Battle of Monmouth.

Freehold, N. J., June 27,-The 125th anniversary of the historic battle of Monmouth, in which "Molly Pitcher" performed the deed which has banded her name down to posterity, was celebrated here today on a large scale, Governor Murphy and numerous other dignitaries participated in the exercises, which began at sunrise with the firing of the national salute from Monmouth Park. Later in the morning there was a large parade of the state militia and numerous civic and patriotic bodies, which were reviewed at the court house by the governor and other notables.


