Murderer Hardee Killed by Sheriff's Posse

Posseman Killed, and Mob Lynches Murderer's Partner Jack Brown

Missoula, Mont., June 19.—A battle took place at Lands Monday between Sheriff Hardee, the condemned murderer who escaped jail here several weeks ago, after killing one guard and seriously wounding two others and the sheriff's posse, which overtook and killed Hardee. McKinney, Hardee's companion, escaped. One posseman was killed. The news reached here last night. A mob formed and entered the jail, where another companion of Hardee, Jack Brown, was incarcerated, took Brown from his cell and hanged him to the window of the court house.

King Peter Starts Monday.
Geneva, Switzerland, June 19.—It is definitely decided that Kara Georgevitch will leave here for Belgrade Monday.

Their Tears Lie Deep.
St. Petersburg, June 19.—The Russian court has gone into mourning for a period of 24 days for the Serbian victims.

Sisters Go to Vienna.
Belgrade, June 19.—The three sisters of the murdered queen departed from here this morning for Vienna. They traveled in a second-class compartment and shed tears copiously.

Army Officers Promoted.
Washington, June 19.—President Roosevelt today detailed Young to be chief of the general staff of the army. In the rank of lieutenant-general, after August 15th, also Corbin, adjutant-general, and Caster will become members of the general staff. Young is relieved as president of the war college, and is succeeded by General Bliss.

WILL KEEP WORD

Striking Miners Must Fulfill Their Contract

Mitchell Threatens to Import Union Labor to Take Their Places if They Don't

Indianapolis, June 19.—Mitchell this morning dispatched District President Doyle, of the Linton district, to the mines of the Big Island Company, at Linton, with an order for 300 striking miners there to return to work at noon today. The men struck because the foreman, who was popular with them, disobeyed orders, and was discharged. The coal company holds a contract with the miners' organization. Mitchell declares that if the men don't return to work at noon, which they declare positively at Linton they will not do, he will import union miners to carry out the union's agreement with the coal company. Mitchell has determined to set a precedent to have all contracts rigidly fulfilled. He says there are too many foolish strikes lately.

Arnold is Arrested.
St. Louis, June 19.—Arnold, who is under indictment for the operation of get-rich-quick schemes, surrendered to the authorities this morning. He came to the Four Courts accompanied by his wife and attorney, and efforts are being made to give bonds.

Trainmen Killed.
Des Moines, Ia., June 19.—Four trainmen were killed and a postal clerk seriously injured in a head-end collision on the Illinois Central, between a passenger and freight near Raymond early this morning.

The postal clerk is dead, and three unidentified tramps, and one unidentified emigrant were also killed, making a total of nine deaths. Two tramps were seriously injured. The two forward cars of the passenger train telescoped. The wreck was caused by a misunderstanding of orders.

John the Baptist Crazy.
Winnipeg, June 19.—John the Baptist, the leader of that faction of the Doukhobors who refuse to wear clothing, was taken by the mounted police to the asylum at Brandon, heavily manacled.

Yachts Race Today.
Sippen Point, N. Y., June 19.—The Reliance, Columbia and Constitution started on a 25-mile race at 12:45 in a breeze of four knots.

RUMORS FROM TURKEY

One Report Says the Sultan Has Abdicated

Arabia is in Arms Over Excessive Taxation and the Governor has Been Seized

Constantinople, June 19.—Stories indicate great tension. Saturday's Tageblatt story of the Alban troops riding into and fighting in the courtyard of the Sultan's palace, coupled with Tuesday's dispatches of the uprising in Arabia, due to excessive taxation, and the seizure of the governor, all tend to confirm the predictions that an uprising is either on, or is imminent. It is generally believed here, however, that Belgrade is so impregnated with the revolutionary spirit that any advances from there relative to Turkish or other insurrections are likely to enlarge upon the situation. Further news is being awaited here with anxiety by the colony.

Belgrade, June 19.—Telegrams received here from Constantinople say a revolution has broken out in Turkey and it is reported that the Sultan has abdicated.

London, June 19.—Reports from Belgrade of the Turkish revolution and the Sultan's abdication can't be confirmed in diplomatic circles here. An official, just arrived from Turkey, says he doubts if the revolutionary movement is so far advanced, though he believes such a step cannot long be delayed. There is no question among the officials but that an unsatisfactory state of affairs exists, but, on account of the rigid censorship enforced by the Sultan, but little real news is permitted to reach the outside world. The Turkish ambassador discredits the Belgrade story of an uprising, and says he received news at midnight from Constantinople, and there was no trouble then.

Steamships Unemployed.
London, June 19.—The Westminster Gazette today publishes a dispatch from Liverpool showing there is much idleness in the Morgan ship combine at present, six vessels of the Leyland line being tied up. The Atlantic transport line is contemplating putting three ships out of commission. The latter company's intermediate service between New York and Southampton was discontinued today. Morgan, before sailing for America, promised to investigate the methods of the shipping trust's officers.

Japan Demands Open Ports.
London, June 19.—A dispatch from Yokohama today says the Japanese minister at Peking has filed a formal demand on the Chinese foreign office that the ports of Tai Tung and Mukden be opened to foreign trade. The American and British ministers at the Chinese capital supported Japan's demands, but the Chinese officials replied that they were unable to accede.

What Heppner Needs.
Heppner, June 19.—At least \$50,000 will be required to relieve the distress here, bury the dead, tear away the wreckage and care for helpless women and children. One of the gravest problems is to restore sanitary conditions. Additional bodies are constantly being found. Solid masses of ball stones in immense blocks were found this morning.

Two Killed in Kansas.
Atchison, Kan., June 19.—Following the killing of Bairch, the saloonist, early this morning by McKim, the latter was mortally wounded by two policemen, who also inflicted three serious wounds on McKim's alleged partner, in the attempted robbery.

The Pope Has a Relapse.
Rome, June 19.—The Pope had a slight relapse last night, and Laponi was hurriedly summoned. He is better this morning, and Laponi says he is sure His Holiness will be able to attend the consistory.

A Strange Union.
San Francisco, June 19.—The spiritualists' union, formed today, includes clairvoyants, clairaudients, inspirational mediums and magnetic healers.

CRUISERS ARE IN SOAK

Uncle Sam's Ships Attached by Sheriff

No Truth in the Rumor that a Warship Would be Sent to Recover Them

Washington, June 19.—Secretary Moody was officially informed this morning that the cruiser Chattanooga, nearly completed by the United States Shipbuilding Co., has been taken possession of by the sheriff of Elizabethport, New Jersey, awaiting the decision of the state court as to whether a ship is an asset of the shipbuilding trust. This information, coming with the trouble about the cruiser Galveston, which a Virginia court ordered seized at the Trigg shipyards, at Richmond, is causing concern to the navy department. Today's cabinet meeting was devoted to a discussion of the Galveston case.

Knox presented an opinion, in which he believes the secretary of the treasury will be able to enter into a stipulation that will result in the discharge of the cruiser from the custody of the Virginia courts, and a continuance of the work, and the prompt payment of all contractors' and laborers' claims. He closes the proposition to seize the ships by federal force, saying: "I am loath to believe the occasion of such exertion of federal power will arise, being confident any claim to interfere with national rights, under the judicial authority of the state of Virginia will be promptly disposed of and denied by the chancery court. For this reason I shall defer answering that question." It is emphatically denied at the navy department that there is any intention of sending a gunboat up the James river to seize the Galveston, and prevent work being stopped.

They Refuse To Agree

Jackson, Ky., June 19.—The jury in the Jett-White case disagreed. At 8 o'clock this morning the jury notified Judge Redwine that they couldn't agree. The judge sent them back, and told them a verdict was possible. At 8:30 the jury again notified the judge that there was no prospect of an agreement. Judge Redwine then told them to take till Saturday, if necessary.

At 9:15 the foreman returned to the court room and told Judge Redwine that time would do no good, as it was impossible to reach a verdict. The judge then discharged the jury. The jury stood seven for conviction to five for acquittal in the White case, and eleven for conviction and one for acquittal in the Jett case. The trial of Jett, for the murder of Jim Cockerill, will now be called, and it may be postponed until the trials of the Marcus murder are disposed of. It is said that Judge Redwine has agreed to send the trials to Knox county in case of failure to secure a verdict. Governor Brockham says that he will ask that the prisoners be brought to Winchester for safe keeping until the trial is fixed for some other county and that soldiers be sent to preserve order until the next trials.

After discharging the jury Judge Redwine ordered the cases of Jett and White transferred to Harrison county for trial, and directed the elisor to keep a force of militia, and remove the prisoners to Lexington by train, where they will be kept until their cases are called. But one company of militia accompanied the prisoners, as the greater number are remaining on guard here. Fitzpatrick, the man who hung the jury is connected with the Hargis faction through his father-in-law. Ewen was making secret preparations to leave Lexington. He has nearly \$2000 collected for him by citizens of the state. He rented a house for his family this morning, and says he will testify before any court, but wants the state to furnish a military guard when he does.

New York, June 19.—The United States Steel Corporation announced that it fixes the price of steel rails for the coming year at \$23 per ton, the same as last year.
