### SALEM-INDEPENDENCE STEAMER

Establishment of free rural mail lines has cut off the daily stage to Independence and connected points, and makes a Salem steamer to Independence indispensable.

The plan is to run the boat two trips a day each way, and an extra trip at night, when there is a grand opera or some other adequate occasion.

Twelve thousand dollars is to be raised by subscribing for 50-cent round-trip tickets, and merchants and business men of this city are taking them freely.

Those tickets will all be used to bring trade to the city, and not a dollar invested in that kind of a subscription but will bring a harvest tenfold.

The Push Club committee, composed of Messrs. Hamilton, Stockton and Graham, are very busy men, and have not had time to complete the canvass.

The Journal believes this one of the very best propositions to bring trade to Salem that has ever been projected. Cheaper transportation lines are what makes any city a commercial center, and this boat will bring a large trade that now goes elsewhere.

It would pay single mercantile firms of this city to put on a large gasoline launch to deliver merchandise for their customers on the river.

The Salem-Independence project should meet with a hearty response, and be closed up before the hegira to the coast and mountains takes place. Let us meet the committee promptly and not wait to be begged for a response for such a worthy project.

### JOE LANE'S TREATY TREE.

Stood on Banks of Rogue River, Near "White Rocks."

It is a matter for regret that the land marks of early Oregon history have not been better preserved. Features whose interest would increase with the years have been suffered to be destroyed through ignorance or indifference. In 1853 there was some trouble with the Rogue River Indians, though the war did not occur until two years later. In 1853, General "Joe" Lane, whose name is inseparably connected with the history of Oregon, made a treaty with the Rogue River Indians on a spot which is now included within the present city limits of Grants Pass. He met the Indians under a black oak tree on Rogue river just above the "White Rocks." Old timers are still able to point out the stump of this tree, but the tree itself has been cut down and sawed into stove wood in these latter years, probably, by some man who never heard of Joe Lane.—Modford Inquirer.

Massey, a saloon keeper of Mill City, charging him with permitting a minor to loiter in his saloon, selling intoxicating liquor to a minor, selling liquor without a license and selling malt liquor without a license.

### Oregon Supreme Court.

The supreme court handed down two decisions today in which the judgments of the lower courts were affirmed. The arguments were submitted at the May term at Pendleton.

J. H. Moore, appellant, vs. T. W. Holliday, as administrator of the estate of J. H. Chandler, deceased, respondent; from Malheur county; M. D. Clifford, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Moore.

Wallowa county, respondent, vs. Aaron Wade, appellant; from Wallowa county; Robert Eakin, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Bean. This was a suit to enjoin the defendant from obstructing a public highway in Wallowa county.
