Bids Invited.

For supplies for the Oregon State Penitentiary, during the period ending December 31, 1903.

Sealed bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Shoes, Leather and Findings, Plumbing Supplies, Hardware, Flour, Oats and Mill Feed, Fish, Meats, etc., will be received at the office of the Superintendent of the State Penitentiary until Thursday, July 9th, 1903, at 3 o'clock p. m. at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200.00 in cash or certified check payable to the superintendent must accompany each bid for meat, and of \$75 for bids for flour and fish, all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of a bid.

On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the Penitentiary within 20 days after the contract is awarded, unless otherwise provided in contract.

Schedules of the various lines of goods will be furnished upon application to the Superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following completion of contract, and monthly on continuous contracts.

Samples must accompany bids for Dry Goods, Groceries, Flour and all other articles where practicable.

Murderer Suicides

Austin, Tex., June 30.—State Comptroller Love was shot to death in his office in the capitol this morning by William Hill, a former clerk, who had been discharged. Hill afterward committed suicide.

Hill shot because he was angered at Love's refusal to reinstate him. Hill is not dead, but is probably fatally wounded.

Now Tulloch Just Denies

Washington, June 30.—Tulloch this morning gives out a statement in which he denies he ever filed any written charges in 1899, and likewise denies making any report to expose Postmaster-General Smith. He says Smith's deadly parallel, which he sent to Payne, is without foundation. I simply referred him to the records shown by the department, that the reports referred to were evidently pre-

pared by his own inspectors, or subordinates, from data collected at that time during the investigation of the Washington postoffice.

Tulloch's intimates say he will probably bring a libel suit against Smith, on account of the editorial the latter published yesterday in the Philadelphia Press, in which, among other things, Smith said: "Annanias has a rival." The suit will be brought under the federal laws of the District of Columbia.

Sultan is Against Peter

Constantinople, June 30.—Turkey has taken a mild opposition to King Peter, of Serbia. The Porte offered to co-operate with the Austrian and Russian troops in the event of the renewal of trouble in Serbia, for the purpose of restoring order. The latter governments refused to consider the proposal. The Sultan is said to favor the support of Milan's son, by a morganatic marriage, who is now in Constantinople.
