OVERMarie Ware and Horace
McKinley to Stand
TrialMust Answer to the Charge
of Forgery in United
States District
Court

Marie L. Ware and Horace G. Mc-
Kinley had their preliminary exam-
ination before United States Commis-
sioner J. A. Sladen last week and Sat-
urday were bound over to await the
action of the United States grand
jury. The charges against them is
that of forging the names of witnesses
to applications for timber lands.

The complaint avers that on or
about April 5, 1901, the name of Robert
Simpson was forged to a home-
stead application for a tract of land,
and recites further that the cognom-
ens of Robert G. Tupman and Wil-
liam B. Abbott were forged, as the
witnesses purporting to know the
qualifications of the applicant. About
the same date, it is alleged that the
fictitious personage of Robert G. Tup-
man entered a homestead application
with Robert Simpson and George E.
Thompson signed as witnesses. An-
other forged homestead application is
claimed to have been made May 18,
1901, by Frank H. Herne, with James
E. Warwick and William H. Watkins
as witnesses. The same date was en-
tered of record an application by
James E. Warwick whose witnesses
were William H. Watkins and Samuel
L. Carson. Here is charged a like
step by William H. Watkins as home-
stead applicant and James E. War-
wick and Frank H. Herne as wit-
nesses. These alleged forged and
fraudulent applications, according to
the formal charge, were all signed
and proved before Miss Ware as
United States commissioner, and then
forwarded to the land office at Rose-
burg to be entered on the records of
that office. The charge specifically
sets forth the contention that none
of the names mentioned in these
several deals are those of real persons,
but, on the contrary, that they were
created for the express purpose of
enabling the supposed conspirators
to acquire title to government lands.
The following are mentioned as wit-
nesses in the case: Clyde D. Lloyd,
John A. Wesco, W. S. Chrisman, Ben
Lurch, R. M. Veatch, Frank McIn-
tyre, J. J. Jennings and Edward Hob-
son.

Outlook Dark for Mrs. Phares.
Mount Holly, N. J. June 29.—The
case of Mrs. Annie E. Phares, charged
with the poisoning of her husband,
was called for trial in the
county court today. The defendant
appeared in court looking much better
than at the time of her arrest. Dur-
ing her stay in jail she has gained
several pounds in weight, she is
bright of eye, and the marks of worry
and anxiety which lined her rounded
face at the early stages of her case
have altogether disappeared.

The prosecution appears confident
of securing the woman's conviction
and it is not expected that the trial
will last more than three or four days.
The attorneys for the state declare
that there could not be a clearer case
against the defendant, while the de-
fense maintains a discreet silence as
to its line of battle for her life. The
prosecution says it will show that
every symptom of strychnine poison
was very pronounced in Phares' death
and that Mrs. Phares purchased
30 grains of this poison on the morn-
ing before her husband died. Wit-
nesses are prepared to testify, the
prosecution declares, that Mrs. Phares
gave her husband some powders upon
returning from her trip. Almost im-
mediately after these powders were
taken Phares gave evidence that there
was something unusual the matter
and, according to the testimony of
those in the house, his movements
were watched closely and sufficiently
to add damaging evidence to the case
of the prosecution.

One important card upon which the
prosecution depends is the testimony
of Garfield Taylor, the young man for
whose love Mrs. Phares is alleged to

have killed her husband. Taylor, it
is said, will tell freely all he knows of
the case. The attorneys for the de-
fense, on the other hand, appear not
to be appalled by the outlook and de-
clare that the state will be totally un-
able to establish a sufficient motive for
the alleged crime.

Heppner Will Rebuild.
The everlasting pluck of the Amer-
ican people is shown in the determina-
tion of the citizens of Heppner to re-
build their city. Many of them, it is
true, those who have lost all or part
of their families in the terrible disas-
ter, feeling that the Heppner hills
and the waters of Willow creek would
be a perpetual reminder of their loss,
which they could not endure, have
moved away; others will follow. But
a majority have resolved to stay and
rebuild their little city, and when
time has healed the scars on human
hearts and effaced the traces of the
flood along the valley of Willow creek
Heppner will become once more the
happy, prosperous center of a pro-
gressive community it was before
death rode on the storm on that
eventful Sunday evening. In the
meantime the generous hearted peo-
ple of the state are responding nobly
to the cry of distress from their fel-
low citizens, and aid is being sent in
amount commensurate with the great-
ness of the need.

Laws Against Tobacco.

Notwithstanding there is a strict
law in Oregon against the sale of to-
bacco to minors a large number of
them use the weed. There should be
a law providing for the arrest of the
boy himself as is the case in many
states.—Junction City Times.

A good idea, and in order to escape
a penalty the boy should inform the
authorities where he procured his
tobacco and if the ones furnishing it
were made to answer for their actions
it would soon be impossible for boys
to procure this filthy weed at all. A
man who arrives at the age of discre-
tion before acquiring this habit gener-
ally goes through life with no such
acquisition.—Drain Nonpareil.

Roseburg, June 29.—Saturday's

Roseburg brought in three and Eugene
one.

weakened, and this, with a couple of
rank decisions at critical moments,
gave the visitors three runs in the
sixth and three in the seventh. Brad-
ley then went into the box for the
home team, and retrieved matters ma-
terially, but the score of the visitors
was too large to overcome.

In the sixth inning, as Reed was
making a slide on third base, both he
and Whiteaker went down, and the
latter received an injury below the
right eye, which compelled him to re-
tire from the game.

Concerning Saturday's game at Al-
bany, the Herald says:

That was the way the official score
was recorded yesterday. The runs
were not all earned, but the goose
egg certainly was Umpire McCor-
mick was in the game from the start,
and at the commencement of the sixth
inning was it. It happened something
like this: Corford, Salem's left field-

er, was first to bat; one strike was
called and he thought he had a hard
deal. Strike No. 2 went over the
plate just under his arms, and he
yelled to the umpire: "What, so
chase yourself." The umpire ordered
him to the bench, but he refused to
leave. Captain Haines interceded in
his behalf, but was warned by the
umpire to get Corford on the bench.
After a few warnings Umpire McCor-
mick pulled out his watch, and at the
expiration of time called the game
forfeited in Albany's favor by a score
of 9 to 0. The crowd supported the
umpire in his decision as it is very un-
pleasant to have players hold up the
umpire and dispute his decisions.

There is some doubt expressed as to
whether the umpire's decision will
stand; it being claimed that he did
not comply with the rules. However
that may be, and much as Salem dis-
likes to see its team beaten, the gen-
eral opinion is that our boys needed
discipline, and that, while the treat-
ment is heroic, it may cure an over-
grown propensity to chew the rag.

The Row Over Somers.

The Roseburg and Eugene papers
are having a controversy over one
Somers, who, it is claimed, agreed to
play with each team, and, as a result,
is now playing with neither. The
amusing part of the argument is that
each town insists that he is a low
down scrub, and each feels aggrieved
that they didn't get him. A Roseburg
paper goes to the matter thus:

The Eugene Guard says, about the
controversy over Pitcher Somers:

"Somers was seen this morning by
a reporter, and said that if he had
known the conditions at Roseburg he
would not have gone there at all, and
that the story that he had signed with
them was a fake. The team left this
afternoon for Roseburg, and Tallafiero
and Somers will occupy the box."

Somers simply lied, as usual, in re-
gard to not accepting advance money,
and the Guard is lowering its standard
as a newspaper in defending his dirty
actions. When the "Inland Empire"
league went to pieces Somers was
stranded, and wrote the Roseburg
management for a job. An offer was
made him by letter, and he wired that
the terms were accepted, and that he
would come upon receipt of a railroad
ticket, which was sent him. He
reached here Friday evening and
pitched for Roseburg Saturday at En-
gine, although the Eugene manage-
ment claimed they signed him up on
his way to Roseburg. Notwithstanding
this they allowed him to go ahead
and pitch against them Saturday, and
was to have done so Sunday, but rain
interfered. Looking at it from any
standpoint, it is hard to determine
whether Somers or the Eugene man-
agement is the dirtier. When the ru-
mor reached Roseburg that Somers
was about to "jump," he denied it so-
lemnly to the captain of the team, and
signed off the following night to join
his co-conspirators at Eugene, with-
out saying a word to anyone.

The Guard is wrong in saying that
Somers will play here today. Presi-
dent Turner of the Willamette
League, put a veto on that, and Som-
ers shipped out for Coos county early
this morning, where he hopes to get
a job with a ball team. The team that
hires him there will probably regret it
if there is any money bet on the game.
The fellow is evidently out for the
"stuff," and is for sale to the highest
bidder.

Now the Eugene players are saying
they had no idea that they would be
allowed to play Somers, but only
wanted to get him away from Rose-
burg, a result they have accomplished,
and that they are satisfied to ship him
into another league to be a disturbing
factor. In any event it makes public
the character of the Eugene manage-
ment, and their action is disgusting
to lovers of honest sport.

To which the Eugene Guard replies:
Somers, Eugene's new pitcher, came
back from Roseburg last night. He
has no use for Roseburg people. Dur-
ing the short time he was there last
night they tried to rotten egg him,
and even attempted assault and bat-
tery, anything to get him out of town
and out of the game.

They have boiled the matter of his
signing with them down to the fine
point of saying that he signed a tele-
gram stating that he would come.
The facts of the case are that Rose-
burg can't pay the men they have al-
ready, and wanted to keep Somers
from playing with any other team,
by claiming that he signed with them.
They are playing a dirty game, and
making fools of themselves.

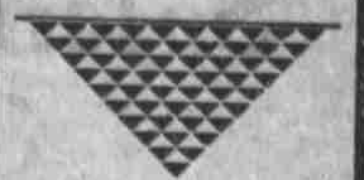
And still the war of words goes mer-
