Quimby Out Baker in

The protection of Oregon's game today passes from the control of L. P. W. Quimby, of Portland, who has been state game warden for the five years last past. Mr. Quimby will be succeeded by J. W. Baker, of Cottage Grove, who was appointed by Governor Chamberlain several weeks ago.

During his term of office Warden Quimby has done much to protect the big game and game birds of the state, and has been very active in the discharge of his duty. He has made 150 arrests for violation of game laws, and has succeeded in stopping the sale of game in the open markets, except during the 15 days in November, when the law permits it. During the present year he has caused the arrest of 15 persons for killing birds and deer out of season, and during his entire term he has been a terror to hunters who defy the law.

Six deputy wardens also go out with Mr. Quimby, E. G. Hodson, of Roseburg; L. S. Fritz, of The Dalles; T. B. Wells, of Pendleton; I. F. Lewis, of Klamath, and W. H. Prettyman and F. Allsby, of Portland.

Gettysburg, Pa., July 1.—Several thousand veterans and their families, representing both North and South, gathered today and began a three days' celebration of the fortieth anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg. The chief feature of today's program, which was carried out at Reynolds' Grove, where historical addresses by General O. O. Howard and General H. S. Huldekooper, followed by the unveiling of a bronze statue of John H. Burns, the aged Gettysburg man who was wounded three times in the historic battle.

The reading of the indictments was waived, and Machen pleaded not guilty.

Chicago's First White Child.

Chicago, Ill., July 1.—Residents of the great Western metropolis, with all its wealth and industries, its immense area and large population, find it difficult to realize that the city is still but an infant, so far as years go, but this fact is strikingly illustrated in the case of Alexander Beaubien, who was retired from the police force today on account of age. Surprising as it may seem at first statement, it is nevertheless an historic fact that Mr. Beaubien was the first white child born in Chicago. At the time of his birth, Chicago was an outpost, with hostile Indians on all sides, and the only white residents were the garrison of Fort Dearborn, and a handful of traders, of which Mr. Beaubien's father was one.

Carnival Proving a Magnificent Success

The twins, Norine and Pauline, are only seven years old, and are, perhaps, the only children of that age in the world doing perfect bar work. One of the wonderful feats they are able to accomplish is the giant swing, and to see it done by these two little tots well repays one. They own and operate their own show, which is managed by their father. With them is Vervolin, the ventriloquist, who is truly wonderful, as he has perfect control of his features.

One of the most interesting and certainly the most instructive branches of the show is the Wallace glass blowers. Large crowds visited them yesterday afternoon and evening. Every one is delighted with this artistic and educational exhibition. The ladies admire the beautiful glass dresses, while the men find a study in the working of the glass steam engine. Every visitor receives a specimen of their work free.

No one should miss seeing the exhibition, as it is certainly a meritorious one. The admission is but 15 cents, children 10 cents.

The Japanese jugglers are certainly immense, and the steadily increasing crowds visiting them attest the fineness of their work. They had the honor of appearing before the Mikado in Tokio 18 months ago.

The streets of Cairo, with the magicians, dancing girls, sword-fighters, etc., must not be overlooked, and, if you want a sensation, take a ride on

the hurricane deck of Holy Moses, the ugliest camel ever born in captivity, or out of it, either. The sensation is like going around the Ferris wheel, only more so.

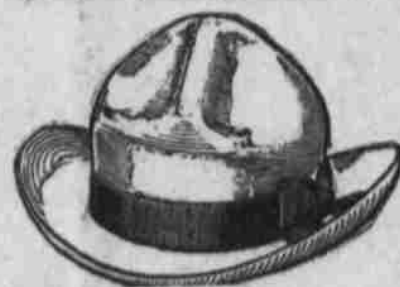
