RECEPTION TO DR. COLEMAN

About to Leave for a Tour of the East for Willamette

About 200 ladies and gentlemen responded to an invitation given on short notice for an informal reception to Dr. and Mrs. Coleman, at the First M. E. church, Wednesday evening. A very pleasant time was had, replete with hearty good-will for the president of Willamette and his wife, who are about to leave in a few days for the East, visiting Chicago, New York and other large cities, in the interest of the Willamette endowment funds. After a short program of music, General Odell acted as master of ceremony, and introduced some of the most notorious Methodists, promoters of education and destroyers of poultry, Elder Ford, of Eugene; Brer. Parsons, of Salem, and Elder Watters, of Eola. All made their usual felicitous style of talks that would get results out of anything, from a revival to a political convention of the grand and glorious prohibition party, when there followed a feast of nothing stronger than ice cream.

Dr. Coleman Talks.

Dr. Coleman was forced out of retirement in a corner, where he was hiding, and made one of his helpful talks, hopeful of the future, again explaining the necessity for united effort, in order that the school should enjoy a larger success. He intimated that it had endowed Oregon and other Northwestern states with good citizenship enough in the past 40 years to entitle it to a decent support from the men of great wealth.

There was a general outpouring of good will, and impouring of refreshments that lasted until nearly midnight. Mr. Coleman will proceed quietly about his business of raising the needed \$100,000 endowment in the East and here in the Northwest. He has made a favorable impression on our people, and his services are very much appreciated. He has helped pay off the debt and legacy of disaster and mismanagement of the past, and with ordinary good luck, raise that endowment. His influence has been for progress, for weeding out the unbusinesslike methods of the past, for dropping out the dead timber from the board of directors, and building up a strong and popular faculty. On these lines the school will become self-sustaining now, if the large incumbrance of dead-heads could be got rid of. But that would not be business with some people, and too much should not be expected even of a go-ahead man like Coleman. He certainly leaves for the East with the goodwill of all our people. He has done good work for the school, and all wish him God speed.

The Program Excellent.

The musical numbers consisted of a vocal solo by Miss Blanche Lewis, a violin solo by Miss Bess Tillson and two piano solos by Prof. Graham, principal of the piano department of the College of Music. After the program all present were introduced to Dr. and Mrs. Coleman, and the lady managers served a delicious lunch. The reception committee consisted of Gen. W. H. Odell, Dean W. C. Hawley, Prof. Mary A. Reynolds and Miss Jeannette Meredith; and Mrs. J. D. Lee, Mrs. Nettie Cook, Mrs. Amelia Dimmitt, Mrs. Ella Young, Mrs. Geo. Hatch, Mrs. J. W. Meredith and Mrs. C. L. Bean managed the affair for the trustees.

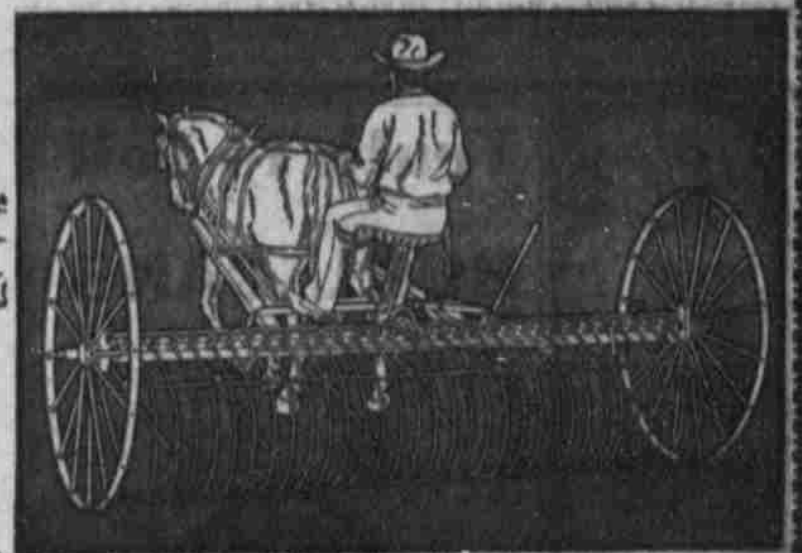
