THE CUP LIPTON WANTS

Where it Came From and Who Gave it

History of the Famous Prize, Which Others Have Tried to Win Since 1851

1851—America won the Royal Yacht Squadron cup in the regatta around Isle of Wight. Cup afterward called America cup. Cup presented July 8th to the New York Yacht club by the owners of America, J. C. Stevens, Edwin A. Stevens, Hamilton Wilkes, J. Beekman Finley and George L. Schuyler.

1870—James Ashbury made the first attempt to lift the cup with his Cambria. He was required to sail against a fleet, as in the race in which the cup was won. Of the yachts participating the Cambria was beaten by all except the Idler. The winner of the first race was the Magic. The America was also entered.

1871—For the first time two representative boats only were raced. Mr.

The Weather.

The government forecast for tonight and Wednesday is showers, and warmer Wednesday.

WORK IN THE GARDEN.

At this time if you want continuous roses, use some water, and cultivate lightly, using plenty of mulch to hold moisture in soil.

Work up the sweet peas, put on some additional manure, and use water to keep the vines thrifty. Pluck flowers three times a week.

A second crop of peas can be planted now if you can get the soil moist enough to spade it up and pulverize it thoroughly.

Put up strings for the trailing nasturtiums, and they will climb five to ten feet high, depending on water and rich mulch about the roots.

Gladiolus need water and plenty of rich manure on the ground for a mulch. The same is true for any water-sucking flower, like the cannas or dahlias.

Lilies should not be allowed to dry up and die down too early, as they will not make strong bulbs, and are likely to start in the fall, and thus ruin the bulbs.

Thin the onions properly and set out all fall cabbage and brocoli. Put the roots down to the fresh earth and nearly all will live.

Ground that early potatoes come off can be dragged and set to late cabbage and winter sprouts.

FAVORABLE BUILDING CONDITIONS

A great many houses are going up in Salem and there is a very favorable condition for building in this city.

The lumber supply is improving, as the Salem mills are running, and considerable lumber is coming in from the country mills.

The advance in lumber is not as much as many people supposed, being only about ten dollars on the \$100 of previous years.

The labor unions are taking very conservative grounds and encouraging all the building operations possible.

They take the very reasonable view that it is undesirable to bring about the paralysis of industry that was created at Portland.

They realize that a forced blockade with capital organizing on one side and labor up in arms on the other will injure both.

So many houses are being built without enforcing union rules, and people are being left undisturbed to build pretty much as they can.

The unions are right in laboring to secure good wages and better hours, and they are right in refusing to adopt coercive measures.

Favorable conditions for building will result in hundreds of houses and business buildings going up at Salem before the year is over.

THE BICYCLE ORDINANCE.

There is great interest in the pending ordinance to regulate the use of bicycles in the city of Salem.

It is understood the city council is nearly evenly divided as to the merits of the proposed ordinance.

The matter will not come up until the next regular meeting on Tuesday evening, July 7th.

The Stolz ordinance has been amended in accordance with the suggestion made that it not apply to the suburbs when they become part of the city, October first.

If the ordinance could be delayed until paths could be built the whole problem would be solved.

As fast as a path could be built the walks could be vacated, and no interruption of travel would result to anyone.

The cyclists are organizing and will quietly await the action of the council and then take such steps as will secure the best results.

While the ordinance contains some steps in the right direction it also has weak places and the problem is no nearer solved than before.

There is one just complaint of the bicycle riders at any more laws when the city laws we have against reckless riding cannot be, or are not, enforced.

How can the public expect protection against reckless riders on sidewalks under more stringent legislation, when it is impossible to enforce the present regulations.

It must be said that there is at this season of the year a great deal of unnecessary riding on the walks, when there is just as good or better pedaling on the roads and streets.

The discussion of the subject will remedy some of these abuses. The general intelligence of the community demands progress.

Vacation for "Poison Squad."

Washington, D. C., June 30.—After today the "poison squad" of the division of chemistry, of the department of agriculture, is to suspend operations until cool weather. Dr. Wiley, the chief, who has been feeding them upon meats and other food products strongly dosed with borax and boric acid for the purpose of discovering whether those preservatives are injurious to health, has collected data enough to satisfy himself that he will be safe in drawing conclusions on that subject.

When the investigation is resumed in October the 12 young men composing the squad will drink beverages charged with salicylic acid. This is the preservative put into wine, beer, cider and other drinks liable to quick souring to keep them so the palate will not refuse them.

The report to be written on the use of borax during the three-month vacation will probably be one of the most interesting publications ever made by the department.

1887—Royal Yacht club of Scotland challenged with Thistle, owned by James Bell. Beaten by Volunteer.

1893—Lord Dunraven's Valkyrie beaten by the Vilant. A Valkyrie was an earlier built boat not raced here.

1895—Second attempt on the part of Lord Dunraven to lift the cup. His Valkyrie III beaten by Defender.

1899—Royal Ulster Yacht club of Ireland challenged. Sir Thomas Lip-

ton made the attempt with Shamrock L. Beaten by Columbia.

1901—Second attempt by Sir Thomas Lipton, with Shamrock II Again beaten by Columbia.

1903—Third attempt by Sir Thomas Lipton, with Shamrock III. The defender will be the winner of the trial of the new defender Reliance, Columbia and Constitution.
