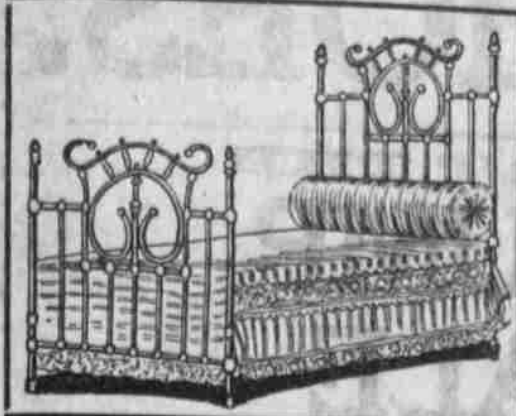

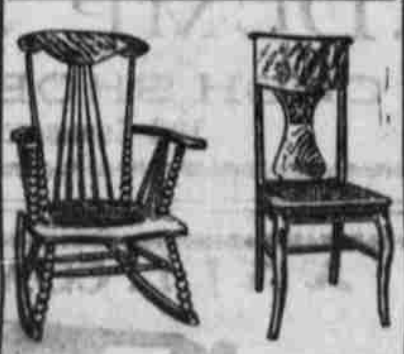

WITH MARK TWAIN

Dr. Bullard Tells of the "Innocents Abroad"

Daniel Sloat and Dr. Jackson Also Companions and Most Stories Were True

Dr. Henry Bullard, for 23 years pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian church of St. Joseph, Mo., was one of the "Innocents" who made the foreign tour on which Mark Twain got much of the material for his famous book, "Innocents Abroad." Dr. Bullard tells the St. Joseph News that most of the incidents related in the book actually took place, many of them happening under his personal observation.

"All who have read 'Innocents Abroad,'" says he, "will remember 'Doc' and 'Dan.' It was with the aid of this pair that Twain played most of his jokes on the guides at various points, but it is probable that very few know who 'Doc' and 'Dan' were in real life. 'Doc' was a Dr. Jackson of Chicago and 'Dan' was Daniel Sloat, a most genial mortal, who seemed always about ready to explode with laughter. He was the direct antithesis of Dr. Jackson, who was solemn, dignified, and dry, but the doctor, in his way, was almost as much of a humorist as Twain. Twain spoke very slowly, with a nasal drawl; Jackson spoke briskly and with apparent dignity. Twain would sometimes make the guides angry, because they could always tell that he was chaffing them, but Jackson had them guessing. It is likely that most of them thought Jackson an escaped lunatic.

"As to Sloat, he usually took a passive part in the pestering of guides—probably because he couldn't trust himself to keep a sober face. He would usually stand by until the situation became too irresistibly funny, and then he would step aside some where where the guides couldn't see him and blow off.

"However, Sloat was always a lively hand when it came to relating the day's experiences at night on board the ship. At such times the entire ship's company would gather about the three humorists; it was looked forward to as a regular feature of the voyage. And I believe that Twain counted on these recitals to give him inspiration for the book he was planning. He was a very attentive listener at such times, and seemed to be noting the effects produced on the company by the sallies of Jackson or Sloat. He wrote out some of the sketches during the voyage. He worked very hard on some of the passages, writing and rewriting some of them time and again.

In the party was a Mr. Langdon, a young gentleman with whom Twain became quite friendly, and when we reached New York on our return, Twain went home with him as his guest.
