BEEMERHe Takes a Ride up
Proud Willamette
Valley

Talks About Hop Yards,
Good Roads, Jerseys,
and Dairy
Maids

Ed. Journal: One of the greatest
treats that residents of the city at
this time of the year can possibly take
is a good drive into the country. The
Willamette valley just now has her
best foot forward, is in her prime, and
the sights to be seen in any part from
an agricultural standpoint are without
comparison. She has no peer for fer-
tility, and beauty, and this is the time
of the year to see her in all her glory.
The writer made a drive the other
day of 25 miles which compels him to
enthusiasm a little, and he wants to give
it vent in the columns of The Journal.
To start with, that road from Salem to
Hall's Ferry has been improved to
such an extent that it is a pleasure to
drive over every inch of it. It has been
graveled nearly all the way, and
where the gravel has not been worn
down to a comfortable surface there
is a smooth dirt road at the side which
is practically noiseless. The travel on
this road has grown to such an extent
that the business of the ferry at the
other end has grown wonderfully. A.
D. Pettyjohn, who manages the boat
is crowded with work, and the excel-
lent service as well as the good piece
of road deserve it. The drive from the
other side to Independence and ten
miles beyond is a marvel. It reveals
the greatest sources of wealth known
to any region on earth. Gold mines
cannot compare with it for actual pro-
duction. There is probably more taken
out of the soil of these two counties
in the way of products than all the
gold mines on the coast. The fine farm
homes, the great barns, and the con-
veniences and luxuries enjoyed by the
people, all attest to this hard fact.
The hop yards are generally looking
better than was expected a few weeks
ago, and every other crop is simply
a marvel. The flocks of sheep and
goats are greater in number than ever
before, and their condition is excel-
lent. In fact in many flocks the spring
lambs are already nearly as large as
the shorn ewes. Thousands of Angora
goats are rapidly transforming
old pastures, stump fields and worn-
out lands into what will soon be the
finest land that lays out of doors, and
thus thousands of acres will be added
to our wealth producing assets.
The recent rains have put grain and
all kinds of vegetation into fine shape,
having brought out the weak fall
wheat and late sown spring grain
which was suffering from dry weather

until all average up to the highest
Oregon standard. There is much fine
clover visible in all sections as far as
Corvallis, and it is evident that our
farmers have finally accepted this as
one of the essential crops. Consider-
able of the vetch is also in evidence,
and this will in time win its place
just as clover has. Many good patches
of rape were seen, sown for hogs, and
in fact the growing numbers of the
substantial porker are a very prom-
ising sign. The Poland Chinas and
Berkshires seem to predominate, and
many well bred animals are to be
seen.

Good herds of Jerseys everywhere
attest to the growth of the dairying
interests, as do also the ever present
cream cans at the front gates of a
large majority of the farmers. The
Independence and Jefferson cream-
eries, both of which are conducted
under one management, are scattering
thousands of dollars of wealth, and at
the same time are serving as educa-
tors of the thrifty farmers of both
sexes.

Another glaring evidence of prosper-
ity is the presence of frequent
herds of good stock cattle, prom-
inent among these breeds being the
shorthorn and white faced varieties.
A lady who is a devoted friend of the
latter was condemning the meek-eyed
little Jersey, when she was asked
what was better than good rich milk,
Jersey cream and rich yellow butter
such as these little dairy maids pro-
duce, when she answered, "Well, a
bit o' beef occasionally." This was
certainly pertinent, and the colloquy
served to prove that both varieties
serve a great purpose in our domestic
economy. Surely, there's room for all
on our broad acres.

A great church and temperance
worker was met who made a fortune
off of hops last year, and he confessed
that the growth of his interests in this
line was becoming somewhat embar-
assing, as the production of the festi-
vine must certainly add to the con-
sumption of the hop juice, and the
poor man didn't seem to know just
where his duty lay. He admitted,
however, that his treasure was in the
hops, and that possibly his heart was
necessarily there also. It must be
pretty tough to embarrass yourself in
that manner, but the gentleman in
question seemed to be enjoying good
health.

It is a noticeable fact that the rural
free delivery boxes used in Polk county
nearly all bear the names of the
patrons, which is a great convenience
to people traveling through the coun-
try, and it would be well if Marion
county people would follow suit. Ev-
erbody using a rural delivery box
should have his or her name upon the
box for the convenience of his or
friends.

Another thing that is brought prom-
inently to the mind of any one driving
out is the awful display of fence and
other signs. Most of them are a dis-
grace, and the improvement leagues
are wisely fighting them everywhere.
When such a sign is good and clean it
is well enough, but after that it be-
comes an eye-sore to everybody. Some
of the bridges are fairly loaded down
with them, and it will be to the inter-
est of the counties to prohibit such
action, and it ought to be termed or

classed as trespassing to put them up
on farmers' barns and fences. Out of
64 counted over 60 per cent were mis-
shapen, out of date, disfigured and
anything but an ornament or an at-
tractive advertisement. Thus allow-
ing advertisements to go to seed is a
damage to a wide-awake firm rather
than a benefit.

While everything on land is at its
best this year, and is indeed remark-
ably beautiful at this season, it must
be confessed that the beauties of the
"Proud Blue Willamette are the most
noteworthy sight on a trip of this
kind. In many instances the pano-
rama from the high hills down into the
rich valleys on either side are almost
dazzling in their grandeur, yet with-
out the occasional strips of the spark-
ling water it would lack in that quality
which lends enchantment. Such a
sight is worth going miles to see, and
while it savors of fairyland it seems
almost the strongest proof that can be
produced that our country has the
most unusual cash-producing ele-
ments on earth.

lic manner. Salem has a row of fine
buildings in the heart of the business
and residence portion, on Court and
State streets. These buildings com-
mence with the capitol, then the post
office, and court house. Between all
these buildings lawns have been laid
out, grass sown, trees trimmed, hay
mowed down, and some cement walks
laid, flowers planted, and a general
cleaning and fixing up of these places.
The buildings look imposing, sur-
rounded by the improvements and are
a credit to the city. The state capitol
has every convenience money can buy.
The post office is the most modern
and up-to-date building ever con-
structed on the whole Pacific coast.
The court house is a beautiful looking
building looking bright and clean in
her white dress of paint. Now, in
order to "keep up our end," as the
saying goes, and not let the state and
government buildings put our own in-
stitutions too far behind the times, I
am, first and last, and between times,
in favor of having our Marion county
court house town clock lighted at
night. Nothing will lend style and
progress like this improvement. All

Proposals for Supplies.

Salem, Ore., June 6, 1903.

The board of trustees of the Oregon
State Insane Asylum hereby invites
sealed proposals for furnishing the
following supplies to the institution,
for six months ending December 31,
1903: Groceries, mill feed and flour,
meats and fish, dry goods, drugs, sta-
tionery, leather and findings, boots
and shoes, plumbing, hardware, tin-
ware and tinning, crockery and glass-
ware. Lists of said supplies will be
furnished by the clerk of the board
upon application. Samples can be
seen at the asylum, and goods must be
in accordance therewith. All goods
must be in strict accordance with
sample in original packages when pos-
sible, and delivered at the State In-
sane Asylum within 20 days after the
contract is awarded, and bids must be
on blank forms, which will be fur-
nished, together with instructions to
bidders, by the clerk, upon applica-
tion. Each bid on flour or meat must
be accompanied by a certified check
of \$300, and each bid on fish by a cer-
tified check of \$75, and all other bids
by a certified check equal to 10 per
cent of the amount bid, checks of un-
successful bidders to be returned im-
mediately, and those of accepted bidders
when the contract is completed. Bids
must be enclosed in sealed en-
velopes, and directed to the board,
care of the clerk, and plainly marked,
"Bids for Asylum Supplies," and the
class of goods bid on should also be
inscribed on the envelope. Price, fit-
ness and quality being equal, prefer-
ence will be given to articles manu-
factured, grown or produced in this
state. When a particular article is
specifically called for, bids for any
other kind of manufacture, or brands
equally as good, will be entertained,
but to insure recognition of such bids
samples of the articles it is proposed
to supply must accompany them. The
board reserves the right to reject any
or all bids, or to accept or reject any
part of a bid. Bids will be opened at
the capitol, at Salem, at 10 a. m.,
Wednesday, July 8, 1903.

the Governor of the State of
Oregon will be received at the
Executive Office until 2 p. m.,
June 24, 1903, for raising the second
story of the present Dining Hall, the
building of a third story over same
and a two-story addition thereto, at

nied by an amount equal to 10 per cent
of the amount of the bid.

On each envelope should be in-
scribed the nature of the bid. Goods of
Oregon manufacture or production
will receive preference, other things
being equal.

All goods and supplies must be de-
livered to the Penitentiary within 20
days after the contract is awarded,
unless otherwise provided in con-
tract.

Schedules of the various lines of
goods will be furnished upon applica-
tion to the Superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for pay-
ment on the first of the month follow-
ing completion of contract, and
monthly on continuous contracts.

other articles where practicable.
