BICYCLE ORDINANCE CRITICISED

Would be Legislation Binding on the New Territory

Electric Car Company Disclaims all Interest in the Proposed Measure

The proposed bicycle ordinance is criticised as another illustration of legislation for the old city limits, that will affect all the territory of Great or Salem when the new charter goes into effect on October 1st. The whole subject, it is claimed, should be carefully considered from the standpoint of the needs of the people and the city, not within its present restricted boundaries, but as the city will be when the suburbs all become part of the municipal territory. A city official, who has given the matter a good deal of careful thought, says in the meantime an officer should be appointed to enforce the existing ordinances for regulating wheelmen, and give him half the fines recovered for violations.

When bicycle paths are built they should be on a general plan that will provide for the new as well as the old parts of the city. The apparent tendency to legislate for the older parts of the city, that will, in time become binding on the new parts, is wrong in principle, and is causing much adverse comment. The newer parts of the city are entitled to representation in the city government, as soon as they become part thereof, and no legislation should be had until they are part of the city, in any matter in which they are vitally interested.

Electric Company Interests. Supt. Springer, of the Salem Light, Traction & Power Co., was seen this morning as to the charge that his company was interested in the present bicycle ordinance. Mr. Springer denies this, and says:

"The first time Mr. Henry and myself appeared before the city council, and before we knew a soul in that body, there were petitions read asking for the exclusion of bicycles from the sidewalks. I wish to state most emphatically that we have no interest in the question, one way or another. We are asking for no legislation on the wheel subject, and we are not seeking to compel people to ride on our car lines. We want to put them in such good order that people will want to ride because they can travel with greater safety and speed and comfort than in any other way. We hope to have the tracks all re-laid and the rolling stock so improved that even the wheelmen will give up their wheels, and travel on the electric cars. In rebuilding cars we are making plans to put bicycle racks on each end of the car, so as to carry cyclists and their wheels, when they see fit to travel with us to any part

Have Founded Modern Utopia

A recent cable to the World from Geneva, Switzerland, says: One hundred persons, thirty of them women, have settled at Ascona, on the Swiss-Italian frontier, intending to found a community modeled upon Sir Thomas Moore's "Utopia." The members are to have individual liberty of action and of thought, but are pledged to live in the most frugal way. They are vegetarians, their dress is of the simplest character and no hats or caps are worn. All belong to the educated classes. Their laws, they say, are those of nature, and they acknowledge no others. Their sole amusement is music, by preference that of Wagner, whom they call nature's musician.

The founder of the colony is a Belgian, but among the members are Swiss, Italians, French, Germans, Russians and one South American. They differ from the Tolstoyists in that their desire is not to help others, but only to live a quiet, natural life away from the world.
