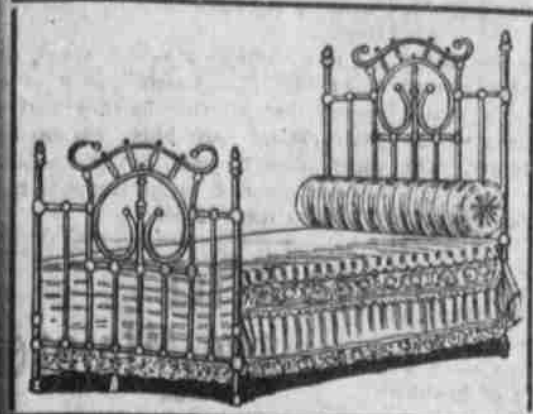

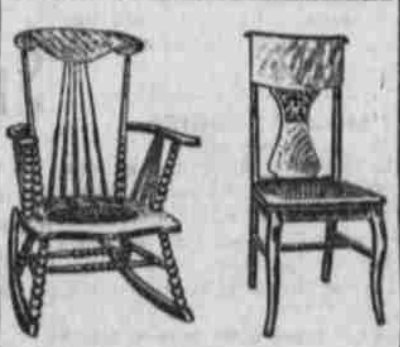

COUNTY ROAD NEWS

Some Improvements in the Fruitland Neighborhood

Influence of the Beet Sugar Industry on the Good Roads Question

County Surveyor Culver made a survey yesterday of a hill on the Fruitland road. The hill lies between two bridges and the county court intends to cut it down, using the dirt as fill and by so doing shorten both bridges. At the same time the hill, which is very steep, will be greatly reduced doing away with a heavy pull. About 400 feet of bridge will be saved and this will make a big saving to the county, as the repairing necessary to keep bridges in good order is very expensive. Mr. Culver made a similar survey last week of the Newsome Camp Ground hill. There is a long bridge at the foot of this hill and by filling in the bridge can be shortened 102 feet and the expense will be about the same as it would cost to replace the old structure which is in bad shape.

More than a mile of fill has been substituted for bridges in this county in the last three years and Judge Scott intends to continue this policy until all bridges are shortened as much as possible.

Beet Sugar and Good Roads.
The progress that is being made by the good roads movement is indicated by the action of the state legislatures and convention in favor of road improvement. The action of the recent Republican state convention in Ohio in unanimously adopting a strong good roads plank indicates the force and popularity which this movement has acquired in the north. This is the first time such a stand has been taken by Ohio Republicans since the birth of the party.

Mr. Chas. F. Saylor, special agent of the government for the investigation of the sugar industry, who has traveled through nearly all the Northern and Western states in the prosecution of his work, recently expressed the results of his observation as follows:

"Probably no other subject of interest to the rural population is receiving more attention throughout the nation than that of road improvement. One of the fundamental needs of society is a ready means of communication. The experiment stations of the country are now engaged in experimental work and actual demonstration with a view to stimulating the public mind and promoting the best and cheapest systems of good road building with local material, state legislatures are enacting better laws, and in some cases the principle of state aid has been adopted. The Federal government has established an office of public road inquiries in the department of agricultural literature has been prepared and distributed for the education of the people on this subject.

ty, "the mother of invention." When a beet sugar factory is established farmers at once discover the necessity of good roads. Agitation begins, public meetings are held, and every public highway becomes the object of solicited attention. It is found that the farmer requires at least four horses, and must deliver from two and a half to four tons of beets per load if he is to accomplish the best results in the saving of time and expense. Neighbors talk over road improvement and the idea becomes infectious. A public meeting is called, public roads are discussed, and an organization is effected which goes to work for the improvement of the roads. Among the interesting features of my work of promoting the progress of beet sugar industry, is attendance at these local meetings, at which roads and other subjects pertinent to the needs of these beet growing districts are considered. Permanent road building is one of the most important matters commonly discussed.

Reports from all sections indicate that the question of road improvement is one of the most popular subjects of discussion in farmer's meetings of all kinds, and state and national aid are being generally endorsed. The farmers are beginning to see that they have not received their share of attention from the national government, and to demand substantial recognition in the way of Federal aid and co-operation in the improvement of the rural highways.

Pay Car Abolished.

The railroad pay car, long a regular monthly visitor here, will make one more visit to these parts and then be retired. General Manager Kruttschnitt of the Southern Pacific Company has issued a circular announcing that the company's practice of paying its employees from pay cars will be discontinued after the May rolls are paid. Beginning July 1st all officers and employees on the Pacific system will be paid by checks, drawn by the auditor on the treasurer of the company in San Francisco. The checks will be drawn to the order of the employee, and when properly endorsed by the payee may be cashed by station agents, merchants and bankers at any point on the company's line, and be remitted just as any other negotiable paper, direct to the treasurer of the company, or to him through the regular banking channel. The system of paying by check is in vogue among the big railroads of the country, and the Southern Pacific is one of the last of the big systems to discontinue the pay car.

Hen Got a Certificate.

Who can say that a hen has not an eye to business? Yesterday one of the cackling producers of fresh eggs, brought to town by a good farmer's wife for somebody's Sunday dinner, became frightened by the unusual sights and sounds of the city, and, by a supreme effort, escaped from the pen in the farm wagon, and rushed frantically into the Citizens' National bank, almost scaring Sam Baer into the middle of next week. Before there was time to restore order, the hen laid an egg on the velvet carpet in the corner of the private office, and Manager Baer very politely issued a certificate of deposit to the new customer, and placed the egg in the big vault.—Baker City Democrat.
