WATCHES SOLD AT AUCTION

Saturday Night There was a Great Crowd in Spite of Rain

The past week has seen hundreds of people made happy buying jewelry, watches, diamonds, silver plate and cut-glass at their own terms at the Barr auction sale, and a great big hole has been knocked in the largest stock in the Willamette valley. In spite of the bad weather, the store was jammed to overflowing Saturday night, and people cried their bids into the open door off the street. The watches are about two-thirds gone, a big slice has been cut out of the cut-glass, and silverware begins to show the effect of selections. The rest will go at any old price, and the managers realize that they must sell cheaper than ever to hold the crowds. About half the bidders are ladies, and they alone get seats, the men bidders standing with their hands clasped tightly about their pocketbooks. Each lady today got a souvenir at the afternoon sale, and there is a big sale on this evening. The Barr auction sale is holding its own against the vaudeville, the Quaker show and the Carnival, and is one of the best entertainments in town, people coming from adjoining counties to buy watches at auction, who have been putting it off all their lives. The sale will continue this week.

He Loved Not Wisely.

Dan Hoffman, who has lived on Salt Creek for some 20 years, has had several experiences in the direction of matrimony, but, by the aid of his friends, managed to escape the nets set for him, until a few months ago. The story goes that in a lawyer's office in Salem he met a woman, and they formed a mutual admiration society, which ripened into matrimony. She went to his home, but things became monotonous. He had some money, and was persuaded to mortgage his home for \$400, so that they might go East to visit his brother. She managed the finances, bought tickets and they started, but he soon found himself drifting back home without wife or money. Drowned While Fishing.

Medford, Or., June 29.—News has been received from Agate by telephone that John G. Vandyk, Jr., was drowned while fishing on the Rogue river, just above Bybee's bridge, 12 miles from Medford, between 4 and 5 p. m. Sunday. He was in company with Ed. Bodge, Guy Childers and Al. Eisenhart, all of whom saw him drown, but could not get to his assistance.

Mr. Vandyk was about 29 years old, a member of the dry goods firm of J. G. Vandyk & Co., also a member of the city council. He was one of Medford's most popular young men, and his sudden death has cast a gloom over the entire community.

Upon receiving the news about 50 young men left here for the river in hope of recovering the body, but, as yet, it has not been found. He has been married about six months, and his young wife is prostrated. He also left a father, mother, brother and sisters.

First Try-Out Race Today.

Newport, June 29.—The Reliance meets the Columbia and Constitution today in the first of six races which will decide the choice of the cup defender. So far the Reliance has never had a trial in seaway. The Columbia has been given a thorough overhauling. The limit today is five and a half hours. A drizzling rain this afternoon was followed by a piping 15-knot breeze, with a good jump on the sea. Yachtsmen say if the Reliance shows as good form as on smooth water she will prove a wonder. The committee's yacht reached the lightship at 11 o'clock, and decided today's course to be a 15-mile beat eastward and return. They started at 12:15, with the Columbia first across the line, Reliance next, and twenty minutes later the Constitution turned toward the shore as though she had met with an accident.

An Educated Fool Nigger.

Wilmington, Del., June 29.—Rev. Montrose W. Thornton, colored, pastor of the First African Methodist church, of this city, preached a sensational sermon to his congregation to-night. He said in part: "The white man, in the face of his boasted civilization, stands before my eyes tonight the demon of the world's races, a monster incarnate, and in so far as the negro race is concerned seems to give no quarter. The white is a heathen, a fiend, a monstrosity before God, and is equal to any act in the category of crime. I would sooner trust myself in a den of hyenas than in his arms. With a court, law and officers of the law in his hands the despised negro can expect no mercy, justice or protection. The negro is unsafe anywhere in this country. He is the open prey at all times of barbarians who know no restraint, and will not be restrained. "There is but one part left for the persecuted negro when charged with crime, and when innocent. Be a law unto yourself. You are taught by this lesson of outrage to save yourself from torture at the hands of the blood-seeking public. Save your race from insult and shame. Be your own sheriff, court and jury as was the outlaw Tracey. Die in your tracks, perhaps drinking the blood of your pursuers. Booker T. Washington's charity, humanity, advice of forgiveness, love, industry and so on will never be recognized by white men."
