

## HEADING OFF THE JEWS

How They Unite With the Greek Church in Russia

To Get Around the Legal Disabilities Created by Unjust Legislation

Paris, June 22.—The Tageblatt today says the Russian Holy Synod is taking a hand in the propaganda against the Jews of Russia. The paper says that body has forbidden priests to baptize Jews unless they can produce a police license permitting them to change their religion. The measure is intended to stop the adoption of Christianity by Jews, who can thus escape legal disabilities.

## GRAND VIZIERS PALACE

At Constantinople the Object of Hungarian Anarchists Dynamite Designs

Paris, June 22.—A message from Budapest to the Rappel states that it is reported there that the grand vizier's palace, at Constantinople, narrowly escaped being blown up by dynamite today. The bombs are reported to have been fixed by Bulgarian revolutionists. Numerous arrests were made.

## SINGULAR BRITISH CRIME

No Suspicion Attached to the Accused Man for Two Years

Chalmersford, England, June 22.—The trial of Samuel Douglas, charged with murdering Miss Holland, at the Moat house, two years ago, opened today. It is one of the most singular crimes ever tried in England, as no suspicion attached to Douglas until he attempted the disposal of property checks.

Belgrade, June 22.—A cloud-burst at Belgrade today killed two men and destroyed buildings were demolished. The damages are put at \$2,000,000.

## TEDDY'S AXE HAS FALLEN

Removes an Associate Justice for General Immorality

Big Politicians Plead for the Accused but the Evidence Was Too Strong

Washington, June 22.—Daniel McMillan, associate justice of the supreme court of Mexico, has been removed by President Roosevelt on account of charges of general immorality that have been pending against him for several months. Clem Smith, of Hastings, Mich., has been decided on to fill the vacancy. Some time ago Millburn, president of the Buffalo Exposition and Secretary Root pleaded for McMillan, and succeeded in having him retained for further investigation. Recently further evidence accumulated against him, sustaining the charges, and the President decided on removing him forthwith.

New York, June 22.—Shamrock III's mast is being stepped today at Erie basin, to be ready for the first trial spin over the American course with Shamrock I on Saturday. The Constitution, Columbia and Reliance will not meet again until June 30th, off Newport.

Muncie, Ind., June 22.—The American Flint Glass Bottle Company's plant at Summitville was destroyed by fire early this morning. Loss \$150,000.

## BOMB FIENDS FOUND

Italians Who Placed Dynamite on the Umbria

A Letter Found on an Italian Highwayman Furnishes the Clue

New York, June 22.—Chief of Police McCluskey claims to have found a clue to those who placed the dynamite bomb under the liner Umbria. At the request of the detectives, two Italians, Signora and Bruno, from Hoboken, were remanded to the Tombs this morning at the close of a police investigation for highway robbery. A letter was found on one relating to placing the infernal machine on the Cunard docks.

## POLISH ELECTION RIOTS

Nationalist Uprising in East Prussia Causes Bloodshed

Houses and Factories Destroyed and a Number of Rioters Were Killed by the Police

Berlin, June 22.—There are election riots at Glogwitz, East Prussia today. The rioters troubled the police, who attempted to suppress the Polish Nationalist meeting. The Poles resisted and the police used revolvers and swords. One Pole was killed and many injured. The Poles were engaged and marched through the town, demolishing a number of houses, among them several wire manufacturing plants. The machinery of the latter was destroyed. Order was restored after numerous clashes.

Governor Chamberlain today restored Fred I. Moxley to citizenship, on petition of some of the best people of Dallas. Moxley was sentenced from Wallawa county for larceny, and served his time.

## SECRET PAPAL CONFERENCE

Adjourned Owing to Great Fatigue of Pope Leo 13th

But no American Names Appear in List of the Newly Created Catholic Relatives

Rome, June 22.—The long deferred secret consistory was held this morning in the hall of the consistory, lasting only half an hour, owing to the health of the Pope, who appeared very much fatigued when he was carried back to his apartments.

He was carried to the consistory in a sedan chair. After delivering his allocution and announcing the names of those chosen to high honors, His Holiness adjourned the meeting to the throne room, where, in the presence of the papal court, the new cardinals, archbishops and bishops now in Rome, kissed the prelate's foot, and received his blessing. No Americans appear on the list of the newly created cardinals.
