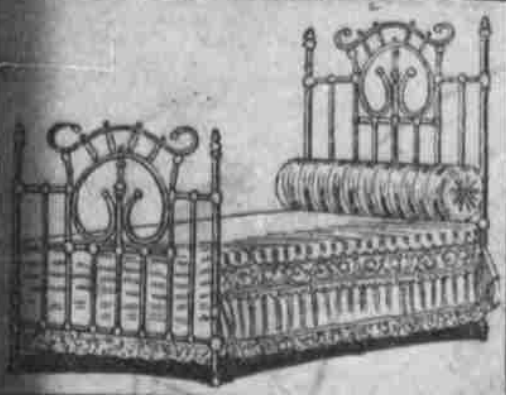

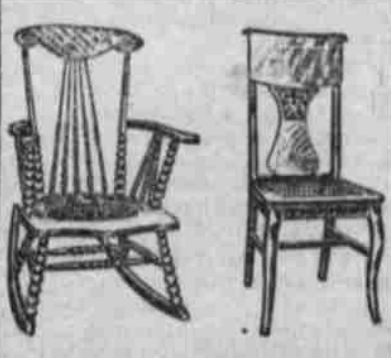

MAN-MADE FLOODS AND RUIN

Destruction of Forests Cause of the Freshets

Springs no Longer Exist, and Streams Dry in Summer Torrents in the Spring

Before 1862 there was a good boating stage of water through the open season in the Western rivers. This ranged in the Ohio and Mississippi from twelve to fifteen feet. Now, in nearly all the rivers, there are periods when the water is very high, and other periods when it is very low.

Forty years ago the smaller rivers and streams in Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York—many of them fed by springs—had a regular flow the year around, and were full to the banks. The man who returns to his old home in these states now finds these creeks and rivers almost dry in the summer and raging torrents in the spring.

Many of the springs famous forty years ago are no longer in existence. Streams that then gave a regular supply of water to hundreds of farms are now in the summer time simply a series of pools. Even in our largest rivers in the dry season there is scarcely water enough for navigation, while in the spring come great floods like that now raging in the Missouri and its tributaries.

There is a reason for this change. Fifty years ago the native forests in Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York were in their wild state. The trees had not been cut and the underbrush had not been cleared away. Now these forests have all been cut. Where there were square miles of forests there are now square miles as bare of trees as the prairies in Illinois.

Forty years ago the headwaters of all our great river systems were in highlands covered with trees. Gradually inroads were made upon these forests, and the mountains in which are found the fountains of the Ohio river system are now denuded. In the mountain regions at the source of the Missouri and its tributaries two-thirds of the timber has been cut. In Wisconsin and Minnesota, on the headwaters of the Mississippi, 90 per cent of the trees have been cut.

The full significance of this statement of conditions is apparent only when the extent of the basin drained by the Ohio or the Missouri is considered in detail. The disastrous spring flood in the Ohio river came from the mountains of Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania and New York.

The cause of this Ohio river flood is plain. There was a heavy rainfall in February. Warm weather came at the same time, and rapidly melted the snow. Under the present conditions this unusual amount of water found its way all at once to the main stream.

Under natural conditions the rain would have been caught by the trees and brush. The snow, shaded by the forests, would have melted slowly. The soil, sheltered by the vegetation and made porous by roots, would have absorbed the water. This water would have fed thousands of springs, and slowly filtered to the great river. But the denuded hillsides turned the water like a roof, and every mountain stream became a torrent, pouring its flood into the greater Ohio river flood.

Later similar conditions prevailed at the headwaters of the Missouri.

The warm weather of April in the chains of mountains from which came the streams that fed the Missouri, the Yellowstone, the Platte, the Arkansas and scores of other rivers, melted the snow a month earlier than usual. This melted snow, together with the heavy rainfall of May, sent from a territory a half million square miles in extent flood waters that have carried ruin to many cities and states.

Had the forests on the mountains and foothills not been cut or been destroyed by great forest fires, the snow would not have melted quickly and the heavy rainfall would, in part, have been retained in forest lands. Under present conditions, however, the thousands of mountain streams ran with overflowing banks to the rivers, and the great river became a terrific agent of destruction.

This story has been told hundreds of times. Men who have devoted their lives to investigation have pointed out the remedy. The mountain lands must be reforested. The forests that are still in existence must be preserved.

Reservoirs must be provided in the West to hold surplus water. Rivers must be improved to cope with floods. In nearly all of the newer Western states railway and other bridges have been built low. Where these bridges have been destroyed they must be rebuilt so that they will not obstruct the flow.

Already much has been done to preserve the forests. Already great progress has been made in reforestation of timber lands. Only in recent years, however, have the people been brought to a full realization of the peril of the destruction of our forests.

The recent flood in the Ohio damaged property to the value of more than \$50,000,000. The flood now raging in the Missouri has already damaged property to the value of \$100,000,000. Such floods come frequently, and the total damage is almost incalculable. Would it not be economy for the people as well as for the government to spend a few millions each year in measures looking to the restoration of natural conditions?—Chicago Inter-Ocean.

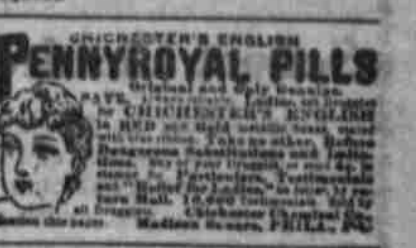
