Demand His Resignation

County Judge Scott rendered two decisions today, both for the removal of executors.

In the matter of the Fowler West estate Port B. West, executor, was ordered removed. In reviewing the testimony, the judge said: "It was shown that the executor did not keep an accurate book account of his dealings. He alleges that the expense of farming was \$5.85 per acre, and the returns only \$5. Still he continued to farm in the same way for four years. I think that the testimony clearly shows that he has wantonly disregarded the duties imposed upon him, for his personal gain, and that he has shown a lack of business energy, snap and business tactics."

J. S. Kerr was ordered removed as executor of the Coffey estate: "At the time Kerr was appointed there was a note outstanding for \$900, bearing 9 per cent interest. The evidence shows that the income of the place was not sufficient to pay the interest upon the note, the taxes upon the place and the cost of administration, to say nothing of paying the principal. It was the duty of the executor to get a new loan at a smaller rate of interest, or ask that part of the place be sold to pay the debts."

The court allowed Kerr's claim against the estate to the amount of \$154.

Carpenters Injured by Fall.

J. B. Coughlin and D. N. Williamson, who are building the handsome residence for Judge J. C. Christy, on Sixth street, met with a severe accident at noon yesterday. They were working on a scaffold about 15 feet above the ground, putting on a porch cornice, when, without any warning, the 2x8-inch plank they were standing on broke, letting them both fall to the ground. Mr. Williamson received a broken leg, just below the right knee, and his face and nose were badly cut and bruised. Under Dr. Wallace's care he is resting as well as could be expected.
