

## PROGRAM FOR THE CARNIVAL

### A Week of Innocent Amusement and Jollity

#### The Indications are That Salem Will Have the Biggest Crowd Ever Gathered Here

Yesterday the carpenters began the work of enclosing the court yard, on the Carnival site, with a board fence, which will be six feet high, and will enclose a space 150x150 feet. Within the enclosure will be the booths, ferris wheel, band stand and fountain, and adjoining the enclosure on the north will be the mammoth Arnold tent shows. Work will be commenced in a few days on the big arch to be built over the big entrance to the court yard, on State street, and the painters will also apply the brushes to the band stand this morning, which will be treated to a coat of snowy white paint.

The executive committee held another meeting Manager Judah's office, at the city hall, last evening. The program for the Carnival week was arranged in detail, and many other important features of the coming event were discussed. The committee will hold daily meetings from now until the opening of the great Mid-Summer Carnival, and the work will be rapidly pushed to completion.

#### PROGRAM CARNIVAL WEEK.

##### Monday Inaugural Day.

At 11 o'clock a. m. grand spectacular and industrial parade from Carnival grounds west on State street to Commercial; thence to Marion square on Commercial, with circuit of square to Commercial; thence to Liberty on Marion; thence to Chemeketa on Liberty; thence to High; thence to Court and east to Carnival grounds. At 3 p. m. flight of balloon and parachute drop. At 5 p. m. reception of Queen of Carnival at the grand pavilion and address of welcome by Hon. C. P. Bishop, mayor of Salem; Carnival inaugural address by Hon. Geo. E. Chamberlain, governor of Oregon; general opening of the Oregon, Pacific & Oriental shows, including the free performances in the grand pavilion, followed by the E. J. Arnold nine-cage menagerie, the high-diving coyotes, the great Ver Valin and his marionettes, the old plantation theater, the Edison electric show, the famous Wallace glass-blowers, Prof. Horne's dog and monkey circus, Tetuan's Japanese acrobats, the Loretta twins vaudeville company, Arnold's jolly old merry-go-round, and the inspiring 60-foot Ferris wheel; all the magnificent band music, and refreshments galore. Thousand-light flash illumination at night.

##### Tuesday—Baby Day.

At 1:30 o'clock p. m. the great Arnold shows, as enumerated above, from the opening of the doors until midnight, in continuous and absorbing performance. At 3 p. m. the Greater Salem baby exposition, at which handsome prizes will be awarded by competent and disinterested judges, to the fattest, the littiest, the prettiest (boy or girl) baby living within the new boundaries of Salem, Oregon, age limit, two years.

##### Wednesday—Public Wedding Day.

At 1:30 o'clock p. m., the twelve continuous performance shows of the Oregon, Pacific & Oriental aggregation, with a grand public wedding at 9 o'clock in the evening, the high contracting parties to receive a souvenir of \$50 in cash and the good wishes of the congregated thousands.

##### Thursday—Auto-Cycle Race.

At 1:30 p. m., the round dozen of interesting attractions, maintained in continuous performance by the E. J. Arnold varied line of high-priced talent closing at midnight. At 10:30 a. m. grand automobile race, from the Willamette river to the state house. At 11 a. m. grand motor-cycle race. At 11:30 a. m., grand free-for-all bicycle race, over same course.

##### Friday—Fraternity Day.

At 1:30 o'clock p. m., the same splendid series of constant exhibition performances by the Arnold Carnival Company in all its departments. The stage in the grand pavilion will be occupied by several of the biggest popular fraternal organizations, in spectacular and brilliant events, the features of which will be elaborated later. Prizes of \$25 to the lodge team making the best appearance and drill (provided no less than three entries are made in this behalf.)

##### Saturday—"The Glorious Fourth."

The Nation's Natal Day will be marked by a specially delightful program. Aside from the great array of amusements in the grand pavilion by

the Arnold people, there will be a street pageant at 11 o'clock in the morning, involving numerous floats in display of fraternal advantages, industrial progress and commercial prosperity of the Capital City, over the main thoroughfares of the city. Grand Aerial ascension and parachute drop in the afternoon, and a magnificent display of fireworks in the night.

#### A Horse on Them.

Governor Chamberlain, Hon. J. K. Weatherford and Fred Dawson returned last evening from Corvallis, where they had been to attend the commencement of the O. A. C. Governor Chamberlain delivering the address, a fine effort; to the graduating class. On their way to Corvallis, when about a mile this side of the city, one of the horses from the Skipton stables, suddenly dropped and expired at once from heart disease. The distinguished gentlemen walked to Corvallis, and the driver made arrangements for another animal for the return trip in the evening.—Albany Democrat.

#### Hood River Is Dry.

The Hood River saloon keepers were refused a renewal of their licenses at an adjourned meeting of the city council Tuesday evening. The vote of the council on a motion to grant the licenses stood 3 to 3—Councilmen P. S. Davidson, Blowers and Prather voting "aye," and Mayes, Geseling and H. F. Davidson voting "no." The result being a tie, Mayor Coon decided that the saloon petitions did not have a majority of the legal voters of the city, and cast the deciding "no." The question will come up again for further consideration at the next regular meeting of the council.

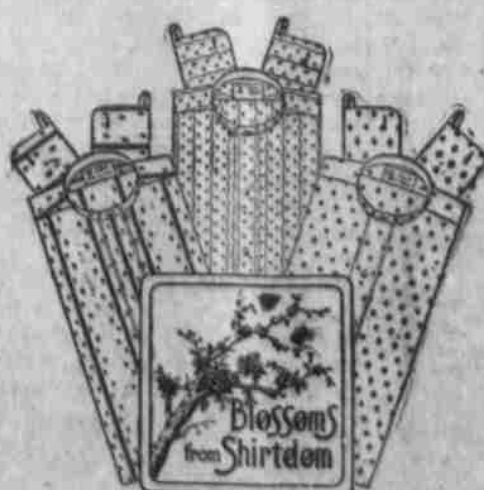
