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CITY SUPERINTENDENT TRAVEL.

The city superintendent of public schools of the Salem school district is a hard worker, and a very busy man.

He has engagements to attend the State Teachers' Association, and will deliver lectures at two county institutes.

He will, besides, superintend improvements on the four large Salem school houses, some having rooms added, and all to be put in good repair.

The sanitary condition of the school houses will be looked after personally by the city superintendent, and that is very important.

For a young man Supt. Traver has made the finest record of any Oregon educator who has ever held this position.

The board of education has done well to employ him for another year, and with such harmonious co-operation between board and superintendent only the best results will come to our public schools.

It will not be many years before Salem has fully established the reputation of having the best public schools in the state, if not in the Northwest.

The grounds about our school houses are still mostly in the state of wilderness, resembling a gypsy or Indian camp, and are used for cows and horses to graze and camp on.

More vocal music, improved grounds and more thorough work in the common English branches will be points to work for this coming year, and City Superintendent Traver will do his part with the means he has.

We predict that this district will not keep Supt. Traver many years. Larger fields of work will invite him at a higher salary than we will want to pay. But while he is with us let us give him hearty support.

SALEM NOT A BASEBALL TOWN.

The directors of the Salem baseball league team are to be congratulated on giving this city the best league team Salem has ever had.

They deserve better support than they have had from the general public, as the crowds have been distressingly small.

Such games as have been played deserve all the way from 2000 to 5000 people in attendance, instead of a few hundred.

The business men and the masses of our people are too indifferent to baseball to give the home team a good show in a hard contest.

Men cannot do their best before empty benches, and when they feel that the community does not appreciate their efforts to win for Salem.

No city of this size turns out such small baseball crowds, and the crowds at Salem are the smallest of any town in the circuit.

This is not as it should be. Young and old should turn out, wear the Salem colors, and get the Salem shout, and root for the Salem team.

Audiences of thousands should be there where there are now hundreds. For the warmest games excursion trains should be run from all over the valley to the Salem games.

With the splendid fighting qualities of the Salem team the people of Salem must be inoculated with the baseball enthusiasm, and turn out.

The directors and stockholders who have put up their money to give Salem membership in the league deserve better support than they have had.

They have given the city a team that cannot now well be improved upon.

PUSH THE POPULAR LOAN.

The city council should perfect arrangements for submitting to the people the proposition to fund the \$20,000 of accruing city bonds.

The city should not abandon the plan of widely distributing the city debt at a low rate of interest among

the masses of the people.

The popular loan relieves the city of all responsibility for neglect in its financial affairs, and strengthens it with the people.

The city has all to lose and nothing to gain by not keeping its finances in the most perfect order. To allow bonds to lapse payment without making suitable provisions is always dangerous.

The losses to this community through the Williams & England bank and the Gilbert Bros. bank ought to be a warning not to leave too much in the hands of any banking house.

Both the substantial Salem banking houses in the past have endorsed the popular loan plan of funding a debt. The saving will be \$200 a year interest on this \$20,000 of city bonds.

The old saying that the devil takes no chances is applicable right here. The city government should be at least as wise as the arch-enemy of mankind when its public funds are involved.

The city council should proceed at once to provide for the popular loan.

The last will and testament of Fannie G. Tolle, deceased, was Saturday admitted to probate in the Marion county court. The estate consists mostly of personal property of the probable value of \$8500. Jos. H. Albert is named in the will as executor, and his bond is fixed at \$13,000. Clifford L. Tolle, of Cayucos, California, a son of the deceased, is the only heir to the estate.

DEPLORES STREET PROGRAMS

Some Sights That Tend to Demoralize the Children

They Where Allowed to Pull Needles Out of a Hypnotic Patient's Face

Editor Journal: I was present at a street performance recently in Salem, during which a man hypnotized himself, and induced a number of persons to stick large needles with threads attached, through his face, in his demonstrating the power of mind over matter. In this cataleptic state the face was "sewed up," as he expressed it, and the feat was wonderful from ordinary views of such experiments. However, it seems highly important to call attention to the climax which was asking two little children to step upon the platform and pull the needles out of his cheeks, keeping the needles and thread as souvenirs of the occasion. While the responsibility may rest with both the performers and the parents, yet, it hardly seems the proper thing to excuse parents for allowing their children, in their extreme youth as were these two children, to pull those needles from that man's face. If we stop to consider the risk the danger of hardening the hearts, the danger of creating the criminal instinct in these childish minds, we should hesitate to allow such things to be done. There is apparent in this the same morbid curiosity which requires a force of armed men to keep people from hangings, from the places of murders, from the morgues, from laundries and burying them in hearse. This insane and unbecoming instinct which we find expressed as indicated above is closely related to the caliber of mind which will send two babies upon the stage and allow them to pull out the needles and thread from a man's face. They are thus taught they have been privileged above others, and might become to hunger for more notoriety in this line and perchance grow an instinct which may provide itself with a cause for glory. The youth makes the man. So, whatever the influences surrounding him as a youth, in a measure, determines what he shall be as a man. Parents should consider these things. The raising given children will largely enter into their life in manhood and thus parents become responsible for many of our citizens who are sadly in need of a guardian. Let us not start in at the crib teaching and fostering those instincts which are essential characteristics of every criminal and morbid, idle curiosity seekers. Let us keep the mind of our youth free from the taint of this deplorable influence and teach and educate it in the paths of good citizenship and higher human inspirations. Teach it higher aims and ambitions, let the experiments of science be carried on where they belong—with scientific men and in their schools—and parents will have less to regret when they look back over the vivid past and view with deep sorrow what they then might have, and now should have, done.
