Roseburg, Or., June 20.—It is feared that Harmon Snider, a well-known pioneer character of this city, is lost in the mountains near Perdue. About 15 days ago, Snider, in company with Edwin P. Bagshaw, a timber locator, left this place for the latter's homestead, six miles south of Perdue, where they intended to build a cabin, and otherwise improve the property. Yesterday, Thomas Cannon, of this city, received a letter from Bagshaw asking if Snider had arrived home, and stating that he had left there June 10th. He further stated that if he had not arrived yet he was probably lost on the trail between the homestead and Perdue.

Word received from Perdue states that Snider has not been seen there. Snider is a man about 55 years old, and is addicted to drink. He has lived in this city for the past 31 years, and is well known. Before going to the mountains he was employed as porter in the Senate saloon. He has a divorced wife and daughter living in Portland, and a son in California. Parties have been sent out on the Perdue trail to look for him.

DALLAS WOOL POOL.

Gets Three Bids, But They Were All Rejected.

Dallas, June 19.—(Special to Salem Journal).—There were three bidders for the wool pool opened at this place at 1 o'clock today, as follows: Wm. Brown & Co., Salem, 16 cents; Jacobs & Co., Oregon City, 14 1/2 cents; Bernheim & Co., Portland, 15 1/2 cents. The bids were all rejected, and the pool will be offered for sale again on Friday, July 10th, at 1 p. m. There are 175,000 pounds of wool in the pool.

The Marion County Wool Growers' Association sold its 1903 pool at 16 cents and 17 1/2 cents for coarse and medium and fine, respectively, to those who had their clips in the agreement.

Sealed bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Shoes, Leather and Findings, Plumbing Supplies, Hardware, Flour, Oats and Mill Feed, Fish, Meats, etc., will be received at the office of the Superintendent of the State Penitentiary until Thursday, July 9th, 1903, at 3 o'clock p. m. at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200.00 in cash or certified check payable to the superintendent must accompany each bid for meat, and of \$75 for bids for flour and fish, all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of a bid.

On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the Penitentiary within 30 days after the contract is awarded, unless otherwise provided in contract.

Schedules of the various lines of goods will be furnished upon application to the Superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following completion of contract, and monthly on continuous contracts. Samples must accompany bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Flour and all other articles where practicable.

Proposals for Supplies.
Salem, Ore., June 6, 1903.

The board of trustees of the Oregon State Insane Asylum hereby invites sealed proposals for furnishing the following supplies to the institution, for six months ending December 31, 1903: Groceries, mill feed and flour, meats and fish, dry goods, drugs, stationery, leather and findings, boots and shoes, plumbing, hardware, tinware and tinning, crockery and glassware. Lists of said supplies will be furnished by the clerk of the board upon application. Samples can be seen at the asylum, and goods must be in accordance therewith. All goods must be in strict accordance with sample in original packages when possible, and delivered at the State Insane Asylum within 20 days after the contract is awarded, and bids must be on blank forms, which will be furnished, together with instructions to bidders, by the clerk, upon application. Each bid on flour or meat must be accompanied by a certified check of \$500, and each bid on fish by a certified check of \$75, and all other bids by a certified check equal to 10 per cent of the amount bid, checks of unsuccessful bidders to be returned immediately, and those of accepted bidders when the contract is completed. Bids must be enclosed in sealed envelopes, and directed to the board, care of the clerk, and plainly marked, "Bids for Asylum Supplies," and the class of goods bid on should also be inscribed on the envelope. Price, fitness and quality being equal, preference will be given to articles manufactured, grown or produced in this state. When a particular article is specifically called for, bids for any other kind of manufacture, or brands equally as good, will be entertained, but to insure recognition of such bids samples of the articles it is proposed to supply must accompany them. The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to accept or reject any part of a bid. Bids will be opened at the Capitol, at Salem, at 10 a. m., Wednesday, July 8, 1903.
