CARNIVAL COMMITTEE WORKING

Details Gone Over and Gathered up for Success

General Manager Judah and His Loyal Helpers Putting on the Finishing Touches

The executive committee of the Greater Mid-Summer Carnival held an important business session at the office of General Manager Judah last evening. E. J. Arnold, owner and manager of the mammoth Pacific and Oriental Carnival Shows, was present, and reports his show as doing an immense business throughout the valley and the state. Mr. Arnold is very much pleased with the prospects for the Salem Carnival, and feels confident that the management will score a big success.

The executive committee, among other matters, made the following order:

Sub-Manager M. O. Buren was directed to look up 14 men to act as ticket takers during the carnival, and to report to the executive committee tonight.

It was ordered that one day and one night policeman be engaged to serve during the week on the Carnival grounds.

It was also ordered that the sale or use of fireworks on the grounds be expressly forbidden.

Manager Judah was directed to ask the city for the use of one fire hose reel, to be attached to an adjacent hydrant for use on the grounds, in case of fire. This was a wise move on the part of the committee, and if the city authorities grant the use of the reel, which they no doubt will, it will practically insure against all loss by fire.

The general manager was also directed to secure the services of D. A. Dinamo and Rudy Hopf to assist in preparing for the Queen's coronation.

The band under contract for service during Carnival week was placed under the direct orders of Sub-Manager Hal D. Patton. The Salem Marine band was also engaged to play on the Fourth.

It was ordered by the committee that the judges of the baby show shall not be appointed until two hours before the show opens.

The executive committee makes a formal and urgent request of all the merchants in the city to decorate their places of business for Salem's big Carnival week.

A number of young ladies are wanted to act as saleswomen in the "country store" on the Carnival grounds, and all who desire to act in this capacity are requested to call upon General Manager Judah, at the city recorder's office, tomorrow (Saturday) morning, between the hours of 9 and 12. Mr. Davenport, manager of the "country store," will meet them at any hour and place.

The merchants who have kindly offered to help out the "country store" will please have their contributions in shape and ready for delivery tomorrow afternoon, when St. Perkins and his hayseed band and salesmen take charge of the "country store."

For supplies for the Oregon State Penitentiary, during the period ending December 31, 1903.

Sealed bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Shoes, Leather and Findings, Plumbing Supplies, Hardware, Flour, Oats and Mill Feed, Fish, Meats, etc., will be received at the office of the Superintendent of the State Penitentiary until Thursday, July 9th, 1903, at 2 o'clock p. m. at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200.00 in cash or certified check payable to the superintendent must accompany each bid for meat, and of \$75 for bids for flour and fish, all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of a bid.

On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the Penitentiary within 30 days after the contract is awarded, unless otherwise provided in contract.

Schedules of the various lines of goods will be furnished upon application to the Superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following completion of contract, and monthly on continuous contracts.

Samples must accompany bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Flour and all other articles where practicable.
