

RAISING STEAMER SUBSIDY

Eight Hundred Tickets are Already Subscribed for

Twice-a-Day Boat That Would Connect up River Points With Salem

The committee to raise the subsidy for a twice-a-day steamer to Independence has met with considerable success, and some opposition from people who cannot see any merit in the proposition. The following is the form of subscription that is being circulated, and the amounts subscribed in 50-cent tickets:

"Whereas, Captain George Skinner agrees to place a small passenger boat on the Willamette river, to run one or two roundtrips a day between Salem and Independence, we the undersigned agree to aid him by purchasing the number of tickets set opposite our names. It is understood that these tickets are to be taken and paid for in four equal installments, the first upon the arrival of the boat, the others in 30, 60 and 90 days thereafter. The price of the tickets is to be 50 cents, and good for passage either way. If the boat ceases to run before the entire number of tickets are taken, then this agreement ceases to be binding."

President Theilman, of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, and his committee have not completed the canvass of the city by any means, and some of the largest interests have not yet been conferred with. Of course, existing steamboat interests will not encourage an opposition boat, but they feel that the interests of Salem business men would be promoted by a rapid transit with all nearby towns. There is a subscription list at The Journal office, which anyone can see and put down for what they wish in the way of tickets. J. J. Henry the owner of the Salem lighting and street car plant, has offered to give the enterprise a substantial lift, and we expect to hear from him in a few days. Quite a number have been seen who have promised subscriptions. The educational institutions of the city would get a big revenue from the establishment of such a boat, as students could come down Monday morning and go home Friday evening, at a very low rate. Let all help this to the fullest extent of their ability, and let Salem have the twice-a-day boat to Independence, Monmouth and Dallas will be closely connected with Salem by the same route.

Capt. Skinner's offer to put on a \$2500 boat that would run summer and winter is a snap bargain for this city, as we are only asked to put up \$1200

in tickets that are redeemed on presentation, and will not have to be paid for much faster than they are used. The risk in the undertaking is all on the side of Capt. Skinner and his son, and his letters all give the impression that he is a man of experience, and will keep his contract with this city, or die in the attempt. There are those who give him a black eye, but steamboat men are a little like editors, they sometimes try to do too much, and get cussed for their enterprise.

Had a Bad Effect.

It is beginning to dawn upon some of our citizens that the big jump that was made in the price of land in Tillamook this spring was a benefit only to those who wanted to sell out and take the money with them. It was a bonanza to them; but that was not all, for it created an impression in the minds of a great number of people that their dairy farms were equally as valuable as the Svenson place, consequently land is held today at inflated valuation. But what about the after-clap? It has depopulated Tillamook with a gradual exodus for several months and farming land held for \$100 to \$200 an acre looks ridiculous to home seekers from the East and Middle West, for they see no inducements in Tillamook when they can buy land on the outside for one third what they can here, having railroad facilities as well. We look for a slump in real estate before fall, and probably nothing will hasten this quicker than a fall in the price of butter fat, for herein is the value of dairy lands in Tillamook.—Tillamook Headlight.

STRAW BERRY HARVEST

Closing Down With a Big Demand all Around

There is a strong market for straw-berries in the local market at \$1.25 a crate, and the supply is not anywhere nearly equal to the demand. The effect of the Fruit Growers' Union has been to hold prices about 25 cents a crate above the average price at this time last year. The Portland shipping market is not nearly supplied, and the cannery is short 500 crates on its orders for fancy pack, and the manager complains bitterly that the growers who contracted to deliver 75 per cent of their cannery berries are not bringing in the fruit. The best late berry in the local market has been a new variety called the Ruby, that is yielding a large pack of fine fruit. They can be seen at W. W. Walker's grounds, East State street, or at E. Hofer's grounds, Lincoln Park. No variety has yet been found that bears as heavy a crop as the Ruby, where the soil conditions are just right.

Press Clubs in Convention.

Atlantic City, N. J., June 23.—Representatives of press clubs in all the large cities of the United States and Canada were present this morning at the opening of the annual convention of the International League of Press Clubs. The proceedings were opened by Mayor Franklin P. Stoy, who welcomed the delegates to the city. Among those present were many journalists of world-wide reputation. This evening a reception was held in honor of the visitors and numerous other social features have been arranged, the most notable of which will be the annual banquet tomorrow evening.

Run of Fish Improves.

Ostoria, Or., June 23.—The run of fish yesterday and today has shown considerable improvement, and the gill-nets have been drifting near the mouth of the river and have made good catches. The fish are of large size and the majority go to the cold-storage plants. Now that the flood in the river is beginning to go down, the seiners are making preparations to resume operations about July 1st. The greater portion of the traps are closed down on account of the immense amount of drift in the river, and they are expected to begin fishing again in about a week. The pack thus far at the cannery is far behind last season, but the amount put up at the cold-storage plants is considerably in excess of the pack at the corresponding time in 1932.

Palace is Nearly Blown Up.

Paris, June 23.—A dispatch to the Rappel, dated at Budapest today, says a rumor is current that the palace of the grand vizier at Constantinople narrowly escaped being blown up today by dynamite bombs. The correspondent says it is certain the grand vizier has received threatening letters, and that a number of arrests have been made recently.

In the matter of renewing the insurance on the court house—ordered that expiring insurance be renewed.

In the matter of cutting down what is known as "Simmons Hill"—Contract awarded to S. W. Hobart.

In the matter of appointing a member of the board of county road viewers.—Grover Simmons appointed as a member of the Board of County Road Viewers.

In the matter of the petition of R. F. Myers et al, for the location of a county road—Supervisor instructed to clear said road of all obstructions on or before the 15th of July, 1933.

In the matter of the petition of W. F. Welch, et al, for the opening of the alley in certain blocks in Southwest addition to Salem—Roadmaster instructed to look into the matter and open said alleys if advisable.

In the matter of the petition of W. M. Cline, et al, for the location of a county road—dismissed.

In the matter of a deed from E. E. Settlemier, et ux, and Wm. Cline, et ux, also from J. J. Pachs, et ux, to Marion county—ordered placed on record.

In the matter of the petition of C. W. Henline for a liquor license in Horeb precinct—dismissed.

In the matter of the petition of L. W. Acheson, et al, to open the alley in block 10, Southwest add to Salem, Oregon—ordered that the roadmaster look into the matter and if deemed advisable to open same.

In the matter of the petition of Mark S. Skiff relative to redemption of the property of Harriett Meyer bought in by him at tax sale in 1930—ordered that Harriett Meyer be permitted to redeem said property—county clerk instructed to issue redemption certificate.

In the matter of the petition of Henry Niefert et al, for aid in graveling certain road near Aurora—ordered that aid to the extent of \$125 be granted when improvements as proposed are satisfactorily completed.

In the matter of the petition of L. W. Hammer et al, for aid in improving the road in district 11 and 12—ordered that aid to the extent of 40 per cent of the amount of labor guaranteed, be given when the work has

been completed in a manner satisfactory to the roadmaster.

Falls Down a Mountain.

Tillamook, Or., June 23.—Dr. J. R. Salisbury, from Wisconsin, and Dr. T. L. Carr, of Gray's Harbor, while looking over timber on the Wilson river road Saturday night, were overtaken by darkness, and Dr. Salisbury fell from a 40-foot cliff. One of his legs, from his hip down, is badly bruised, and some bones are broken. He lay there all night, and would not allow his friend to come down for fear he might fall also. Dr. Carr lay on the top of the cliff until daylight Sunday morning, when they managed to get to a cabin about 20 feet away, where they are now.

The accident happened about two miles from Jim Harris' place. A force of men are working to clear a way to carry Dr. Salisbury out, which they expect to do by tomorrow night. The mountain is very rough and steep.

Russians Egg Serbian Officers.

St. Petersburg, June 23.—A party of Serbian officers met with a violent demonstration last evening while attending a performance at a variety theater. The audience hurled eggs and vegetables at them, shouting "Down with the murderers!" The Serbians were compelled to make a hasty withdrawal.
