherein W. R. Townsend is the plaintiff, and Andrew Nelson, et al., the defendants. The defendants were allowed ten days in which to file an answer to the complaint. This is the suit brought to quiet title to certain church property in Monitor.

In the divorce case of J. L. Hamilton vs. Esther Hamilton, the court made an order requiring the plaintiff to pay into the court the sum of \$75, within 50 days from the date of the order, for the use of the defendant in defending this suit.
