### Battle of Monmouth.

Freehold, N. J., June 27.—The 125th anniversary of the historic battle of Monmouth, in which "Molly Pitcher" performed the deed which has handed her name down to posterity, was celebrated here today on a large scale. Governor Murphy and numerous other dignitaries participated in the exercises, which began at sunrise with the firing of the national salute from Monmouth Park. Later in the morning there was a large parade of the state militia and numerous civic and patriotic bodies, which were reviewed at the court-house by the governor and other notables.

At noon the commemorative ceremonies began at the battle monument. They consisted of an invocation by Bishop Scarborough, an address by Theodore W. Morris, president of the Monmouth Battle Commission, and the reading of a poem written for the occasion by Will Carlton. Governor Murphy spoke briefly, and then introduced Senator Fairbanks, of Indiana, who delivered the chief oration of the day. Patriotic songs were sung, and the exercises concluded with prayer by Bishop McPaul, of Trenton.

## READY FOR THE CARNIVAL

Our Gracious Queen, Agnes, Selects Her Court

High Dignitaries, Beautiful Maids of Honor, Dainty Pages Features of the Coronation

In all great enterprises, like the Salem Carnival, the great volume of work and detail incident come to the surface during the last few days of preparation, and generally everything is chaos, but so carefully has each detail been worked out in Salem's case that everything is running smoothly. The grounds are fenced and the arch at the grand court of the Carnival on Wilson avenue is ready for its final treatment, and will be handled in an expert manner by Committeeman Frank Willman, and will be a beautiful sign of welcome to the thousands of patrons who will flock here next week. It will be brilliantly decorated for day service in the national colors, and by night will blaze with over 200 colored incandescents, placed there by the Salem, Light, Power & Traction Company, which will thus display its facilities for such service.

The Wilson avenue site, where the Carnival will be held, will present a lively and interesting sight. The ground to be covered by tents and other auxiliaries of the festival, aggregating 10,000 square feet, runs from State street to Court through the avenue. There will be nine tents, the largest of which is 100x210 feet, the lesser tents being 50x75 feet.

Queen Agnes I has appointed her court, which will be as follows:

Chamberlain, Henry W. Meyers; usher-in-chief, Harry Olinger; maid of honor, Miss Maude MacKay; maid of honor, Miss Mabel Jones; pages, babies Caroline Dick and Marjorie Kay; ambassador for Oregon, Governor Geo. E. Chamberlain; ambassador for Greater Salem, Mayor Charles P. Bishop; gentlemen in waiting, Carnival committee of 12.

The Queen will be attired as follows:

The gown will be white crepe de chene, trimmed in old Flemish lace. The waist will have a deep yoke of the lace, and below this it will be shirred. The skirt has a panel of shirring down the front, with yoke and bands of lace.

The robe will be of royal red, trimmed in white ermine and Duchesse lace, and lined with white. The royal robes will only be worn at night, and in the parade the Queen will wear a white nun's veiling over silk and trimmed with tucks and lace. A large white hat will be worn with this costume. The crown worn with the royal robes is being made by Chas. Hinges, and is a beautiful creation of jewels and precious stones. It is of great value.

Arrangements are in progress to have the Queens of several of the other carnival cities, and the Queen of the Astoria regatta, in attendance on the Salem Queen and her escort, and there will be such a galaxy of beauty turned loose in the Capital City as was never before seen in Oregon.

New Features Introduced Nightly to Close Carnival Week

Never was there such an enthusiastic audience as that which witnessed the performance at Shield's Park last night, and the crowd fairly went wild over the various features that were introduced. The Park, however, will reopen directly after the close of the Carnival with a strong bill, and play nightly until the close of the summer season.

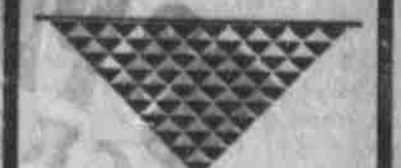

Bids of said supplies will be furnished by the clerk of the board upon application. Samples can be seen at the asylum, and goods must be in accordance therewith. All goods must be in strict accordance with sample in original packages when possible, and delivered at the State Insane Asylum within 20 days after the contract is awarded, and bids must be furnished, together with instructions to bidders, by the clerk, upon application. Each bid on flour or meat must be accompanied by a certified check of \$200, and each bid on fish by a certified check of \$75, and all other bids by a certified check equal to 10 per cent of the amount bid, checks of us-
