Proposals for Supplies.

Salem, Ore., June 6, 1903.

The board of trustees of the Oregon State Insane Asylum hereby invites sealed proposals for furnishing the following supplies to the institution, for six months ending December 31, 1903: Groceries, mill feed and flour, meats and fish, dry goods, drugs, stationery, leather and findings, boots and shoes, plumbing, hardware, tinware and tinning, crockery and glassware. Lists of said supplies will be furnished by the clerk of the board upon application. Samples can be seen at the asylum, and goods must be in accordance therewith. All goods must be in strict accordance with sample in original packages when possible, and delivered at the State Insane Asylum within 20 days after the contract is awarded, and bids must be on blank forms, which will be furnished, together with instructions to bidders, by the clerk, upon application. Each bid on flour or meat must be accompanied by a certified check of \$300, and each bid on fish by a certified check of \$75, and all other bids by a certified check equal to 10 per cent of the amount bid, checks of unsuccessful bidders to be returned immediately, and those of accepted bidders when the contract is completed. Bids must be enclosed in sealed envelopes, and directed to the board, care of the clerk, and plainly marked, "Bids for Asylum Supplies," and the class of goods bid on should also be inscribed on the envelope. Price, fitness and quality being equal, preference will be given to articles manufactured, grown or produced in this state. When a particular article is specifically called for, bids for any other kind of manufacture, or brands equally as good, will be entertained, but to insure recognition of such bids samples of the articles it is proposed to supply must accompany them. The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to accept or reject any part of a bid. Bids will be opened at the Capitol, at Salem, at 10 a. m., Wednesday, July 8, 1903.

Joe Lane's Treaty Tree.

It is a matter for regret that the land marks of early Oregon history have not been better preserved. Features whose interest would increase with the years have been suffered to be destroyed through ignorance or indifference. In 1853 there was some trouble with the Rogue River Indians, though the war did not occur until two years later. In 1853 General "Joe" Lane, whose name is inseparably connected with the history of Oregon, made a treaty with the Rogue River Indians on a spot which is now included within the present city limits of Grants Pass. He met the Indians under a black oak tree on Rogue river, just above the "White Rocks." Old timers are still able to point out the stump of this tree, but the tree itself has been cut down and sawed into stove wood in these latter years, probably by some man who never heard of Joe Lane.

Modocs Returning to Klamath.

The migration of the Modoc Indians from the Indian Territory, where they were removed after the close of the Modoc war by the government, to their old homes in the Klamath reservation has begun. A few days ago there arrived at Agate, en route to Klamath, Chas. Hood, Henry Hudson, Sam Hall, Dan Clinton and Joe Spicer, all Modoc Indians, with their families. The men have acquired valuable lands in the territory during their long stay there, which they still possess, but they hope to have their children participate in the allotment of lands at their old homes on the Klamath reservation. The return of these Modocs is in the nature of a visit to their old hunting grounds, but it is probable that they will remain permanently.—Ashland Tidings.

Sealed bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Shoes, Leather and Findings, Plumbing Supplies, Hardware, Flour, Oats and Mill Feed, Fish, Meats, etc., will be received at the office of the Superintendent of the State Penitentiary until Thursday, July 8th, 1903, at 3 o'clock p. m. at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200.00 in cash or certified check payable to the superintendent must accompany each bid for meat, and of \$75 for bids for flour and fish, all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of a bid.

On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the Penitentiary within 20 days after the contract is awarded, unless otherwise provided in contract.

Schedules of the various lines of goods will be furnished upon application to the Superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following completion of contract, and monthly on continuous contracts.

Samples must accompany bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Flour and all other articles where practicable.
