SALEM COUNCIL MEETS

Orders Some Walks Reduced to Grade

Will Elect a Health Board Next Session--New Bicycle Ordinance Read and Referred

The city council met in regular session last evening, all members being present. Mayor Bishop in the chair. Previous minutes were duly read and approved.

Street Commissioner Griswold reported that the cannery company wished to build a new sidewalk alongside their public scales, to be six feet wide, about 15 feet from the building. Mr. Pohle reported in favor of the request. Mr. Hubbard objected, while Mr. Stolz spoke in favor of thus accommodating a manufacturing enterprise. He moved that the matter be referred to the street committee and the commissioner, with power to act. Carried.

Mr. Griswold asked that the worn out walks on State street, between Commercial and Front be reduced to grade, and ordered built of cement. Also referred. He next called attention to the fact that the bakery on the alley back of the R. M. Wade hardware store, is using that alley as a wood yard. Mr. Stolz spoke about many similar abuses, and urged that an ordinance should be passed regulating such matters. He moved reference on the committee on ordinances. Passed.

W. C. Tillson appeared in the interest of establishing a prune packing plant in the old Stolz warehouse, and asked that a bridge be built across the race. He also asked permission to construct a switch from the S. P. freight depot track from Cottage street to the warehouse. Referred to street committee with power to act.

Mr. Stolz asked permission for F. S. Campbell to address the council, who asked to place six gallons of disinfectant in the city jail, to be tested for 60 days, and upon proof of its utility to sell the same to the city for \$12. Upon motion the offer was accepted. He also offered the city the use of several toilet paper holders free of charge, provided the city purchase a case of paper, costing \$10, of 80,000 sheets. After great deliberation this matter was dropped without action.

A resolution was introduced to the effect that a special election be called, as provided for by the new charter, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the city the matter of issuing bonds to pay for and redeem the \$30,000 bridge bonds issued on October 1, 1886, and which matured

Mr. Sims brought up the matter of the opening of East Court street, and stated that the property owners had failed to raise any fund for such work, and moved indefinite postponement. Adopted.

A liquor license was, upon motion, granted to Bach & Nadstancik. Felix LeBlanche asked for renewal of license. Referred.

Mr. Hubbard moved that the city pay \$19.50 in favor of the fire chief to pay for lockers.

The ladies of the Marion Square Improvement League asked that the city proceed to light the new band stand, as previously agreed. Mr. Burrows moved reference to the committee on health and police. Carried.

A petition signed by J. C. Goodale, Jr., and 13 others, asking for a fire cistern in the Yew Park school house. Referred to committee on fire and water, to report with estimates.

An ordinance renewing and extending the present city lighting contract for five years was read the first and second times. Referred.

The new bicycle ordinance was next read first and second times. Referred. Labor bills authorized by the street commissioner were referred to the committee on accounts and current expenses.

Messrs. Bach & Nadstancik asked for permission to erect a washstand of corrugated iron at the rear of their place of business. Mr. Burrows, who owns the building, moved that the matter be referred to the committee on fire and water and the fire chief, with power to act. Carried.

Upon motion the committee on fire and water was authorized to purchase 25 cords of wood at \$2.50 per cord.

Upon motion of G. Stolz it was agreed to take up the matter of electing a health board at the next regular session.

With the consent of Ladd & Bush, the bondsmen, Jos. Baumgartner was elected temporary city treasurer, to serve during the absence of John Moir.

Morgan Comes Home

Liverpool, June 17.—Morgan sailed for America on the Oceanic this evening. Ismay, Wilding and Dawkins are also aboard, coming to New York to attend a conference of the shipping trust.

Amendment Was Killed

London, June 17.—Redmond's amendment to the Irish land bill was lost this afternoon by a vote of 217 to 175. This defeat is likely to cause a long delay in its passage, and may cause its final rejection.

Gunboat Rescued Him

Washington, June 17.—McWade, at Canton, cables the state department today that the American who a few days ago was captured and held for ransom by pirates, has been rescued by the gunboat Callao, and returned to Canton.

Berry Did Not Shoot

St. Francis, June 17.—In the trial of Dewey this morning, three witnesses were examined, and the fact was established that the revolver of Birchard Berry was in its holster when the body was found, the chambers all loaded, and the barrel showing no appearance of recent firing.

High Mason Suicides.

Independence, Mo., June 17.—David Wallace, past grand master of the grand lodge of Masons, of Missouri, a Democratic politician of national standing, and deputy surveyor of customs, at Kansas City, committed suicide at his home today with a revolver. The cause is unknown.

Sultan Warns King's Widow.

London, June 17.—A dispatch from Constantinople reports the Sultan has warned the mother of Milan, son of the late King Milan, of Serbia, to guard her son. It is thought there may be a plot to murder young Milan, so as to completely clear the title to the Serbian throne.

Families Are Homeless.

Kansas City, June 17.—Four thousand families in Kansas City remain homeless, and subsist on charity. There is a \$60,000 relief fund on hand, which, according to Mayor Gilbert, is only a fourth of what is needed. In Armourdale only four streets are passable, and scores of unclaimed houses block the main thoroughfares. At Argentine there is no water supply, and the relief fund is exhausted.

Hristow's Report.

Washington, June 17.—The copying of Hristow's report on the postoffice investigation is complete. It fills 50 pages of solid typewritten matter, and will be given to the newspapers for publication Thursday morning. Payne declined to discuss it, but it is understood that many of Tulloch's allegations against the administration of a former postmaster-general are sustained.

Discovers a New Metal.

London, June 17.—The Echo announces that Meillard, the discoverer of a method for soldering aluminium, has now discovered a new metal, which he has called seltum, which is light, strong, workable and uncorrodible. Its production is exceedingly cheap from matter heretofore supposed to be worthless. These worthless things will yet revolutionize the metal industries.

A Relief Train Is Wrecked

Mayor Carter, over \$800 was raised for the relief of Heppner. A committee, composed of Mayor Carter, E. P. McDaniel, Fred Mellis, A. T. Harris and E. A. McDaniel were named to take charge of the funds subscribed, and direct the relief expedition sent from here. A large number volunteered to go tonight. E. A. McDaniel was selected to head the relief expedition from here. It left on the evening train.

At a meeting of the city council tonight \$500 was raised for the Heppner flood sufferers. The county court will appropriate about as much. The citizens raised \$700, the Elks \$200, the Knights of Pythias \$100, and the citizens' committee will work tomorrow. About 50 men from Sumpter, with tools, left here tonight for Heppner, the O. R. & N. furnishing free transportation.

Funds from Oregon City.

Oregon City, Or., June 17.—Bruce C. Curry, city recorder, today circulated a subscription paper and raised over \$200 for the relief of the Heppner sufferers. It was first proposed to abandon the Fourth of July celebration, and appropriate the fund that had been raised for the demonstration to the relief of the Heppner people. Subscribers very generally agreed to such a transfer of the fund, but it developed that the arrangements for the Independence day celebration had progressed too far. Following this conclusion, an independent subscription was started, with the success noted above.

Queer Freak of the Flood.

For a distance of 10 miles along the valley a great number of fruit jars, spilled from the wreckage of some doomed house, had been carried unbroken. Although the metal tops were screwed down tightly on the rubber bands the jars, evidently empty when they started on their voyage, were found in every instance to contain about half a pint of muddy water. How the water could possibly have entered the sealed jars, and by what fortuitous circumstances the fragile glass escaped injury in a watery tempest which tore trees from their roots, wrecked large residences and snapped and bent steel bars like putty, is not readily explained.

It is quite certain that a large percentage of bottles carried beyond Heppner will never be recovered.

Normal Graduates Tonight.

At the Grand Opera House tonight will take place the graduating exercises of the Northwest Normal College of Music and Art, of which Z. M. Parvin is director. There will be nine graduates, and it goes without saying a very fine program. There will be a battery of three grand pianos and an upright, and street cars will run in all directions at 11 p. m.
