PIONEERS MEET IN PORTLAND

All Oregon Does Honor to the Pathfinders

A Brave and Self-reliant Class-Type of America's Best Manhood Passing Away

The pioneers met in Portland Wednesday, and they had a royal good time. The Journal takes pride in honoring the old-timers, and rejoices with them in their reunions. It would have devoted considerable space yesterday to their meeting, but the awful catastrophe at Heppner, and the desire of Salem's sympathetic citizens for every scrap of news from there compelled us to crowd out even so interesting matter as the reunion of Oregon's pioneers. The occasion is one abounding in sentiment, and in a way pathetic, for all of us realize that they are rapidly crossing those still wider plains into a fairer land than even the beautiful Willamette valley. The old band lived strenuously, meeting difficulties as they presented themselves, and overcoming them as the American who blazes the trails always does. They had a good time and the Journal is heartily glad of it, and sincerely hopes that for many years yet, the may meet, each year more and more venerated by the after comers who share the fruits of their labors and their victories. The Evening Telegram says of them:

"Seated in chairs or wandering about through the spacious corridors leading to the State Historical Society rooms, in the City Hall, was an interesting crowd today. They were none other than the fathers and mothers of the great commonwealth of Oregon, who had gathered to attend the annual meeting today of the Oregon Pioneer Association. On some faces the ravages of time were strongly shown, and their owners feebly walked, supported by young and willing arms."

"These old people are no laggards. Even before 7 this morning they appeared in large numbers at the City Hall, where the white canvas signs, in vermilion-lined letters, bore the legend, 'Headquarters of the Pioneer Association,' prominently posted."

"Yesterday there were fully 800 names registered upon the Historical Society's register. Today at least 200 more penned their names upon the list. Secretary Himes seemed everywhere at once. Busy as he was with his multifarious duties, he still found time to greet each one by name and give a cordial grasp."

The great crowd surged in and out of the society rooms, and the buzz of conversation reminded one of a hundred swarms of bees, in and out among the show cases they passed, viewing the relics of 50 years or more ago. They touched the old cooking utensils almost with reverence. The old men were as sentimental as the women. They laid their gnarled and hardened hands upon the old wagons and tools gently, for they were the tangible remains of the historic past. The women were interested in the needlework of those who have long since passed to their reward. One, with tear-bedimmed eyes pointed at an antique child's bonnet and exclaimed, "That looks just like one my father gave me when I was a little girl."

As the scribe noted the enjoyment around him, one of the old and grizzled pioneers jocularly tapped him on the shoulder. "Excuse my interruption," said he, "but don't you wish you were old, too?" Then, glancing at the writer's hair, touched with gray, the kindly old man said, "You're getting there, too; but still you're only a boy compared with me, for I am 82."

It did not take the pioneers long to dispose of the midday meal, and all were in readiness when the parade formed in front of the Hotel Portland.

At 1:30 p. m. the pioneers formed in parade in front of the Hotel Portland, and took up their line of march up Morrison street to the Exposition building. The parade was in charge of Grand Marshal Buchtel, with W. H. Prettyman, Eugene D. White, B. B. Beckman, Claude Strahn and Nathan H. Bird as aides. The several divisions of the parade lined up in the following order:

Squad of police.

Pioneers in the order of the years of their arrival.

Bids Invited.

For supplies for the Oregon State Penitentiary, during the period ending December 31, 1933.

Sealed bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Shoes, Leather and Findings, Plumbing Supplies, Hardware, Flour, Cuts and Mill Feed, Fish, Meats, etc., will be received at the office of the Superintendent of the State Penitentiary until Thursday, July 20, 1933, at 3 o'clock p. m. at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200.00 in cash or certified check payable to the superintendent must accompany each bid for meat, and of \$75 for bids for flour and fish, all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of a bid.

On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the Penitentiary within 30 days after the contract is awarded, unless otherwise provided in contract.

Schedules of the various lines of goods will be furnished upon application to the Superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following completion of contract, and monthly on continuous contracts.

Samples must accompany bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Flour and all other articles where practicable.
