

RUTH COZAD KILLED

Hack Falls From Bridge Over Dry Run

Her Skull Crushed and Neck Broken--Sad Ending to a Day of Pleasure

Ruth, the 2-year-old daughter of Marion Cozad, of French Settlement, was instantly killed shortly before midnight last night, by the plunge of a two-seated hack from a bridge that spans the small creek not far beyond the soldiers' home, and just this side of the Wiles farm. There were seven persons in the vehicle, and one horse was drawing it. The occupants were Mr. and Mrs. Cozad and their four children and David Gremot. The party had been taking in the carnival at Roseburg during the day, and at a late hour started home to French Settlement. When they arrived at the bridge where the fatal accident occurred, it seems the horse, in the darkness, stepped to near the edge of the structure, which has no side-railing, throwing the two right wheels of the hack off the bridge, tipping it over into the dry creek, together with its load of human freight. The horse was jerked down along with the buggy and its occupants, but was not much hurt. Investigation disclosed the unfortunate child with a fractured skull and a broken neck, while the rest of the party had sustained only a few inconsequential bruises. The child was removed to the home of U. S. Barker, and Dr. Houck was immediately sent for, but when the physician arrived it was found that the child was beyond reach of all human aid.

The remains of the little girl were taken to Oakland today for burial. It was a terrible and ending to a day of enjoyment.—Roseburg Review.

It Will do Little Good

Washington, June 26.—The state department officials believe, owing to messages which have passed between Cassini and the Russian government, that the Jewish petition won't be refused, but will receive a respectful answer. There is not much confidence, however, that it will accomplish much good.

If Russia refuses to receive the protest of the B'nai B'rith against the treatment of the Jews, which will be forwarded by President Roosevelt, Ambassador McCormick may delay his return to St. Petersburg, and the Russian ambassador, who will sail for home next week, may make a correspondingly long stay in his native land. Intimations have reached Washington that the prime minister will never allow the note to reach the czar, as Russia holds firmly to its policy that no foreign interference will be brooked in its dealings with the Jews.

President Roosevelt will do nothing further than forward the petition of the Jews to the ruler of Russia, but in doing this he reverses his decision to take no steps whatever. He first

held that the law of international comity prevented his taking official cognizance of the petition.

King Peter Stands in

Belgrade, Serbia, June 26.—The newspapers today announce that King Peter has granted amnesty to all political offenders, which would include the assassins.

Wohlfarth Discharged

J. Wohlfarth was placed under arrest by Officer Larry Murphy last night, accused of breaking into the residence of J. D. Sutherland Wednesday afternoon. He was put through a sweating this morning, and strongly denied his guilt, so Chief Gibson allowed him to go.

Wohlfarth is about 17 years of age, and resides with his mother at No. 187 Cottage street, the home being directly across the street from the Sutherland house. He was formerly an inmate of the Oregon state reform school. When arrested he confessed to having been guilty of petty thievery in the past, but insisted that he was innocent of the crime with which he is charged.

Eugene has New Pitcher

A. Somers, the new pitcher signed by Manager Mahoney for the Eugene team, arrived here last night from Roseburg. Somers was much impressed with Eugene, and likes it better than any other town in the valley. He had not signed up with the Roseburg team, and had no intention of doing so. To Replevin a Bull Calf

A civil action was commenced in Justice Horgan's court today, in which F. Goffin is plaintiff and L. L. Aral and Mrs. Aral are defendants. The suit is to replevin a bull calf, two years old, which the plaintiff claims the defendants have in their possession. The case will be heard July 8th.

Gone Down the Line.

Thos. Burrows is having an old building in the rear of Patton Brown torn down. For the last few years it has been used as a woodshed, but, when Salem was a village, it faced on Commercial street, and was among the best business houses in the city. As the town grew into a city the old building was turned into a feed store, and at last was moved to make room for a brick block. It has outlived its usefulness, and is now being converted into kindling wood.

The walking delegates of the building trades mechanics in New York, despairing of making peace with the employers, have decided to order a strike.

About 1000 carpenters employed by the various Chicago packing houses at the stockyards have struck for an eight-hour day and 50 cents an hour.

DALLAS WOOL POOL

The Whole Lot Sold Today at Good Price

Dallas, Or., June 26.—(Special to The Journal.)—After turning down two sets of bids, the wool growers' pool finally sold the entire lot of wool at 17½ cents per pound. The bids of a week ago were 16c, 16½c and 16¾c, all of which were rejected. Then another lot of bids was received, which

were the same. These were also declined, and a sealed bid was received from M. D. Ellis for Bussard & Robinson of Albany for 17½c, which was accepted. This deal is perfectly satisfactory, and the entire pool will be delivered under its terms.
