## UPHOLD WORK OF UNION

### Members of Berry Craft Talk Over Work of Season

The Organization Scored a Great Success in all its Undertakings

There was a good attendance Saturday afternoon at the reunion of the Salem Fruit Growers' Union, at Marion square. On account of the showers the picnic did not come off, although many of the individual growers and their families brought in basket dinners, and ate them anywhere in the dry and between showers. At 1:30 p. m. there was quite a crowd of the berry growers at the square, but as the music stand was locked up, they got seats on the outside and went through with a very interesting program, consisting mostly of reports of members as to their success in disposing of their crop through the Union. Below are printed the statements of some, and a great many more made similar statements upholding the work of the Union in every particular. The contracts with the Portland shipping firm and with the cannery are being executed to the letter, and there was never so great a result secured for so small an outlay.

### Some Talks Made.

H. B. Thielson opened the program with a talk on "Straw," the first part of the strawberry program. The last straw to break the camel's back was, in his opinion, those who got the benefit of the Union, but would not help make it a success.

A much higher price would have been secured had those outside the Union not entered into violent competition with each other to break the market.

The growers had all learned a great deal about growing fruit and marketing the same. Many members of the Union had not taken the greatest pains to prepare for the market.

There had not been enough pains taken to grade the fruit. Even potatoes had to be graded to get the best results. It always paid to do this.

J. M. Kyle talked about berries from the commission man's standpoint. The growers usually had the experience, and the commission man the rest of the proceeds.

Many families had not been able to get their usual supply at 65 to 75c a crate for home canning. He had to go to the country and pay \$1.25 a crate for his.

There was a great demand for strawberries for preserving in New York. For this purpose they were put up in glass. At Salem this kind of berries would be put up in barrels and sent by freight.

Noah Welch stated that he was satisfied with the result of shipping and at the cannery.

He used to take 75 cents a crate in trade, and he had done considerably better this season.

Mr. Hatch said all he sold through the Union netted \$1.07 a crate. The cannery also had treated him well; he having no canning berries to sell, but got three cents for them.

Grove Hensley said his crop of Wilsons was very short, two acres of Wilsons producing, all told, 25 crates—only a half acre being planted a year ago. Used some Complete No. 2 fertilizer.

Mr. Jorgensen stated that he was pleased with the Union. Regretted that some of his neighbors had not helped. The Union had almost doubled the profit for all engaged in the berry business. Potash, nitrogen and lime were needed in this valley. Many made the mistake of applying it wrong. On poor land this would pay.

Wm. Lansing got 24 crates off one and a half acres of Wilsons. Most of his plants were without blooms on plants, and as high as 12 or 15 plants were without fruit in a row. A neighbor took 300 crates off an acre and a quarter of Wilsons.

Mr. Dow who has the Huffstetter place, said he got 70 crates off one-fourth acre of that variety. He picked some too ripe, and lost them. Set out an acre that produced some fruit.

Mr. Gellott said off nine rows of Oregon, 200 plants to the row, he got 45 or 50 crates, after setting out several thousand plants. Was well pleased with the work of the Union.

G. P. Livingston said he had not much experience, but had put out several acres. He favored the Union, and hoped when the new charter went

## into effect, that peddling would be prohibited.

### The President's Address

Was devoted to relating the experiences of an amateur city berry grower, and the troubles of a sidewalk farmer. None of the Union had made so much money this year that their houses were robbed. The strawberry grower was never out of work. The supply of labor for himself and family were not likely to give out, as there was always hoeing, cultivating, planting, training vines or cutting off runners to do, yet it was a crop where most of the work came when there were no other crops to keep one busy. Berries and cream went hand in hand, and the 200 acres of strawberries at Salem made a demand for the milk and cream of 1200 Jersey cows somewhere. The Union made its mark on the market this year, and while some of the babies would undoubtedly get the blue label, so far none had been born with a strawberry mark. Working out theories was very interesting, but they did not always work out in the field as well as on paper.

The Union had no strikes, no boycotts, and no lock-outs. The best of good feeling had been maintained toward growers not in the Union, with the hope that they would come in whenever they saw the benefit of it, and in the meantime do all they could to help up prices. There has been no effort to force any one into the Union, or to coerce any merchant to handle Union goods. It was his belief that the merchant would in the near future find it to his interest to buy all his berries from the Union, and co-operate to maintain retail prices at a fair standard. The Union had paid pickers better wages, had got better prices, had reduced competition by taking over 100 crates out of competition, and had improved the pack and made a wider market for the Salem berry. Another year would see still better results, and he expressed the belief that next year the Union would be strong enough to put its own product into the market without any commission house. The World's Fair year would enlarge the demand, and all would be prepared to take advantage of these conditions.
