MAPPING OUT THE NEW WARDS.

There is an important duty developing upon the present city council—mapping out the lines to divide the territory of Greater Salem into wards. The new territory will be added to the city by virtue of the charter on October 1, 1903, and the ward lines should be drawn before that time.

There are at present four lines, dividing the old city limits into as many wards, and these lines are drawn east and west from the river.

The bulk of the territory of Greater Salem has been added on the north and south of the present city.

If the city council should fail to draw the ward lines before the city election on the first Monday in December, the city council would have to choose the aldermen for the new territory, as soon as the new territory is divided into wards.

The council might even refuse to create new wards or elect new aldermen, and the present council of eight men might for a time run all of Greater Salem. But there is probably no such intention.

It is probable that at least one new ward will be created on the north and one on the south, and possibly one for Englewood and East Salem.

As the aldermen serve gratis, there is no harm in electing more good substantial citizens, who shall donate their time to the welfare of the city.

There will be a great deal of work on the new parts of Greater Salem, and this work cannot be well provided for by the eight members of the council.

It is not too early to take up this matter just as soon as the excitement of the Salem carnival is over with.

Let it be carefully considered from the standpoint of good business policies, and give the new territory proper representation.

There should be no such thing as gerrymandering Greater Salem in the interests of politics. If that were done the wards could be so arranged that the older parts of the city would control the election of aldermen from all the new territory.

This would be wrong, as the newer parts of the city have their own problems to work out, and must have their own representation.

But the matter of mapping out new wards should not be let go by default. Greater Salem should be fully organized by the next city election.

Colonel Edwin Stone has shown rare taste in getting up his advertising matter and good judgment in selecting an attractive summer girl for his drawing card to the sweetest and most enjoyable beaches in Oregon.

Good old Democrats like Dr. Oglesby, of Junction, who have been applying in vain for jobs on the Lewis and Clark fair, should remember that, although it is a Democratic board, a Republican push politician is, for many reasons, preferable, as he is sure to stand in with the graft. A Republican push secretary, who has never done anything for Oregon, but draw princely salaries, who never raised a strawberry except to eat it, at public expense, will see to it that all is done "according to program" and the program is that no honest Democrat need apply to the board, that is likely to be Democratic in nothing but to get the places. Carlisle to Be Heard From.

Atlanta, Ga., June 25.—That the Democratic party fully appreciates the important part the South will play in the approaching presidential campaign is evidenced by the events of the last week. In one section of the South the party has listened to a stirring speech from Judge Parker, who is regarded as a possible presidential nominee, and in Montgomery, Ala., an address was delivered by Edwin M. Shepard, the New York Democratic leader. Now the Democrats of Georgia are to hear John G. Carlisle on the political outlook and the event is regarded as all the more significant as it will be one of the very few public speeches made by Mr. Carlisle since his retirement from public life at the end of Mr. Cleveland's administration. Mr. Carlisle has been secured by the Young Men's Democratic League of this city and his address will be delivered tonight at the Grand opera house. It is expected that the state legislature now in session will attend in a body, together with other party leaders of prominence from all over Georgia.

Prineville's Loss.

The expense incurred in caring for the smallpox patients during the months of April and May reach a total of about \$5000. When it is considered that this is only a small fraction of the loss caused by the recent plague, it will be readily seen to what extent Prineville's business interests were injured. The great loss, however, is being compensated for, in part, by a renewed business activity, which is good to look upon.—Prineville Journal.

A Good Conductor.

A. M. Brown, of Crook county, served as a conductor for lightning from a barbed-wire fence to the earth the other day and lives to tell the story, and, more, carries the evidence of his narrow escape from instant death on his person. The Prineville Review of June 18th has this account:

Last week during the thunder storm Mike Brown, while assisting with

some cattle at the Meyer & Brown ranch, on Crooked river, had a taste of lightning. Mr. Brown was on the outside of the corral, and, wishing to get inside, commenced to crawl through a crack in the fence, where a barbed wire had been strung across, and, while under the wire, a flash of lightning came, following the wire until it struck Mr. Brown's shoulder, passing through his body and entering the ground at his feet. Where the lightning first struck Mr. Brown on the shoulder it left a large, sprawling red mark, with pustules raised all around it. For some time he was partially paralyzed, but soon recovered from the effects of the stroke.

No Trace of Lost Body

There is still no trace of the missing Albert Erickson, the 2½-year-old son of Olof Erickson, who disappeared from his home at Young's bay on last Saturday afternoon. The continued search for him has been so carefully made that it almost removes the possibility of the body of the little boy being secreted at any place in the immediate neighborhood. Rumors of different kinds have been rife, as to where the boy has been, and of finding his body, but there has been nothing of a definite character to base these on, and the boy's disappearance is as much of a mystery now as it was yesterday. The growing belief seems to be that the boy was killed and eaten by some hogs, which wandered around that vicinity, but no trace of blood or of the boy's clothing has been found. The search has not yet been abandoned, but those who have been conducting it are completely mystified.—Astoria Budget.
