SALEM VERSUS ROSEBURG.

The next league games in this city are Saturday and Sunday between Salem and Roseburg.

The Roseburg team got away with Salem on the occasion of the first bout between these two strongest clubs in the Western Oregon league.

They are a strong team and have the backing of their people, and of a large contingent of the railroad men of the S. P. Co.

The games at Salem that come off Saturday and Sunday will test the question whether our team has really been strengthened by additions.

The Roseburg team is stronger and has had more practice, and is made up of a more than average lot of men, physically.

They are capable of great team work, and have more resources than any team on the league, unless it be the Salems.

The Salem team will develop this week more than ever before, as they have some needed practice work, and will get more.

The games Saturday and Sunday will be a battle royal for league supremacy, and there should be thousands of people to see them.

SUPT. TRAVER WILL REMAIN.

The best news Salem public schools have heard in a long time was the announcement of the determination of Prof. L. R. Traver to remain at Salem.

Although offered a better position, from the standpoint of salary, and for opportunity of advancement, he prefers to stay at Salem and work for the schools here.

He was told at Portland that he was wasting his time, that Salem people would not appreciate good public schools, and at Portland he could be made more at home in progressive school work.

Prof. Traver simply did not believe this, and from the success he has had he returns to Salem to work on a smaller salary, but with the belief that here great results for upbuilding the schools are possible.

This is the spirit that carries the public school work forward, contrasted with the attitude of some educators who put their salary before their work and the opportunity for rendering service.

Such unselfish devotion to the cause of the public schools will accomplish more and get good work out of all who are connected with the schools.

With the hearty support of the board of education a man with the determination of Prof. Traver will put the Salem public schools to the front rank of the whole state.

With such leadership the people feel that they are getting results from the school taxes they pay, and will pay them far more cheerfully than when they feel that there is no progress being made.

THE FINANCIAL CONDITION.

There is a good tone to all lines of financial transactions, and a wholesome spirit of confidence is well maintained.

The conservative policy of the President has had a good effect on the trusts, and it seems probable that all danger of a collapse is past.

Railroad earnings and the iron industry continue to be phenomenally heavy. An abundant crop of wheat, corn and cotton is promised.

With these foundation stones of national prosperity well in position, the fluctuations of the labor and stock market can do little damage.

The scarcity of money for current business continues large, and the next panic, if we have one, will come from over-speculation in the East, instead of inflation in the West.

Western banks are besieged for currency, and old conservative institutions like the Portland First National bank find themselves compelled to pay interest on country deposits.

Small Oregon banks are earning good interest every month from such deposits with larger concerns that have great demand for currency in commercial centers.

It looks as if the small country banks had the advantage in this respect, as if the big city banks were under tremendous demands for funds to carry their customers, and competition forces them to accommodate their customers.

There is some good argument for an increase in the national currency, and it is more than likely that congress will be forced to take some action. Reliance of the country on Klondike and South Africa will not meet all the necessities of civilization.

PARSON TALKS SENSE

Cranks Sympathize With the Black Fiend

They Lose Sight of the Crime and the Innocent Victim, to Weep Over the Guilty One

"I am no advocate of lynching or of mob law, but I had rather see a community wrought to the highest pitch over crimes that would seem impossible this side of hell than to remain apathetic," was the declaration of Rev. Dr. Bartlett at the First Congregational Church Sunday in a prelude on "Lynching From Another Point of View," Dr. Bartlett said.

"I have seen so many sermons, editorials and resolutions denouncing lynching and mob law that one gets the impression that the citizens who hang or burn the destroyers of life, home and all that is held sacred by womanhood, are the offenders rather than the monster whom they destroy.

"We seem to be so absorbed with the majesty of this vague term 'law' that the notion seems to prevail that the real criminal are those who do not wait for legal processes, and the violator of womanhood is the abused party.

"We shudder at the torture of the criminal who is burned, but apparently forget to shudder for the innocent girl whose mental and spiritual agony is ten-fold greater than that of the fire. This is not a race problem, except so far as one race are the offenders. The white man who commits the same crime is just as guilty.

"The indignant uprising of a community, and some of the best men in it, to avenge a wrong of such awful magnitude may be technically lawless, but the spirit which causes the uprising is the reflection of a higher civilization. There are crimes so dreadful that the pure and the chivalrous and the strong find it well nigh impossible to endure the thought that such a degenerate should pollute the earth by his presence. It is easy to theorize about the anarchy of mob law, but the same hand which penned the calm editorial might be the first to grasp the torch if it was a mother, wife or daughter who was the victim.

"I say that when you look at a lynching from another viewpoint it is simply the bursting forth of an indignation and loathing that will not be checked. In the Old Testament days they made short work of such an offender.

"Lynching is certainly a bad method and forms a habit of disorder and makes men bloodthirsty. But if it is to be avoided there certainly is called for a more sure and speedy trial of these wretches who often brazenly deny crime amid red tape of legal processes, but confess abjectly when confronted with determined men. It is useless to bring to trial good men who rise up to protect their friends. The community will not bear it if the men object to being burned let them cease from crimes which make a nation sick."

Rich Strike in the Lucky Boy

Fred Sharkey, of the Lucky Boy Mining Company, was down yesterday from the Blue River mines. He is very enthusiastic over the future of the Blue River region. He says that the people of Eugene do not half appreciate the value of the camp.

A Rich Strike.
In the Lucky Boy mines a new and very rich strike has just been made. Mr. Sharkey had with him several pieces of quartz taken from the mines in which the gold was plainly visible to the naked eye. No assay has yet been made of the ore, but a conservative estimate places it at \$2000 per ton. The strike was run into in an up-rise from the lower drift. It is large and well defined.

In the Confidence mine, a parallel to the Lucky Boy, the company now has at least 60,000 tons of immensely rich ore blocked out. They will make the next clean-up sometime between the 1st and 10th of July—Eugene Guard.
