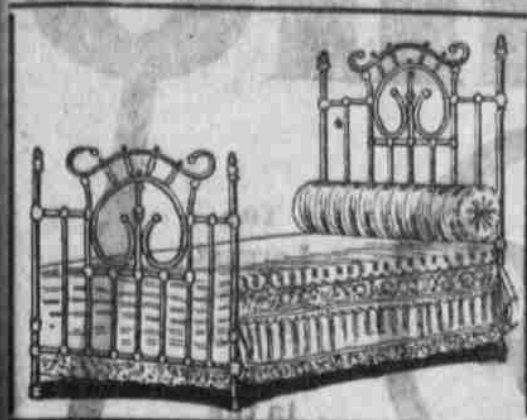

**CROPS NEVER FAIL**

Oregon Makes its Usual Good Showing

The Fruit Crop is Bountiful, Clover Yielding Well and Grain Full of Promise

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Oregon Section, for the week ending June 23d:

General Summary.

During the past week showers have occurred generally throughout the state, and nearly all sections have received beneficial rains. The ranges have improved wonderfully, and stock is in fine condition.

It is yet uncertain as to the final outcome of the grain crop. Fall grain is heading, with the straw unusually short, but the heads are of fair size and they seem to be filling nicely. Spring grain has improved greatly during the week, and in the Willamette valley it is also heading nicely.

In the Grand Ronde valley, in Southern Oregon, and in Umatilla and the adjoining counties more rain will be needed this month to insure good wheat yields.

Clover is ready to cut, but the showery weather has delayed its harvest. Early potatoes and peas are in the market, and late potato planting will be finished this week. Gardens are doing well, and corn has made a good growth. The cloudy, wet weather has caused complaints of lice to become more numerous in the hop yards. Cherries are ripening, and a fair crop is promised, notwithstanding the wet weather has damaged them somewhat in the western sections of the state. Bartlett pears, apples and prunes continue promising. Strawberries are abundant.

Coast District.

Bay City, Tillamook county, Capt. J. J. Dawson—Week squally; a large amount of early hay of different kinds cut, but did not get dry enough to haul, on account of dewy nights and light winds; it is now being badly spoiled by the rain; June cherries are bursting open; other cherries are nearly a month late; the ground is prepared for planting late potatoes and rutabagas.

Glen, Lincoln county, C. L. Knapp—Cold rains have had a detrimental influence on gardens, and completely stopped bees from storing honey; grass and grain look well; cattle in fine condition; fruit prospects fair.

Point Terrace, Lane county, S. J. Allison—Weather very favorable; all crops have made a good growth and promise good yields; fruit will be heavy; hay doing well; stock in good condition.

Myrtle Point, Coos county, L. Strong—The rain on the 17th did much good; some hay has been cut; crop will be heavy; grain and vegetables looking well; fruit will be a good crop; stock on ranges doing well; some shearing done.

Harbor, Curry county, A. H. Snodgrass—Cool and cloudy, with some rain; potatoes looking well; gardens rather backward; grass and hay a light crop; the lower mountain ranges are drying up; haying begun in the valleys; stock is fat; dairies not doing well; too dry.

Willamette Valley.

Hillsboro, Washington county, Grant Mann—Heavy rains during early part of week very beneficial to all kinds of vegetation; grain, both fall and spring, making good growth; fall grain headed out; clover will make a heavy crop, but timothy will be light.

Hubbard (Elliott Prairie district), Clackamas county, George Pope—Rain has been very beneficial to all cereal crops; pastures have also felt the effects; potatoes and root crops are doing well; the oat crop will be above average; corn backward; some clover cut, and the cutting of clover and vetch will be general next week; fruit is doing well.

Newberg, Yamhill county, J. W. Moore—Heavy rains 14th and 15th; ground at present too wet to cultivate corn and potatoes; grain and grass doing finely; cherries are ripening; strawberries plentiful; prune trees overloaded with fruit; everything is looking prosperous.

Salem R. F. D. No. 1, Folk county, W. F. Clark—The much needed rain has been of great benefit; wheat and oats heading very low, but will make good heads, and if they should all well may not fall much below average; some clover cut and very badly damaged by the rains; cherry picking be-

Belfountain, Benton county, A. H. Buckingham—Sunshine and showers during past week; prospects favorable for crops and gardens; berries and fruits are ripe, and stock is in excellent condition.

Rosedale, Marion county, C. O. Constable—Splendid rains during the week, putting everything in fine growing condition; with fair weather haying will begin in earnest the first of the coming week; all crops in good condition.

Fox Valley, Linn county, C. D. Wilson—All kinds of grain growing very fast and the yield promises to be above the average; hay crop is excellent; fruit all right.

Greenleaf, Lane county, Marlon P. Wheeler—Past week cool, with some needed rain; spring wheat and oats heading; early peas and cabbage ready to use; corn growing very slowly.
